Released Prisoner Relates Experiences at Hands of Japanese

BRONXVILLE, NEW YORK, August 29, 1942.—On June 7, after six months' incarceration, I was released from the Osaka prison and taken to an internment camp in Kobe, preparatory to embarking on the evacuation ship Asama Maru. The American, British and Dutch internees gave me a royal welcome, sharing with me their butter, jam, coffee, eggs and other delicacies that I had not even smelled for months. I felt as if I had dropped down into a little corner of heaven, inhabited solely by angels! That first night in a comfortable bed, I stayed awake all night from excitement and pure joy.

Within fifteen minutes from the time when we heard that war had been declared, detectives came to our apartment, searching every shelf and closet and drawer, carrying off all letters and papers for examination, and taking me off to prison. For twenty-four hours a guard was stationed at the apartment, but aside from this Mrs. Myers was not molested, and was allowed entire freedom.

With me in the detention prison in Kobe there were dozens of other Europeans and Americans, all in solitary confinement. On Christmas Eve, when everything was quiet in the corridor and no guards around, I began whistling all the Christmas Carols I could remember. When I had whistled a dozen, my "official pesterer" came bustling along, and such a bawling out as he did give me! You would have thought I had tried to murder the guards and burn down the prison. But for days afterward, whenever I passed one of the other prisoners on the steps or in the corridors, he would whisper to me, "Thank you for Christmas," and I felt amply repaid.

While I was in prison many Japanese friends came to see Mrs. Myers

Editor's Note: Dr. Harry W. Myers was a teacher at the Presbyterian Seminary in Kobe, Japan. He was born in Lexington, Virginia, the home of Washington and Lee University. He studied at the Presbyterian Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky, before going to the Far East in 1898—on the same boat, by the way, that carried Commodore Perry to his command of the Asiatic Fleet, an event leading up to Dewey's destruction of the Spanish Fleet in Manila Bay.

Those who have interviewed Dr. Myers report that he shows no bitterness even though the treatment encountered during imprisonment was rough and the nourishment limited—to the extent that in 180 days he lost thirty pounds.

Dr. Myers tells of Japanese threats to shoot him unless he confessed to charges of espionage which situation he terminated with the reply, "Go ahead, I am ready!" The Japanese gave up—their bluff having been called.

These columns present the letter which Dr. Myers sent to his friends in acknowledgment of "Greetings on your safe return" messages.

bringing her gifts of fruit, eggs, cake and other things not in the markets that represented real sacrifice on their part. More than one offered to supply her with money if she needed it.

A hundred and eighty days of solitary confinement is a long time; and I had not the slightest intimation that my release was impending till I was called to the office of the governor of the prison, and handed what looked like a college diploma on a lacquer tray. Two influential Japanese friends had made special trips to Tokyo to interview the Minister of Justice on my behalf, and had secured the promise of my release. The prayers of many friends had been answered, and I was like one in a dream.

I spent ten days in the concentration camp before sailing, and scores of Japanese friends came to see me. The pastor of the very poor slum church brought me four buns—his bread allowance for the day. Dr. Kagawa sent me a box of thirty fresh eggs. One friend sent a box of doughnuts that she had made.

On June 16, along with some three hundred other evacuees, we took a night train to Yokohama, and were put aboard the Asama Maru; and six days later started on our 19,000-mile journey past Hong-kong, Saigon and Singapore, across the Indian Ocean to Mozambique, around the Cape of Good Hope, across the Atlantic to Rio, thence through the Sargasso Sea and the West Indies to New York.

Steaming up New York Harbor, when we came to the Statue of Liberty, the sixteen hundred passengers joined in singing "My Country 'Tis of Thee" and "The Star Spangled Banner." Many eyes were full of tears, and I think every heart was full of thanks to God for our safe return to our own country.

Delta Tau Delta in Congress

SENATOR HARLIE MARTIN KILGORE, Gamma Delta (West Virginia), '14, Democratic Senator from West Virginia, was born in Brown, West Virginia, January 11, 1893. When he finished the public schools there, he went to the University, from which he graduated in 1914 with the degree of LL.B. His experience for a short time as a teacher started an interest in young people, which was later further stimulated through his service as judge of the criminal court of Raleigh County, West Virginia. He served in this capacity from January 1, 1933, until his election to the Senate. Youth and its problems have had a sympathetic and active friend ever since. During the first World War, Senator Kilgore entered the regular army as a second lieutenant in a machine gun company. His skill as an instructor determined his fate, and also led to his advancement to captain by war's end. As a regular army officer, he was then assigned to construction work in the Southwest, which was ended by his resignation on March 13, 1920. When he returned to his native state to resume the practice of law, the reorganization of the state guard was in progress. Experience such as his

was needed, and he took command of the local company. By 1940 he had risen to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, which he still holds on detached service as a Senator.

the Masonic Lodge, Elks, Moose, and the American Legion. His wife is the former Lois Lilly, of Bluefield, West Virginia, and they have two children, Robert Martin and Elinor Stuart. He was elected to the Senate, November 5, 1940, for the term ending January 3, 1947.

Indicative of what may be expected from Senator Kilgore are the two bills, one introduced with Senator Pepper of Florida, now before the Senate. The first, introduced August 17, 1942, aims at the establishment of an Office of Technological Mobilization, with the authority to regain, maintain, and surpass our previous technical preëminence and attainments, through the mobilization of all trained manhood and facilities. The second, introduced October 22, 1942, is a bill to establish an Office of War Mobilization, a further step beyond the first bill. This office would consist of an Office of Production and Supply, an Office of Manpower Supply, an Office of Technological Mobilization, and an Office of Economic Stabilization. Here is a man who is modest and unassuming, but with a power to think straight and the energy to seek action. He is a brother who will bear watching.

New Supervisor of Scholarship Named

MARTIN B. DICKINSON, *Gamma Tau (Kansas)*, '26, has been appointed by President Paul G. Hoffman to fill the unexpired term of WILLFRED O. MAUCK, *Kappa (Hillsdale)*, '21, Supervisor of Scholarship.

A prominent Kansas City, Missouri, attorney, Mr. Dickinson brings to the Arch Chapter office a wealth of Fraternity background and experience. He served as President of the Western Division, filling the office during 1933 and 1934. At the time of his appointment as

Supervisor of Scholarship, Mr. Dickinson was serving the Western Division as vice-president, giving his especial attention to Gamma Theta (Baker), Gamma Kappa (Missouri), Gamma Tau (Kansas), Gamma Chi (Kansas State), and Delta Omicron (Westminster). He has been one of the "regulars" of the Kansas City Alumni Chapter for years.

Mr. Dickinson made a distinguished record in college. He was the highest ranking senior in the Kansas University School of Law,

and at the close of school was one of three seniors to be elected to the Order of the Coif. He was also a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He is married and has two children.

Dr. Mauck leaves the Arch Chapter to become Senior Education Program Officer, Division of Science and Education, Co-ordinator of Inter-American Affairs, in the Executive Offices of the President, after serving one-half of the term to which he was elected at the White Sulphur Karnea in 1941.

War Correspondent Visits African Front

ON the cover this number THE RAINBOW presents Gordon Gaskill, Delta Delta (Tennessee), '34, whose informative and interesting articles in *The American Magazine* have brought the outposts of the war into the homes of thousands of Deltas and other Americans. For many months he has been visiting the spots in the news and bringing back firsthand accounts from his trips as a member of the press in uniform. One of his most recent trips was to the African front.

In Egypt Mr. Gaskill wangled the privilege, accorded to very few reporters, of flying into actual combat with the British. There were four planes in the flight he accompanied; their objective was to fly 300 miles into hostile Libya and shoot up an enemy airdrome on the Mediterranean coast. It was the most dangerous kind of assignment because airdromes are well guarded. Mr. Gaskill travelled on the leading Beaufighter, a deadly type of plane capable of flying at enormous speed only 15 feet above the ground. The Italians in Libya called the Beaufighter the "Wrath of God."

In its first sweep over the airdrome the squadron took a heavy toll of men, trucks, and grounded planes before the surprised enemy

had a chance to retaliate. On the second attack the enemy was better prepared; a bullet smashed against the windshield 18 inches from Mr. Gaskill's face. Fortunately the windshield was bullet-proof. Safely back at their home field the pilots handed in their reports—each plane had flown 1,000 miles to use its guns not more than 10 seconds. They had destroyed 13 planes, 6 lorries, one gasoline tank truck and had killed at least 30 men.

A more or less quiet interval was provided by Mr. Gaskill's trek through Lebanon, Syria, Palestine, and Egypt to interview the late Paul Knabenshue, U. S. Minister to Iraq. Upshot of that trip was the first full story of the 31-day siege of the American Legation in Baghdad, the heroic tale of how a former manufacturer from Ohio turned his home into a fortress, rescued 170 men and women, and defied an army of Hitler-inspired rebels.

His next assignment took him across deserts and mountains to Addis Ababa to talk with Haile Selassie, Emperor of Ethiopia, and leader of the first country to be freed of Axis domination. He secured from Ethiopia's statesman a signed statement setting forth his hopes for the future of a world at peace and the answers to six ques-

tions which vitally concern the world today.

Back in Egypt, he hobnobbed with Britain's new super-commandos in the desert and brought back the first close-up account of the exploits of these daring parachute commandos, who have been nicknamed the "fighting fools" of the desert. To get some idea of what their everyday routine really felt like, Mr. Gaskill made a thousand-foot practice jump with them.

Racing over 7,000 miles in seven days he was the first American correspondent to tear into Madagascar hot on the heels of the British, to witness the results of their brilliantly executed attack on the French naval base at Diego-Suarez.

Flying from Madagascar to the bottom of Africa on the first lap of his homeward journey, Mr. Gaskill talked to all kinds of people in Johannesburg, to piece together the story of how South Africa, starting with a handful of planes and little else, has built, in three short years, an incredible war industry and arsenal. He interviewed the two men responsible for this feat—Jan Christian Smuts, the fire-eating soldier prime minister, and Hendrik Johannes van der Bijl, the spark plug of South Africa's industry.

South American U.P. Man Writes Delta Tau Delta

RIO DE JANEIRO (By Airmail).—It's a long haul from here to Lawrence, Kansas, home of Gamma Tau, but every time I set foot in my home or my office, I feel my indebtedness to my chapter.

The man who gave me my opening into the United Press was Bill Dickinson of my chapter, Martin's brother, and the man who "tipped me off" to my wife is Bill Danenbarger, also of my chapter. She was Helen Townsley, Great Bend, Kansas, a Goucher Pi Phi.

Of course, Jack Bisco, of Gamma Kappa, probably would say he had something to do with my getting married, but that is another story. Jack is assistant general business manager of the U.P.

Bill Dickinson's by-line appears now over leading U.P. dispatches from our London bureau, and Bill Danenbarger is business representative of the U.P. in the southern division, with headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia.

I suppose the hardest battle I've had yet outside of the U.P. is to prevent our son, James Townsley, from being pledged Phi Delt by his myriad of "maternal" Phi Delt relatives. So far so good, but someone had better send me a pledge pin quick! Age: nineteen months.

I never have calculated how far it is I have traveled since I left the Shelter in December, 1933, a few days before Christmas, to go to work for Bill Dickinson in our Denver bureau, but it must be quite a ways by now.

Editor's Note: James Alan Coogan, Gamma Tau (Kansas), '33, is director in Brazil of the United Press Associations which, as Coogan airily states, furnishes "the world's best coverage of the world's biggest news." His headquarters are in Rio de Janeiro. A full-time bureau of twenty persons is under him at Sao Paulo, in addition to the main bureau at Rio de Janeiro. Countless string correspondents cover the interior cities and the four-thousand-odd-mile coastline of the country which is larger than the continental United States. The United Press has sixty-odd paying clients among Brazilian daily newspapers for its exterior news, and produces the Reporter Esso radio news programs four times week days and twice on Sundays in Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo, Porto Alegre, Belo Horizonte, and Pernambuco.

ters' conference here ended on January 29 of this year, and to which I returned March 15. Presently, I am scheduled to fly to Buenos Aires on September 25 and return on October 26.

I've had the great good fortune to be on hand for several big stories since I went into U.P., chief among them being the assassination of Huey Long in Baton Rouge in September, 1935; the conference of foreign ministers in Lima in 1938; the conference of foreign ministers in Rio de Janeiro in 1942, and the declaration of war by Brazil in August of this year. There also was the mine explosion at Chucicamata, high in the northern Chilean Andes, in January, 1937, in which at least sixty miners lost their lives; the multi sub-sinkings along the Brazilian coast, the abortive revolution against President General Oscar Benavides of Peru in January, 1939, and others not so big, including the assassination of Pendergast's North Side lieutenant in Kansas City in 1934 or 1935.

Probably the only thing I have done to the greater honor and glory of Delta Tau Delta, outside of paying up my Loyalty Fund, is to send to Delta Alpha Herbert Keener, son of Sigma Chi Grant Keener. I thought that the pledging of Her-

bert was the finest bit of collaboration on rushing I had heard of in $\Delta\tau\Delta$ for a long time.

I knew that Herbert was going from here to the University of Oklahoma and I knew that Herbert was precisely the kind of man $\Delta\tau\Delta$ or any other fraternity would want anywhere. Happily, as I remembered our chapters from 1931 to 1933, Delta Alpha seemed to me to be, of all of them, the one where Herbert would be most happy. Fine combination, but how to get Herbert? Particularly when Pop Grant had assurances from Sigma Chi Brother Herbert Hyde, of Urschel kidnapping prosecution fame, that he himself would take care of Herbert Keener?

Well, I wrote a letter to the brothers at Tulane with a copy to Delta Alpha, and explained the situation. Delt Puts Color in Advertising

THIS business is unique in that it is a highly specialized service to advertising agencies—in that it is a service wherein everybody wins,” Robert A. Travis, Omega (Pennsylvania), '20, somewhat enigmatically explained in discussing Color Production Service, of which he is president.

“Thus Color Production Service is a specialized service to highly specialized service organizations, the advertising agencies,” he continued in explaining the business he heads, which was founded in 1932 as a company to promote the sale of color comic advertising in Sunday newspaper supplements, other than the Hearst organization, which was then carrying virtually all of the comic supplement advertising in the country.

Telling of the early development of the organization, he said, “We obtained the representation for national advertising of some forty to fifty newspapers. Then, it became apparent that the medium-sized and smaller papers we represented would be unable to handle color advertising in their comic supplements because of mechanical difficulties. Thus, after six months in the business, we found we would fail, due to mechanical problems, even though we were successful in our sales effort. Just about this time my partner lost his nerve and I bought him out.

“We then worked out a plan for the centralized handling of the newspaper problem in printing color advertising in order to furnish newspapers a type of printing material individualized to each and one that could easily be handled by any paper capable of printing a color comic supplement.

“The plan was looked upon with skepticism because it had never been done and because there were a multitude of details to be worked out; however, this was accomplished and the first advertiser to make use of the service was the General Foods Corporation, primarily interested in using the color comic

Editor's Note: The interview published here was obtained by David K. Reeder, Omega (Pennsylvania), '12, from Robert Travis, who is the president of Color Production Service, located at 250 Park Ave., New York City. Mr. Travis was originally from Clarksburg, W.Va., and he entered Carnegie Tech from St. Johns Military Academy, but transferred to Pennsylvania a few weeks later and pledged Delta Tau Delta. When Mr. Travis finished school he entered business with his father, who was a very successful manufacturer of milk bottles. When this business was sold out he worked with Mr. Reeder in the investment banking business until “the bottom of the depression” when he began his career in the advertising field.

supplement advertising medium, rather than in ‘high-spotting’ their advertising in a few large cities whose papers’ mechanical equipment and operations enabled them to handle the advertising from almost any type of printing material furnished.

“The result was the very rapid spread of color comic advertising all over the country as advertisers found that they could make use of any newspaper printing color and that they were not confined to those who could handle mechanical problems themselves. The result in the

first six years of color comic advertising, from 1932 through 1937, was an increase in color comic advertising volume from \$3,000,000 to \$16,500,000. After this tremendous uninterrupted increase there was a two-year slump in volume; however, the comic medium has again taken an upswing with a small, steady increase each year.”

In January, 1940, the company, Color Production Service, gave up the active representation of color comic supplements to devote its time to the mechanical end of the business, which is the business Mr. Travis describes today as the one in which everybody wins. He went on to explain that the advertiser and his agency eliminate a great deal of overhead by having the specialized work done for them by specialists, at a cost quite a bit lower than it could be handled individually. The newspapers receive a high-grade material which is more easily handled, and at no cost to themselves. The reproduction of the advertising, which is of interest to both the advertiser and the newspaper, has been markedly improved. Color Production Service acts as a clearing house for all advertisers using this medium and is able to eliminate confusion that would otherwise arise without such centralized handling.

“The service was so successfully received by advertisers that there was a demand for a corollary service in rotogravure, both color and monotone,” Mr. Travis related further, “with the result that a second service was established in 1937, called Intaglio Service Corporation. It renders the same service to advertisers and advertising agencies on gravure advertising as does Color Production Service for newspaper comic and magazine supplements. As an outgrowth of the gravure activity a third service organization has been inaugurated this past year, known as Cylinder Plating Corporation, which copper plates and finishes gravure printing cylinders in any size for commercial rotogravure printers in the East.”

"Kriegsgefangenenlager

Datum: August 11, 1942

"Dear Mom and Dad—I continue in fine health and spirits. I hope to receive my first letters from you in the near future. As I've said before I get along with the English quite well but I'm damn tired of being called 'Yank.' My greatest needs are socks and shirts although I'm well fixed for the present. Don't spend too much on these things as the parcel may be lost in transit. All my love—Jimmy."

WILLIAM E. A. REEDER, *Omega (Pennsylvania)*, '45, has procured a leave of absence from the University of Pennsylvania and enlisted in the Signal Corps of the Army of the United States.

Missing in action in the fight in the Solomons is Col. FRANK GEOTTGE, *Beta (Ohio)*, '20, veteran of the last war and once an aide to the commandant of the Marine Corps. Called one of the greatest bulldozing football players who ever lived, he was an outstanding back at Ohio State and later on the Quantico Marine team.

PANAMA CITY. . . . Lieut. ARCHIE CAMPBELL MILLER has reported for duty at the Army Air Forces Gunnery School at Tyndall Field, from Maxwell Field at Montgomery.

He is a resident of Indianapolis, where his mother, Mrs. Jessie Van Arsdale resides.

The lieutenant attended Butler University and Indiana Law School and is a member of *Beta Zeta Chapter* in the class of 1939.

Prior to his death he was cited by Wing Commander for "heroism and distinguished achievement in aerial flight in contact with the enemy. Through the Aleutian Islands campaign, Ensign Love, as a patrol plane second pilot demonstrated courage, zeal and willingness to meet the enemy in combat in extremely hazardous weather conditions. He participated in all night patrols and bombing attacks on enemy ships in Kiska Harbor, always in the face of heavy anti-aircraft fire." At that time he was recommended for the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Nominated for promotion to Rear Admiral recently by President Roosevelt was Captain DALLAS G. SUTTON, *Gamma Eta (George Washington)*, '06.

Capt. Sutton was born in Washington in 1883 and was graduated from George Washington University in 1906, being appointed as assistant surgeon in the Navy the following year. He was on duty at the Newport Naval Hospital until 1908, when he was assigned to brief sea duty before being stationed for a time at Annapolis.

Service on the U.S.S. *Indiana* and several other ships was interspersed by further brief assignments to the Naval Hospital at Annapolis and the Naval Medical School in Washington for Capt. Sutton until 1922, when he began a four-year tour of duty at the Naval Hospital at Great Lakes, Ill. After further brief sea trips he served a number of years in the Naval Hospitals in Washington, D. C., and Annapolis.

In 1936, Capt. Sutton was made assistant to the chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery. He was assigned to command the Naval Medical School in Washington in 1940. Last February he was transferred to command of the Naval Hospital at Norfolk.

Capt. Sutton was awarded the Mexican Service Medal for service on the U.S.S. *Birmingham* in 1914.

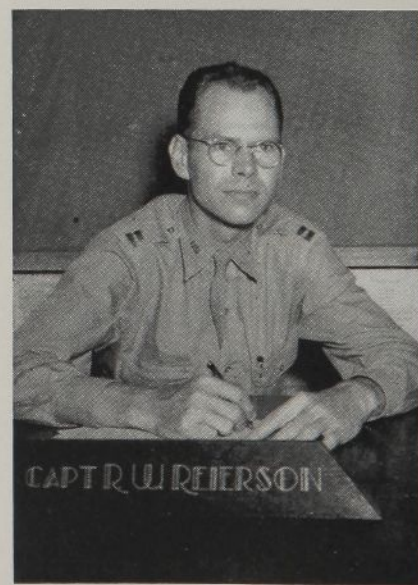

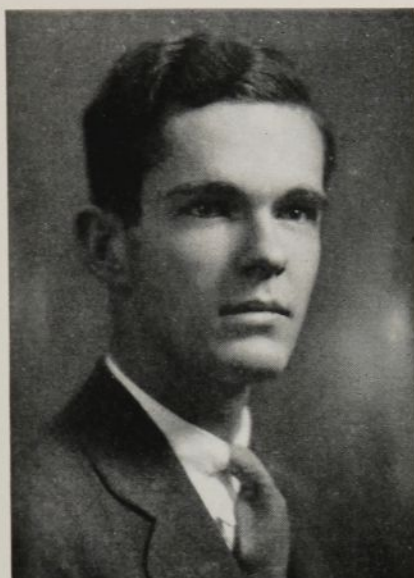

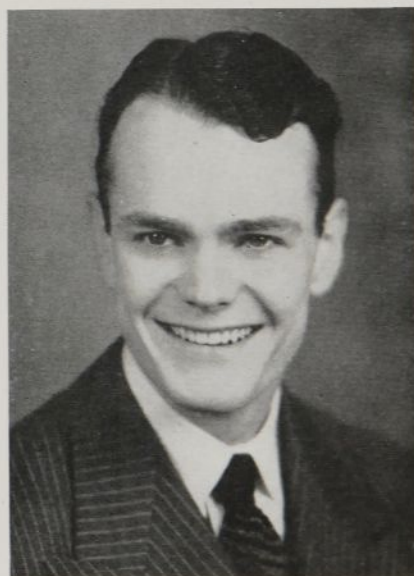

They went to Miami from Canton, Ohio, and both joined Delta Tau Delta. When Gaston was killed Clark expressed the wish, if he were to lose his life, to be buried beside his "buddy." They lie side by side in a Canton cemetery.

LIEUT. COL. HARRY E. GIBBS, *Zeta* (Western Reserve), '11, is corps provost marshal for the Fifth Corps Area and directs military police battalions. Under him a nucleus of a large staff of undercover men has been organized to investigate the backgrounds of workers in war plants in Cleveland and other industrial centers of the area. AROUND THE FIREPLACE

WITH GOOD DELTS

By DEAN NEWHOUSE

Dean of Men, University of Washington

Two years ago I stood on this platform on this occasion and looked at a roomful of boys—fellows who would assume responsibility, leadership, in perhaps two or three years. Today I'm looking at a roomful of men, fellows who assume responsibility, leadership, right now. You aren't any older than they were two years ago; you don't look any different from those boys, but you are old enough to enlist, old enough to fly bombing planes, old enough to endure hardship and pain, old enough to die for your country.

I think I know how you must be feeling as you come to college. Men like you are needed in the Army now. You know this, and here you sit in school with no uniform, no insignia of honor, no action—in a safe, civilian position, while your friends are enlisting, are fighting, are in the midst of the horror of battle. If you are doubting yourself, don't be ashamed—it would be impossible not to. Let me tell you this: You have a right to your position as a college student: only if you can study and work twelve hours a day; only if you are giving all you've got all the time to learn both in class, and out of class how to take responsibility, how to work with others, how to acquire knowledge; only if you are willing to go into service cheerfully and gladly when your government says it needs you more desperately for action today than it does for leadership tomorrow.

College is a different deal this year! If anyone of you is looking for play, for a chance to prolong his adolescence, I suggest that he look elsewhere than the University of Washington. Even a defense job which is an eight-hour shift with good wages attached would be a better bet. If you try being a play-boy here, this year, you will be due for a rude awakening at the end of the quarter. But, you won't last a quarter, because you won't be able to stand being a slacker.

It is possible that this is your last year in school. It may not be even a year. To men, it isn't a year to "eat, drink, and be merry." It is a year to prepare for the tough job ahead.

By all means consider joining a fraternity. It offers you that priceless thing—fellowship. It offers you an education you can't get from textbooks—training in leadership, in fellowship, in teamwork. Your fraternity brothers can assist you and you can assist them in training for the tasks ahead.

Fraternities no longer offer you parties and a round of gay times. Their social events will be simple and few. Busy men won't have the time and there won't be gas or tires available. Don't look forward to the traditional pledge sneaks in October—they are expressly prohibited.

You will find many fraternities under-manned for rushing. As never before you will need cool judgment and independence of thought as you make your selection. We expect you to make the choice of *men*, not boys, and to conduct yourselves during this week as men, not boys. Study those rushing rules in the back of your handbook. Be the *man* who refuses to break faith, who refuses to violate the self-imposed regulations of a democratic fraternity system. If you can't stand on your own feet now, if you can't play the game according to the rules, when will you learn?

The *man* doesn't gossip or spread ill report about any individual or group. Good fraternities don't slander their competitors. Don't aid and abet the bad ones to ruin the reputation of all fraternities at Washington by passing on what they say. Believe nothing and repeat nothing which is told you "in confidence."

Don't let appearances and reputations color your judgment. Clothes and fine furniture, cars and money, don't make a fraternity. Look at the men! Are they honest, sincere, friendly, considerate? Are they generous, tolerant, loyal, intelligent? In short, are they men? Remember when you judge you are promising to be *a brother*.

Those of us who have done it know that you can make a college year of hard work more fun than any irresponsible play and half-effort can ever be. Twelve hours a day of work is fun if your heart is in it and if you have the fellowship of other men who are working hard. This can be the best year of your life if you will make it so. Your only right to college, to fraternity, is yet to be earned by the courage and stamina and persistence necessary to hard, sustained effort. The fun, the fellowship, the joy in achievement, will be the immediate reward. Outstanding service to your fellow men will be the ultimate result.

To the *men* among you I offer my salute—more power to you!

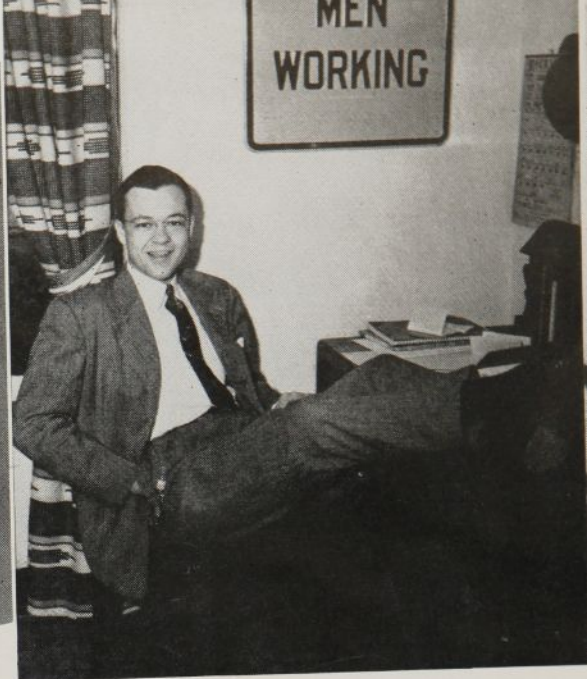
For local news, Dick Schriber, Wabash '31, has recently been appointed Chief of Police at Bellfonte, Delaware, a suburb of Wilmington.

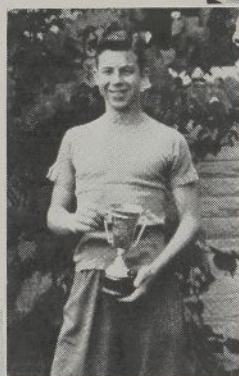

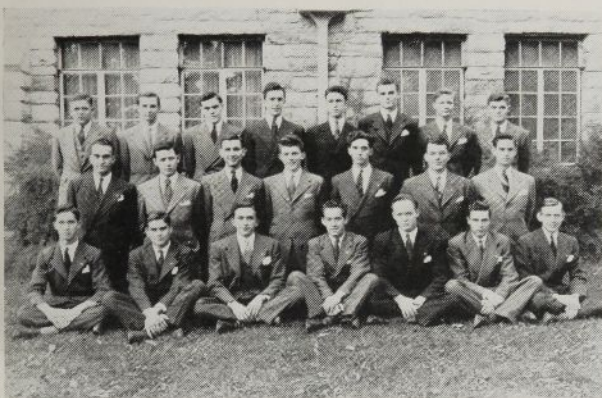

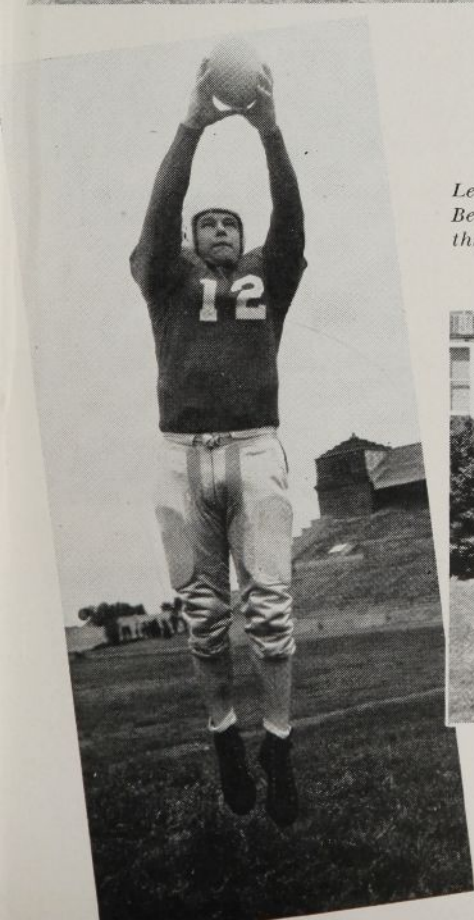

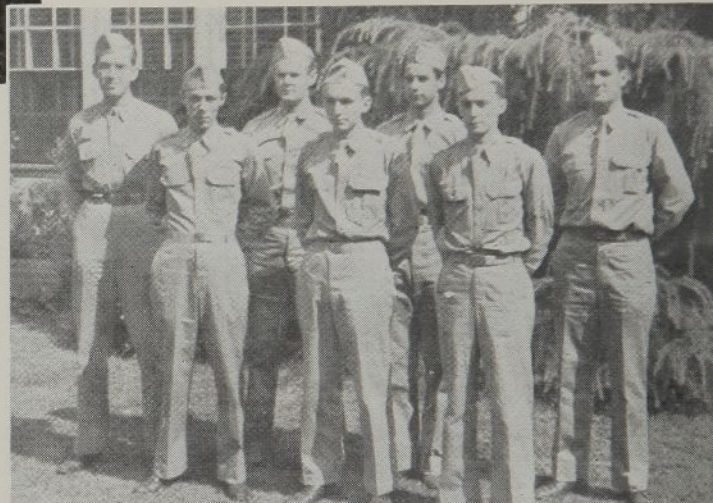

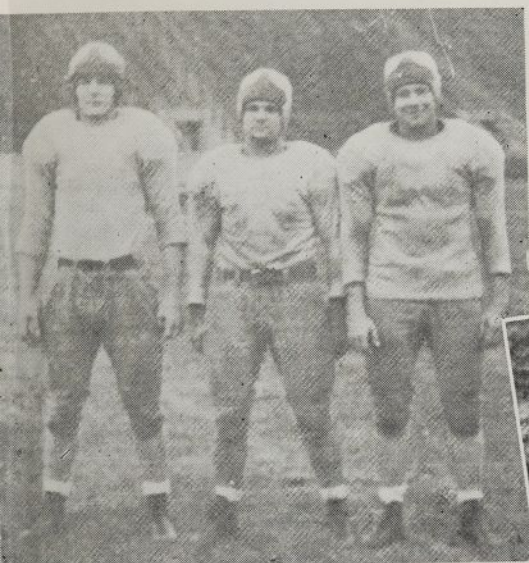

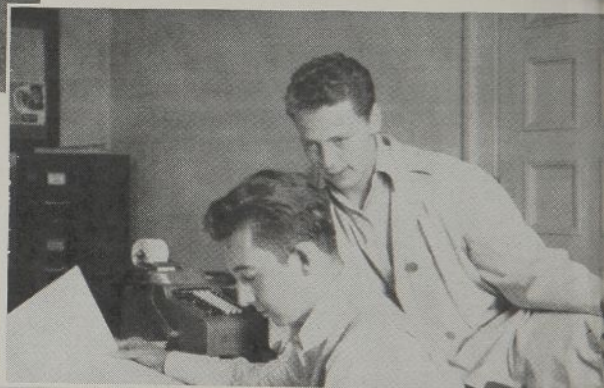

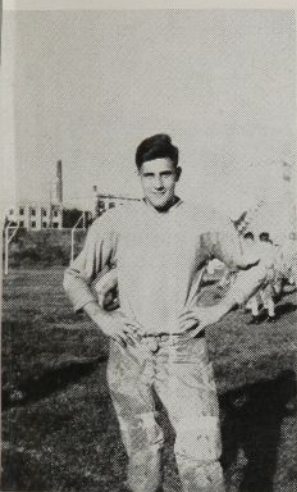

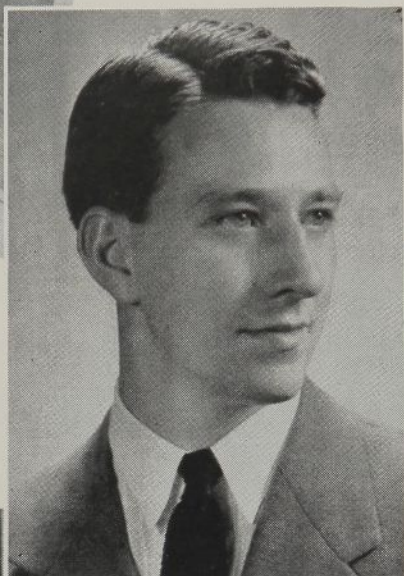
