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## There Goes An Honorable Man . . . There Goes a Delt!

My grandfather taught me many years ago if you ever have to tell someone what you believe . . . you aren't living it out in your daily life!

Those words have resonated with me since I was a child, but really hit home during my undergraduate years in Delta Tau Delta. It was during my early study of our *Ritual* I realized our principles and values challenge each of us to live our life a certain way . . . every day.

All of which brings me to the avalanche of negative press the Greek movement has received during the current academic year. It seems barely a week passes without a controversial situation coming the way of Greek fraternities and sororities.

The fraternal world has been rocked by a salacious *Rolling Stone* story later proven inaccurate and retracted that involved alleged sexual assault at the University of Virginia; racist conduct by students at the University of Oklahoma captured on a smart phone and broadcast via social media; and multiple incidents involving significant property destruction involving fraternity and sorority members from the University of Michigan at venues far from campus.

Why aren't Greeks living the values of their fraternity or sorority?

In the wake of such alleged misconduct, entire Greek systems have been put on lockdown by the college or university for periods of weeks or even months. The acts of a few have had an impact on many. More importantly, the bad behavior of some has reflected negatively on an entire movement. We've all been caught in the "blow back" of negative news coverage and a perception that we are like those in the spotlight.

For me, these stories should shake us and make us take stock of what Delta Tau Delta is truly about. Our Oath, Creed, Motto, Mission, Values and *Ritual* must guide us in these perilous times and be our guiding light . . . our light of aspiration.

Rest assured, Delta Tau Delta will continue to live its values. We all have taken an Oath that demands we live a life that is good, decent, clean and manly. It is our declaration to live a life of excellence.

Drunken behavior is not clean. Not treating a fellow human being as an equal -- engaging in hazing, expressing racial hatred, or being bigoted toward other lifestyles and religions -- is not decent. Mistreatment of women is not manly. Delta Tau Delta will not condone nor tolerate behavior that is not in alignment with our values . . . that wrongs or injures the Fraternity or any member thereof. If you feel or act differently, you will not be allowed to wear the badge of Delt.

Therefore, I am asking all brothers, but especially our undergraduate leaders and alumni volunteers, to be constantly vigilant on expecting and enforcing conduct which upholds all that is good within Delta Tau Delta and the Greek ideal.

Finally, in the matter regarding the recent passage of legislation in Indiana known as the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA), its spirit as originally enacted is not within the principles and values of Delta Tau Delta. Accordingly, our leadership team at the Central Office was in expedient communication with its elected state representatives to express concern about the measure, as did a wide cross section of business leaders and ordinary citizens across the state. Together they created a strong voice, which ultimately led to an amendment that reaffirmed Indiana's long tradition of being a state welcome to all people.

In that vein, it is important for us all to remember the Fraternity stands on both the letter and spirit of Article IV of our *Constitution*. It states:

*Eligibility for membership in the Fraternity shall be limited to men of superior character and shall not be affected or determined in any manner by inappropriate or illegal discrimination.*

Our response to the RFRA act is Delta Tau Delta living our values. It all goes back to what we believe and how we reflect those values on campus, in our hometown, or dispersed around the world.

I challenge every Delt to remember who you are, the Oath you took, the values upon which our brotherhood is based, and the challenge our Fraternity makes on each of us to live a life of excellence.

Because no matter where you are, whether you have your letters on, I want people to see you and say, "There goes an honorable man . . . there goes a Delt!"

# The Legacy of Hugh Shields



Fifty years ago this spring, April 9, 1965 to be exact, one of the giants of Delta Tau Delta entered the Chapter Eternal. Hugh Shields (Indiana University 1926), the 64-year-old executive vice president who had guided the Fraternity since 1930, died in Indianapolis after a brief illness.

Five decades later the name Hugh Shields remains robust in the contemporary language of Delta Tau Delta. It is synonymous with achievement because of the Hugh Shields Award for Chapter Excellence, presented annually since 1966 by the Arch Chapter to the top 10 chapters in the Fraternity. To "win a flag" is the pinnacle of chapter achievement within Delta Tau Delta.

But as meaningful as the award has proven to be in the ongoing life of the Fraternity, Hugh Shields the man is even more important. He remains a near mythic figure in Delta Tau Delta's 157-year history. Though an ever-dwindling number of Delts can say they experienced him personally, his impact and his omnipresence within our Fraternity live on in myriad ways.

A more in-depth remembrance of this Delt giant will be featured in the June edition of the Rainbow. It will include personal anecdotes about him, including a poignant memory from a Delt now well into his 60s about being befriended as a youngster by the childless Shields and receiving a Delt pledge pin from him.

# Delts Nationwide Gather to Renew!

More than 1,100 undergraduates and alumni gathered across the country to learn, engage and renew their commitments to lives of excellence.

The 2015 Delta Tau Delta Division Conferences experienced record-setting attendance rates with nearly 1,100 undergraduates and 150 alumni gathering in the five divisions to celebrate brotherhood, complete necessary division business, and renew their commitment and passion for Delta Tau Delta. The theme of this year's division conferences was "Renew," a continuation of the theme of Karnea New Orleans. Along with a focus on renewal to the mission and values of Delta Tau Delta, the division conferences focused on the Fraternity's tool for measuring success—The Fraternity Awards/Accreditation Report. The FAAR-centric educational programming at the 2015 division conferences taught undergraduates and volunteers how to use the FAAR as a planning tool for chapter programs and operations.

Along with brotherhood and educational programming, the division conferences also honored those chapters and individuals who exceeded expectations on their journey for excellence during the 2014 FAAR-reporting year. The highest honors, the Hugh Shields Award and Court of Honor Award, were presented to the top chapters. Additionally, chapters and individuals were honored for their excellence in philanthropy, campus involvement, academics, chapter advising, *Ritual* performance and more.

After the outstanding chapters and individuals of the five divisions were honored for their accomplishments, each conference delegation witnessed model *Rite of Iris* and *Ritual* performances to further envelope participants in the true essence of Delta Tau Delta. The *Rite of Iris* was performed by the Delta Omega Chapter at Kent State for the Northern Division; by the Gamma Nu Chapter at the University of Maine for the Eastern Division; by the Zeta Zeta Chapter at Morehead State for the Southern Division; by the Theta Omega Chapter at Northern Arizona University for the Western Pacific

Division; and by the Theta Delta Chapter at Baylor University at the Western Plains Division.

Additionally, the *Ritual* was performed by the Zeta Chapter at Case Western Reserve for the Northern Division; by the Iota Mu Chapter of Quinnipiac University for the Eastern Division; by the Delta Epsilon Chapter at the University of Kentucky for the Southern Division; by the Theta Psi Chapter at the College of Idaho for the Western Pacific Division; and by the Epsilon Beta Chapter at Texas Christian University for the Western Plains Division. Furthermore, the Kappa Gamma Chapter at Monmouth University was installed during the Eastern Division *Ritual* performance.

International President Jody Danneman (Univer-



sity of Georgia, 1988) gave the keynote speech at the Southern, Western Pacific and Western Plains Division Conferences while Vice President Jim Garboden (University of Pittsburgh, 1988) and Second Vice President Steve Paquette (Syracuse University, 1977) gave the keynote address at the Eastern Division and Northern Division respectively.

### New Leadership

At the end of this division conference season came the beginning of a new era of leadership among the five divisions of the Fraternity. Included in the business and state of affairs of each division was the election of the new division presidents.

Mark Starr (Case Western Reserve University, 1995) succeeded Tom Calhoon (Ohio State University, 1970) as Northern Division President. As an undergraduate at Case Western, Starr served as his chapter's vice president, intramural chairman, alumni relations chairman and Greek Week chairman. As an alumnus, Starr has served in a number of notable roles within the Fraternity, including Northern Division Vice President, chapter advisor, house corporation trustee and educational program facilitator. His extensive service to the Fraternity led to Starr becoming a 2008 recipient of the Bill Fraering Award for outstanding alumni service by young alumni.

Bryan Adams (University of Maine, 2007) succeeded Anthony Albanese (American University, 1996) as Eastern Division President. During his time as an undergraduate of the Gamma Nu Chapter at the University of Maine, Adams held various leadership roles including three terms on the executive board, serving as sergeant-at-arms, president and vice president. Soon after graduation, Adams became actively involved as an alumni advisor in various





capacities. He was chosen to serve on the Gamma Nu Alumni Supervisory Committee during the fall of 2007. After serving on the committee, he was appointed as an Eastern Division Vice President. He has also served as a reviewer of the Fraternity Accreditation and Awards Report and since 2010 held the role of Eastern Division treasurer.

Mike Tankersley (College of Idaho, 2005) succeeded Bill Richardson (Butler University, 1979) as Western Pacific Division President. As an undergraduate member of the Theta Psi Chapter at the College of Idaho, Tankersley served in a number of leadership positions including president, vice president and director of risk management. He has remained a dedicated member of the Fraternity since graduating in 2005, serving as the house corporation treasurer for the Theta Psi Chapter. Additionally, Tankersley served as a Western Pacific Division vice president prior to his election to division president.

Dan Loving (Oklahoma State University, 1972) succeeded Josh Schneider (Texas State University, 1998) as Western Plains Division President. Prior to his election as Western Plains division president, Loving served as division vice president, overseeing the chapters of the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University. His service to Delta Tau Delta also includes roles as chapter advisor for chapters at Tulane University, Texas Christian University and Oklahoma State University. As an undergraduate, Loving served as new

member class president and director of recruitment for the Delta Chi Chapter at Oklahoma State University. Additionally, on campus he managed the campus radio station and was president of the Sigma Delta Chi journalism fraternity.

Tiger Edwards (Southeastern Louisiana University, 1973) succeeded Lee Grace (Western Kentucky University, 1984) as Southern Division President. Edwards has served two terms as Southern Division vice president and was the first recipient of the Bill Fraering Award for service to Delta Tau Delta in 1982. In addition to the Bill Fraering Award, Edwards was also cited in 2010 to the Distinguished Service Chapter, the highest honor an alumnus can receive for service to the Fraternity. As an undergraduate, Edwards served as vice president and new member educator for the Epsilon Phi Chapter at Southeastern Louisiana University. Additionally, he was elected vice president of his senior class at Southeastern and was named to Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges in 1973.

All five recently elected division presidents took office on March 1, 2015 for two-year terms.

# The Road To Recognition

Undergraduates and alumni from across the nation gathered at the 2015 division conferences to renew their commitment to the Fraternity and reignite their passion for Delta Tau Delta by celebrating the lifelong brotherhood and honoring those chapters and individuals for their commitment to excellence and outstanding achievements. Awards presented at the 2015 division conferences include the Fraternity's highest chapter honor, the Hugh Shields Award, as well as the second highest designation, the Court of Honor.

The Fraternity's top chapters for the 2014 reporting year included three repeat recipients – Beta Zeta, Iota Epsilon and Iota Iota – while Delta Beta and Theta Xi earned the first award in chapter history. Iota Epsilon celebrated its seventh straight award and became the sixth chapter with Hugh Shields runs of seven or more years. The all-time leader is Beta Lambda at Lehigh which won nine straight from 1986 through 1994. Gamma Pi at Iowa State, which earned its first Hugh Shields Award since 2011, is the Fraternity's overall leader with 23 flags.

Gamma Kappa celebrated its first flag since 1992, Epsilon Beta its first since 1994 and Theta Psi its first since 1999. With its first since 2011 and 15th overall, Epsilon Phi retired the third flag in its history.

This was the 50th year the award was presented recognizing the Fraternity's most outstanding chapters. It is named in honor of Hugh Shields (Indiana, 1926), who served as the chief executive officer from 1930 to his death in 1965.

In addition to the 10 chapters honored with the Hugh Shields Award, 11 others were included in the 2014 Court of Honor. They included first-time recipients Iota Mu, chartered in 2011, and Iota Sigma, chartered in 2012. Omicron, which was re-chartered in 2013 after a 14-year absence, earned its first Court of Honor since 1989. Gamma Psi was presented its first since 2003 and Delta Epsilon its first since 2004.

During the 2015 Division Conference season, many alumni were honored for their service to the Fraternity.

### The Bill Fraering Award

The Bill Fraering Award was established by the Arch Chapter in 1981 to honor younger alumni who have rendered outstanding service to Delta Tau Delta including, but not limited to, chapter advisors, house corporation members, division vice presidents and alumni chapter presidents.

The award is restricted to young alumni who are no more than 15 years beyond their undergraduate days. The award honors those for exemplary service to Delta Tau Delta.

To be considered for the award, a nominee must have been an alumnus for a minimum of three years and provided extraordinary and outstanding service to the international Fraternity. Nominations may be made by an undergraduate chapter, by an alumni chapter or by any alumnus in good standing. Nominations are reviewed by the Fraering Awards Committee comprised of five former recipients and a chairman.

**Jason Feiner** (Bradley University, 1997) served as secretary of his chapter, and after graduation became the assistant advisor at Illinois State.

He was named colony advisor at the Quincy University colony, which later became Iota Delta Chapter. Beginning in 2000, he served as division vice president for five more chapters throughout both the Northern and Eastern Divisions. He served as a chapter advisor for Omega Chapter at the University of Pennsylvania from 2005-2008.

**Bryan Adams** (University of Maine, 2007) joined the Gamma Nu Chapter in the fall of 2003 and later served as chapter president and then chapter vice president – maintaining a position on the executive committee as an upperclassman. As an undergraduate he also served as a Karnea intern for the 2006 Brickyard Karnea in Indianapolis, Ind.

Following graduation Adams served as assistant advisor to Gamma Nu Chapter, and division vice president for MIT, Tufts and Babson College. Adams served as division treasurer from 2010 to 2015 and has overseen a significant increase in what was a slim division treasury. Professionally Adams is the coordinator of programs at Boston University.

**Dan Wagner** (Lehigh University, 2007) has worn many hats during his career as an alumnus volunteer, including time as a chapter advisor to Theta Chi Chapter at Muhlenberg College, FAAR grader for three years, division conference facilitator, and a division vice president. He has also served on a variety of Karnea committees including the Time and Place and Nominations.

**John Mainella** (West Virginia University, 1999) began his service to the Fraternity as a chapter treasurer during his time at Gamma Delta Chapter at West Virginia University. Upon

graduation, he joined the Fraternity's staff as a chapter leadership consultant, and then transitioned to the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation where he served as director of the annual fund and later director of development.

After leaving staff, Mainella continued his volunteer role, serving as a division vice president to five chapters in the Northern Division.

**Jesse Epstein** (American University, 2006) quickly rose through the ranks of his chapter, serving as new member educator, vice president and president. When his time as an undergraduate came to an end, he quickly jumped into the alumni volunteer ranks, serving as a division vice president and chapter advisor. In addition to his chapter-level service, he has also served as a chapter leadership consultant and facilitator for educational events.

Epstein is the current chapter advisor for Theta Epsilon Chapter at American University.

### Distinguished Service Chapter

Three Delts who have provided outstanding service to the Fraternity were honored during the division conferences by being cited into the Distinguished Service Chapter.

The Distinguished Service Chapter began in 1930 as the Court of Honor. Men who have been Delt alumni for more than 20 years and who have contributed significantly to the Fraternity and served Delta Tau Delta beyond their own chapter are eligible for membership. It is the highest service honor presented by the Fraternity.

**Richard A. Schmidt** (University of North Dakota, 1976) has served as founding colony advisor and longtime chapter advisor for Theta Gamma Chapter at Arizona State University. He also served as a division vice president and chairman of an alumni

supervisory committee. Schmidt has served on numerous Karnea committees and served as a facilitator at division conferences and Karnea.

**Thomas B. Pitchford** (Southeastern Louisiana University, 1993) serves as a model for alumni involvement. From the moment he initiated into Epsilon Phi Chapter, Pitchford's commitment to the Fraternity has been continuous. He served as chapter advisor to three chapters, division vice president, and as facilitator at several division conferences and Karneas. He has previously been honored with the both the Bill Fraering Award and the Jim Bowersox Chapter Advisor of the Year Award in the Western Pacific Division.

**Irwin Slotnick** (Penn State University, 1982) was an emerging leader in his chapter and helped lead it out of the ashes to a Hugh Shields Award as undergraduate president. Slotnick served as a division vice president and chapter advisor and was instrumental in rebuilding the New York Alumni Chapter. He often served the Arch Chapter on special investigations, always completing the task in a first-class manner with his special brand of thoughtfulness for others and commitment to high standards.

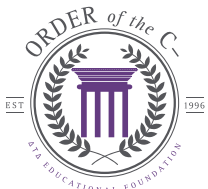
### Bethany Society Welcomes John Teevan (University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, 1972)
