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

Eighty-Five Years

A CENTURY ago, 1844, Delta Tau Delta had not reached the formative or even the imaginative stage of its inception. The best information tells us that the eight men who later became the founders ranged in age from three to ten years in 1844. If these eight men were with us today all would be over the century mark in birthdays and we venture that they would have no feeling of surprise in reviewing the development of Delta Tau Delta through its first eighty-five years.

Richard H. Alfred, Henry K. Bell, William R. Cunningham, Alexander C. Earle, John L. N. Hunt, John C. Johnson, Jacob S. Lowe, and Eugene Tarr, the men who gave Delta Tau Delta its birth in 1859, had the conviction that upon the cornerstone of friendship could develop a bond that would inspire men to do better. To say, then, that these men would today be surprised would not be true. Pride would be a truth, both in the development to 1944 and in the attitude of undergraduate and alumni members ever to be looking for new opportunities to expand the meaning of Delta Tau Delta's cornerstone-friendship.

Our Fraternity is just fifteen short years from its Centennial. The century milestone for The Rainbow Fraternity, which joined with Delta Tau Delta in 1886, is only one college generation ahead, 1948. The eighty-fourth and eightyfifth years of the Fraternity's growth have experienced the fourth war of its life span. The eighty-sixth year will not escape war. Beyond that we can only hope—hope that the time can be shortened to the return of peace and the acceptance of the challenge and the opportunity for every one of us who by the common bond of choice and preference make up the Delta Tau Delta of 1944.

The impact of World War II is noticeable in all phases of Frater-

nity operation. Undergraduate life, which serves as the source of growth numerically, has been substantially reduced. Realistic thinking anticipates that this reduction will increase in the closing months of the 1943-44 college year.

Two-thirds of the physical properties of the Fraternity are being converted to use in the war effort. That these properties are useful is a welcomed contribution. That they are essential to the development and expansion of Delta Tau Delta's cornerstone—friendship—is not true in any proportion to some modern thinking that the intangible cannot be measured. Characteristically, Delta Tau Delta carries on, each chapter adjusting itself to meet the ever-changing campus sit-

uation. The fact that Delta Tau Delta at its source, undergraduate life, may reach one fifth of a prewar year during 1943-44—the fact that the fraction may become smaller before it becomes larger—only places a temporary retarding at the source. The growth of Delta Tau Delta within its existing numerical boundaries has tremendously increased during the past year.

Membership in Delta Tau Delta is not for a day. Those true words have become real to thousands of Delts in World War II. At no time in the history of the Fraternity have so many members simultaneously found identification of some of the intangibles of membership.

During the 1942-43 college year and continuing in the current year, thousands, yes thousands, of expressions have come voluntarily from Delts at home and away from home acknowledging appreciation for having realized the benefits inculcated through The Delta Creed—proof that Delta Tau Delta has contributed to the education of its members and has served as a guiding influence toward inspiration in maturity.

Friendship is, in these war years,

reaching out to serve in every corner of the world. What the common bond can do to remove the sting of loneliness is reported from the training camps in America to the jungles of the South Pacific: from China, India, Africa, England, Iceland, Alaska, and it is reported as a most enlightening experience. It brings a spontaneous evaluation of Delta Tau Delta's true foundation and pushes into the background the superfluous surface considerations of material values at which modern thinking has so often stopped. The real good in fraternity is the tangible experience of thousands every day.

Delta Tau Delta will strengthen the peace that is to come. The growth of the Fraternity during this century has followed a pattern of progressive expansion of service. Necessarily and logically much of the service is directed at the source, undergraduate life. It is at this point that the appreciation of fraternity begins to unfold. Both understanding and appreciation continue through the life span in proportion to the member's contribution to fraternity as it is defined by Delta Tau Delta.

Let's review briefly some of the important milestones in Delta Tau Delta's progress during the past forty years. The real inspiration dates back to the original group of 1859 and it must be recognized that if this were not true the succeeding generations would not have sought to expand and cultivate a widened scope of service within the Fraternity. This inspiration permeated a loyal membership and conscience demanded development step by step which would assure a sound future and enable Delta Tau Delta to contribute with, for, and through its members to the greater development of meaning in the word fra-

Incorporation took place in 1911 and about the same time a national headquarters, which in Delta Tau Delta is known as the Central Office, was established. An important purpose of this step was to begin the expanded service to the undergraduate chapters, the alumni chapters, and the general membership.

The beginning of the firm foundation for future strength came in the early twenties with the establishment of Delta Tau Delta's three service funds: the Loyalty Fund, the Scholarship Fund, the Undergraduate Loan Fund. The Scholarship and Undergraduate Loan Funds were created from the residue of the estates of two of the Fraternity's loyal members, James B. Curtis, Beta Zeta (Butler), '8o, and Frank F. Rogers, Beta Rho (Stanford), '99. The expansion of these two funds and the establishment and expansion of the Lovalty Fund provide one of the grandest views of the Fraternity's growth toward a sound future—a view which does not limit development to a few inspired members but expands to include every initiate since January 1, 1926, and many, many pre-1926 initiates who voluntarily sought participation in the building of the Fraternity's future services.

Nearly 15,000 Delts have to date participated in the Loyalty Fund. By the close of the Fraternity's eighty-sixth year over one third of the total participants will have become Loyalty Fund Life Members through completion of their endowment participation program. The others will range up to 97 per cent complete, and each number of THE RAINBOW records many of these currently completing their Life Membership contributions, giving them THE RAINBOW for life and removing any assessment of dues or fees which still remains the obligation of pre-1926 initiates who have not participated in the Fraternity's en-

The three service funds, the Loyalty Fund, the Scholarship Fund, and the Undergraduate Loan Fund, are intact. This fact assumes added importance when we reflect that since their inception the funds have been guided through a depression and are now in the third year of World War II.

The Arch Chapters, and specifically the Boards of Directors,

elected at the Karneas have successively and consistently adhered to the basic principle that endowment and the other service funds established on a restricted basis must be held intact. The continuation of such a sound policy will only hasten the day when the ultimate benefits of such service funds will become fact. Every Delt, whether he is a participant in the growth of the funds or not, is proud of such stewardship.

The investment of any of the Fraternity's funds is limited to chapter house properties and U. S. government securities. One of the ultimate aims of the Loyalty Fund is ability to meet the monetary requirements of all chapter house associations at lower interest rates than are available elsewhere. The fund through these first eighteen years of its existence has proved a definite aid by enabling many chapters to be housed adequately when assistance could not be obtained elsewhere and through the thousands of dollars saved in interest payments. Even though the fund has not yet reached the size necessary to service all chapter house associations, the experience to date proves the wisdom of the aim and purpose in the establishment of the endowment and has contributed considerably to the present sound status of the over-all picture of Delta Tau Delta chapter real es-

The income from the Loyalty Fund is available to expand the services of the Fraternity and for the development of new programs, all directed at the bringing home to the initiate educational development which is Delta Tau Delta's commitment in The Delta Creed. Simple arithmetic tells us that an endowment must reach considerable size to provide income sufficient to meet servicing requirements of seventy-four undergraduate chapters, three thousand undergraduates, seventy alumni chapters, and thirty-odd thousand alumni, without the augmented income from dues and fees from the membership. The figures show, however, that there is a definite protection in times like the present where the source of normal income has been so drastically affected, even though the endowment has but started toward maturity. In tightening the belt at times when normal operations are retarded, Delts have assurance that the programs inaugurated prior to an emergency need only to be placed in serviced inactivity. This offers protection against dismantling and, therefore, eliminates retarded recovery on a basis which would be costly.

The many letters received from Delts around the world during the Fraternity's eighty-fifth year aptly sum up the manifest meaning of The Delta Creed. One young Delt expresses appreciation for the material values of undergraduate life—The Delt Development Program—the experience of leadership—the opportunity to be educated in democratic reasoning—the spiritual development exercised in our beautiful Ritual. He closes: "Delta Tau Delta is definitely one of the things

I am fighting for."

Let us adopt "Constant Alert" as our guide for Delta Tau Delta's eighty-sixth year. The challenge of strife combines with the opportunity of peace for each one of us to be alert constantly to our individual place in the important position which Delta Tau Delta will assume in strengthening the peace through its cornerstone - friendship. The eighty-five years manifest every dream of our founders. The eightysixth year gives each of us a definite wartime assignment. Pray that the eighty-seventh year will bring to us those who God wills shall return, and together, all of us, shall ever retain a consciousness of our obligation to strengthen the Fraternity's cornerstone with the determination which will be true homage to those Delts who gave "their last full measure of devotion."

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
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
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
