EARTHQUAKE BUCKLES STANFORD'S DELT HOUSE

THE OCTOBER 17 San Francisco Bay Area Earthquake took a devastating toll on the Stanford Delt house, buckling the walls and reducing the chimney to a stack of rubble. The University condemned the building and evacuated the members, who have taken up residency in nearby apartments. The house is owned by Stanford University.

Two days after the 7.1 Richter shock, the members were allowed to enter the house one person at a time to remove their personal articles. The living room end of the house was hanging together precariously. Security officials kept all persons out for fear that a small aftershock would bring the structure down. Chapter President Chuck Gillingham is maintaining the chapter continuity through regular meetings



and other communications with members and alumni.

Stanford is self-insured for earthquakes, and thus must assess the damages on campus before determining its priorities for construction and repairs. The Phi Psi house was the only other fraternity structure condemned after the tremor.

The Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation has expressed interest in advancing a loan to accelerate the Beta Rho Chapter reconstruction priority. However, nothing more can be done until the extent of damages is determined and if, in fact, the house can be repaired or if it must be demolished.

Beta Omega Chapter at Berkeley and the entire Greek Community on that campus had no noticeable damage.

Book for Skeptics


So You Think You're Not Religious? A Thinking Person's Guide to the Church. By James R. Adams. Cowley Publications, 980 Memorial Drive, Cambridge, MA 02138.

James R. Adams, *Nebraska and George Washington* '55, has produced a book for skeptical people who sometimes think wistfully about religion or the church, especially at time of transitions such as marriages, births, and deaths.

The Rev. Mr. Adams wrote his second book "So You Think You're Not Religious" while on sabbatical leave from St. Mark's Episcopal Church on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C. He has served as rector there for 23 years.

The premise of the book is that many people stay away from church because they cannot honestly believe all its precepts. Virgin birth, resurrection of the dead, and miracles act as impediments to the skeptical, the author contends. But his message is that there is a way to "believe" that will not force these persons to check their intellects at the door.

Adventures in Art

AFTER JOINING Delta Tau Delta at Bowling Green in 1980, Neil Walsh served as the chapter's public relations chairman and as publicity chairman for the IFC. He also began putting his ability as a cartoonist to use on the school newspaper and other publications. In addition, he created cartoons and designs for T-shirts and specialty items for a T-shirt shop. Many of his designs were for fraternity and sorority items.

Meanwhile, he entertained the brothers of Delta Tau Chapter with his artistic sense of humor. Each year, he created an elaborate wall mural for the chapter's annual Hawaiian Christmas party.

As founder and president of Walsh Production at Solon, Ohio, near Cleveland, Mr. Walsh today produces cartoons and animated cartoon logos for businesses, associations, institutions, children's book publishers, newsletters, and magazines.

Yet, when he was using his talents as an undergraduate, he never seriously considered cartooning as an occupation. "It is ironic," he recalls, "but I had to beg for a 'C' in the only art class I took at BG."

Fortunately, the young cartoonist didn't have to beg for good grades in courses within his major, advertising. To the contrary, he was one of 15 students in the BSGU Ad Club who won the district title of the 1985 National Student Advertising competition for an ad campaign developed for Burger King.

After graduating that year with a B.S. in marketing, Mr. Walsh entered the competitive advertising field. His professional career led to opportunities in which his cartoons became marketable. As an account executive with OAS Communications in Kent, Ohio, he created cartoons for several clients' print advertisements, including the Federal Aviation Administration. He also subcontracted work for other advertising agencies.

In January 1987, Mr. Walsh became marketing specialist with Ecocenters Corporation of Cleveland, the largest Xerox cut sheet laser print service bureau in the Midwest. His work at Ecocenters began opening even more doors.

Most of his cartooning was done for enjoyment, but when clients at Ecocenters began inquiring about his cartoons, he realized there was "an untapped market out there," so in June of 1988, he founded Walsh Productions.

Walsh Productions is a graphics house specializing in creating animated cartoon logos for an organization's identity, product, or service. "Once I made the decision to turn my pastime into a career, I started observing the market trends and needs of companies and determined that animated logos are my niche in the marketplace," he says. "An animated logo has many advantages over the traditional inanimate logo. It can be customized, or depicted in various positions and situations relevant to a client's industry, product, or service. For instance, the logo can appear in

one position with the company's name and then used in different positions in audiovisual, print, and broadcast media. The key to an animated logo's success is flexibility."

Mr. Walsh's most recent, and what he considers "perhaps the most exciting" venture is collaborating with his sister, Judy Blatnik, a Cleveland school teacher and Bowling Green alumnus, on a children's book, which he hopes will lead to others.

In May, Mr. Walsh married another Bowling Green graduate, Diane Yacobucci. They live in the Cleveland suburb of Warrensville Heights.

I

am a househusband. I didn't start out to be one, but then I didn't know I would marry a career woman in the exciting and profitable field of healthcare. They can yell real loud, too. I've tried yelling back, but after a while my throat starts hurting. Babies can yell louder and longer than you can. I guess they learned how to do that when they were raised by wolves in the forest in the early days. I'm sure they woke up the neighbor wolves at night even then. Whistling at babies

be occurring in that Division. Of greater use therefore is this Index B which shows less variability because it is a measure of the performance of each chapter against its local campus all-men's average.

It is clear that the Southern Division has shot to the top academically. Although the Southern Division seems to have consolidated the gains made in the previous year, its displacement of the Eastern Division as the perennial leader in academics last year is largely due to a major decline in academic standing by some of the chapters in the East. The Western Division has climbed from its perennial position in the basement to second spot, making some strong improvements as well. The Northern Division remains in third place.

Schools in the Eastern Division generally have suffered, and Delt chapters have been pulled down or along with their systems. On the other hand, the gain made by the Southern Division is reflective of the general improvement in academics on those Southern campuses. More concerning is the fact that the Northern Division is actually slipping a bit while the schools in the North show marginal improvement. Most noteworthy is the fact that the Western Division has risen in the Fraternity's rankings while our host institutions in the West remain relatively stable. In other words, although the most obvious


change in the rankings involved the Southern and Eastern Division, the most significant "real" gains in scholastics were in and by the chapters of the Western Division.

Congratulations to the South and the West!

verage Index B score on the left, gives some notion of whether that grade index might go up or down over the next few years. This notion is based on the assumption that a significant effort to improve a chapter's academic program will result in a higher chapter GPA in subsequent years.



Two years ago, approximately 79 of our 122 chapters (65%) operated at or above the all-men's average on their respective campuses. Last year only 62% of our chapters operated at or above the all-men's average. However, only six chapters lost 20% or more of their pledges due to scholarship, or rather, the lack thereof. We must redouble our efforts to program our chapters as beneficial adjuncts to higher education if Dr. John Venable's (my predecessor's) dream of 80% achievement is to be realized. (In the spring *Rainbow* I will report on our new program, Academic Alert, which will assist us in this ambitious endeavor.)

Dr. Venable's basic challenge was simple: improve, do better, meet your potential, increase your chapter's standing, be Delt scholars. With this emphasis on self-improvement in mind we created *The John H. Venable Award for Most Improved Academic Affairs* to be given to a chapter when one demonstrates significant improvement in its academic programming and standing as reflected in its Annual Report. This year I was pleased to present the first such award to Beta Psi (Wabash). Congratulations.

CUMULATIVE GIVING

works better than yelling to quiet them down. They can't figure it out.

Kids are very demanding. They expect to be fed THREE TIMES every single day! They will sit and cry by the refrigerator (where all food comes from) until you feed them. Cathy thinks nothing of waking me up from my afternoon nap by pulling my beard and yelling, "I want some JUICE and I want it NOW!"

Being a first child, Cathy was used to having things her own way. She had an extensive bedtime routine — she would drink a cup of milk, a cup of orange juice, and a cup of apple juice. I would hold her in the rocking chair and read her the classic bedtime book *Goodnight Moon*, then sing a selection of the only children's songs I knew the words to, usually "Yellow Submarine," "My Generation," "Tutti Frutti," or something from REM. I didn't know many children's songs then. This would take 30 minutes, then I would gently tuck her in the crib and she would cry real loud for 20 minutes until she fell asleep exhausted. This was real quality time.

With our third daughter, Janet, we usually give her a kiss and she climbs in the crib all by herself because her sisters taught her how, and she goes right to sleep in about 10 minutes. She has to fit into the family's routine. I'm not sure what we would do if she expected us to take an hour every night to put her to bed.

I have also discovered that kids don't play with toys; they play with YOUR toys — a VCR is a good place to store marbles, and cassette tapes are fun to unwind. They make great Christmas tree tinsel. The toys they get for Christmas wind up sitting around because whatever you are playing with must be more fun. It's hard to get much work done if you are a househusband. If you haven't had to call the pediatrician or go to the emergency room, you've probably had a good day.

My wife, Claudia, says you are not a

parent until you've been thrown up on, and since kids don't give you a lot of warning when they get sick, I've been thrown up on a lot. After a while you expect it and it doesn't bother you so much, but I haven't decided which is worse: to have a sick child or to be sick yourself and have them jump on you and wonder why you won't play. If your child is sick, you usually don't get a good night's sleep and you have to go to the pediatrician's office and sit around a bunch of sick kids. Good thing kids tend to get well remarkably fast.

Respect for Teachers

I had the opportunity to work with one-and-a-half-year-olds at a church program for a while. It was a real experience changing other people's kids' diapers. I went to a teacher's workshop with 250 other preschool teachers. I was the only man there. I wondered what all the other men in the world were doing, since they skipped the workshop — probably changing the oil in their cars or making a living operating heavy machinery.

It was their loss. I learned that teaching preschool was a real art and a science, and I have a lot of respect for anybody with enough energy to teach kids under seven years old. I have also learned how much kindergarten registration is like fraternity rush. There are a certain number of places to fill, and everyone wants to get in the kindergarten with the best reputation. So there is pressure to fill the classes and a lot of people are upset if their kids don't get in. It's awfully early in life to learn about rejection.

I've seen "Three Men and a Baby," "Mr. Mom," and "Baby Boom," and they were all real funny, but I think they missed the point. I don't think a father staying home with the kids is

anything special, although people tell me it is all the time. I do seem to have a talent for relating to kids and seeing things in a new way, as they might see them, and I have a good sense of humor and a lot of patience. You need all of that to raise kids, but I don't feel I do anything that anybody else couldn't do with a little practice.

Changing a diaper isn't too hard after the first hundred or so — the hard part is changing a *life*. You have to have some goals and a clear view of what you would like your sons or daughters to grow into, and work backward from there. Given that perspective, cleaning milk off the floor isn't so bad. If you are creative, it can be fun. When my six and four-year-olds are fighting about which California Raisin's song to play, I announce a "Mad Face Contest" and the winner gets an all-expense paid trip to her room! I can make a madder face than either of them and I win and they cheer up (for a few minutes). You have to accept small victories.

And every once in a while I learn something from those daughters. Carefree Diane, the four-year-old I haven't mentioned yet, skips everywhere she goes. One morning she skipped in and I yelled at her for leaving puzzles all over the floor. She said, "I'm sorry," picked them up and skipped back out, just as happy as before. I wish I had as few worries as she has.

So that's a glimpse of what a house-husband does. It can be as rewarding as you make it (but what can't?). I haven't mentioned the joys of carpooling or going shopping with three kids throwing candy bars in your cart. And I forgot to say that I get more love and hugs and kisses every night than I got in four years of college. But I do have a final tip for you college guys: My daughters already know what they want to be when they grow up — MARRIED!!

Training Advisers' Advisers


detailing all phases of division VP responsibilities and chapter operations.



Being Under Attack Is Nothing New

M

ost of us are well aware that a new and strong anti-fraternity movement has suddenly arisen in the USA, led by prestigious members of the academic community, movement which aims not to reform fraternities for men and women, but to eliminate them altogether. It has had some successes in northeastern colleges, and seems to be picking up speed rather than subsiding.

How serious and unusual is this movement? How large a sector of society supports it? Are their stated reasons for fraternity abolition modern and convincing? The measuring sticks by which we can see the answers to these questions lies in past experience, that is in fraternity history. Let's take a brief look.

How serious and unusual?

The major anti-fraternity movements in America history are seven in number, as follows:

1. *The Anti-Masonic Crusade, 1796–1873.*

It was an attack both religious and political in nature, reaching a climax in 1830–1850. By destroying Phi Beta Kappa as a *social* fraternity it led to the rise of the Union Triad fraternities, and the system of today.

2. *The private college effort to abolish fraternities in 1857–77.*
It succeeded on many campuses, with Princeton the prime example. It also produced the first anti-fraternity legal decision (*Wheaton v. Illinois*, 1867), the Ivy League anti-fraternity mentality, and the resort to *sub rosa* chapters by the fraternities themselves.

3. *The Progressive Era legislative attack, 1897–1916.*

At this time farmer political parties sought laws in agricultural states to abolish fraternities in *public* universities as punishment for their alleged undemocratic practices and snobbish spirit. Such laws were passed in South Carolina, Arkansas and Mississippi though failing in Texas, Wisconsin, Ohio, Indiana, Missouri, Kansas, and other states. This caused George Banta (Phi Delta Theta) to express a widely held Greek feeling that "the large university is less and less going to be the home of the fraternity." Only World War I killed the movement.

4. *The Guerilla Journalistic warfare of the 1920's and 1930's.*
This was led by liberal journals of the time, notable the *Nation* and *New Republic*. It was the first attack on fraternities by liberal rather than conservative groups, and it found its most attentive audience in the small, elite colleges of the northeast. It sought to fight fraternities not by government laws or college regulations, as previously, but by ideological "education"

aimed at persuading students themselves to abstain from fraternity contact or membership. This new technique has been with us ever since.

5. *The anti-discrimination membership crusade, 1945 to about 1970.*

This attack came as a complete surprise to most post-war fraternities. It differed from the attacks of the twenties and thirties upon the whole fraternity idea, by instead concentrating upon a single aspect of the fraternity idea, where ideological warfare and political legislation could be combined. Many of us



remember how successful the attack was, and how unprepared we were for it.

6. *Between 1965 and 1980 the anti-Greek movement shifted its point for attack from race to radical political reform and freedom for the drug culture.*

It was no longer by mainline journalists nor supported by faculties, but by radical political elements. It now attacked college faculties and administrators even more than it did fraternities. And it introduced a new tactic for the first time, namely, focusing its attacks directly upon undergraduate chapters and

individual members, and simply ignoring national organizations altogether.

7. By the end of the Seventies, radical political action was dead. In the Eighties we have seen the latest anti-fraternity crusade take shape. It is led by faculty/administration strategists, who have picked up the New Left tactic of ignoring national organizations. Its weapons are ideological, though willing to resort to faculty legislations on occasion when it deems there is "public demand" for this. It has "converted" fraternity members to anti-fraternity beliefs in a way last experienced over 150 years ago.

If you will reflect upon the number of these "crusades," and their persistence, you will realize that in reality anti-fraternity movements have been continuous throughout our entire history. In other words, they are a normal fact of fraternity life. We have survived by our ability to come up with clever but sound defense strategies, responses which the general public found more convincing than charges made by our enemies. We have survived by our own efforts; no good fairy is responsible. While the style of attacks may change somewhat, we have been, and probably always will be under constant assault. So there's no reason to panic.

How large a percent of society is actively opposed to us?

In a word, while we Greeks are indeed a small percent of society, our active opponents are small also. The vast majority of Americans have no deep feeling either way. Here are the main groups which have always opposed us:

1. *Conservative religious groups.*
This cuts across denominational lines. Among Protestants, it is the more fundamentalist sects, and conservative wings in liberal denominations, which have consistently attacked fraternities. Among Catholics, only the liberal orders and colleges have permitted any fraternity development. Among Jews it is the Orthodox, Conservative and Hasidic groups which have strongly opposed fraternities; the Reform Jews have supported both Jewish and Gentile fraternities.
2. *University professors, administrators and secondary school educators.*
Professional educators have been traditionally hostile, and faculties have furnished most of the article-writing critics. Progressive educators, military schools and high school staffs have all desired to abolish fraternities.

3. *Democratic or liberal political reformers.*

Doctrinaire liberals, and their journals of opinion have usually assaulted fraternities as juvenile and conservative in spirit, and excessively satisfied with the status quo. Again, these tend to cut across Democratic and Republican lines. Communists and Socialists, while opposing us, have paid little attention to us.

4. *Wealthy Eastern aristocrats.*

Oddly enough, these have usually opposed fraternities as plebeian and crude. Aristocracy-supported colleges like Harvard, Yale, and Princeton have proved tough nuts for the fraternities to crack. Aristocrats in the USA have for more than a century preferred the small, local, English-type social club to the large, national, idealistic fraternity melting pot and social ladder.

Incidentally, farmers and laboring men have shown little interest in fraternities, except to find attractive the idea that their sons and daughters may go to college and join such socially advantaged groups. Unless excluded, they tend to be favorable.

Notice: all these groups combined cannot have ever amounted to more than two or three percent of the total population. They do not outnumber the pro-Greeks to any significant extent, if at all. Each must appeal to the 95% undecided, in order to enforce its views on the others.

What have been the major anti-fraternity arguments, over 200 years?

1. *Fear of secrecy*, as a cloak for immoral teachings and practices.
2. *Fear of aristocracy and snobbery*, with the system pictured as being undemocratic, class conscious, favorable to wealth and tending toward the exclusive social club. This argument lent itself better to political reformers than the secrecy-morality argument, which was essentially religious.
3. *Fear of anti-intellectualism* in colleges dedicated to training and improving the minds of students. It was at first expressed in a strong preference for literary societies or departmental clubs, and later in criticism of low scholastic performance compared to non-fraternity students. Fraternity scholarship programs arose to counter these changes. Fraternity hazing, social partying, and rah-rah athleticism were other expressions of faculty belief that fraternities were juvenile, and arrested maturation. It was primarily a campus argument, though it attracted a good deal of short-lived public interest.

4. *Fear of divisive effects upon the college community.*

Fraternities were accused of destroying loyalty to college classes, and challenging the legitimate final authority of college authorities which came from the right of the institution to act *in loco parentis* under the Anglo-American legal tradition. All student organizations of a national character were regarded with suspicion. This was almost exclusively a college argument, with the general public little interested.

While there have been new fraternity problems such as drug abuse, and perhaps greater sex freedom, there have been no new anti-fraternity arguments. Today we deal with traditional arguments and attitudes in contemporary anti-fraternity activity, a continuing pattern, with only minor changes based on current issues which are new.

The Present Negative Faculty Image

To begin with, the current faculty image of fraternities is merely the sum of our publicized abuses. It shows no awareness of positive fraternity virtues whatsoever. The justification for this image is that the fraternity system has been tried in the court of journalistic and public opinion, and found guilty, therefore, nothing remains but to determine how to get rid of us.

The Williams article which is the first, best, and most cited statement of the new anti-fraternity crusade, is extremely interesting as an illustration of this. It says only that faculty and student "uneasiness" about fraternities caused the College to act against them. No anti-fraternity arguments are developed. It alludes to "too much time spent on fraternity problems," an excessive role for fraternities in undergraduate life, that fraternities are not helpful to the "quality of education" at Williams, and that since the College is now taking over fraternity housing, eating and social facilities, fraternities have no other activities or services of educational value.

*With the fraternities out of the way, Williams will apparently go back to classes as the basic student organizational units, and the College will provide the sole and truly excellent education for all undergraduates. What this amounts to is a leap back to the 1820's, when there were no fraternities and the College officers ran everything. A strange form of educational progress!

The fact that the faculty image is really nothing but a kaleidoscope of date rape, drunkenness, brutal hazing, drugs, and scholastic ignorance by Greek undergraduates (while no tribute to the faculty) does suggest that we fraternity leaders have expended much too large an

amount of our time bewailing chapter abuses and apologizing for deficiencies. We have *not* stressed the strong positive case for the American college fraternity system which faculty members seem not to be aware of. *This must change.*

Let me point out, that, of course we must deal with negatives when charged with some social crime or other. But in between attacks we should be industriously making the positive case for ourselves, where faculties read and absorb it. Favorable arguments are not very effective when offered in the midst of a hazing or drug scandal.

The unspoken faculty image has to be deduced. It is an extremely thin, watered-down version of the traditional arguments of our foes — we are immoral, we discriminate (sex), we are anti-intellectual (because the college authorities say so), and we break up class loyalty in the college. Yet the fraternities which rebutted all these charges in the preceding century now let faculties get away with it!

Why do faculties swallow this indictment more easily today than they did previously? In my opinion, it is because of the dwindling of our 100-year old Greek Faculty insurance policy. Let me explain this. For a century there has been a large Greek alumni component in every reasonably good college faculty — from 20 to 40 percent — which battled against anti-fraternity proposals with courage and skill. Numbers gave them a certain safety, and they knew how to convince their colleagues much better than do non-faculty alumni. They were our very effective first link of defense, and only a small percent of charges got through their shield.

But the explosion of higher education has reduced this faculty shield from 20–40 percent to 5–10 percent in a very short time. Partly this is because undergraduate Greek chapters were pledging a majority of business majors instead of interdisciplinary cross sectional balance, as formerly. When the percentage of Greek faculty falls to 10 percent or below, it loses its sense of security in defending fraternities, and begins keeping its mouth shut. So our faculty insurance policy has lapsed and national representatives plus non-faculty alums have to pinch hit constantly. It is very hard for them, and they strike out a good deal.

Can we replace the faculty insurance component? Not quickly, if at all, for we now graduate too few future faculty members. Instead we will have to persuade faculty members by educating them about our advantages and potential usefulness, thus making it easier for our reduced Greek faculty population to go to bat for us more safely. Since the present crusade is faculty-based, I see no other answer.

Changing the Faculty Image; What is to be Done?

To rebuild our faculty line of defense, we don't need to convert everybody. We need only to feed positive facts into faculty information channels, so that the majority of faculty become interested in the question of our education value. Now all faculties take pride in representing both sides of every controversial issue, and will argue violently over any issue except those which they deem unimportant and know little about. Hence, the need for us to bring the pro-fraternity case before them in an interesting way. Once interested, our faculty line of defense will begin to function again.

By what means do we bring the positive side of fraternities strongly before the faculty consciousness? By a combination of devices which include an undergraduate as well as an alumnus level. Even the best possible alumni effort will be nullified if fraternity chapters on a given campus behave in the irresponsible, negative fashion all too familiar to us at Franklin and Marshall and elsewhere. The two levels must reflect a common commitment to the positive goals of fraternity in most of what they say and do: otherwise the undergraduates undercut the alumni effort. If these levers are "in synch," writing and a place for official Greek positions in issues, a voice which we now lack totally and have badly missed. In fact it is one of the few fraternity responses for which our faculty opponents are quite unprepared, and which they think us incapable of conducting on a level of seriousness and high academic quality.

The Year That Was In

IT IS a pleasure to present my first annual report for *The Rainbow* on the academic status of Delta Tau Delta. The 1988 school year saw a number of changes in chapter rankings and 1989 saw the introduction of a number of new initiatives in academic programming.

This article is a companion to the 1988 *Academic Annual Report* sent to all chapters and Fraternity officers early in September. That document was comprised of three sections. The first section covered Division comparative data on academic achievement which will be highlighted below. The second section reported a 21-point program which I introduced early this year as a foundation for our academic programming in the next couple of years (on which I will report progress at a later date). The third section reported individual chapter rankings and scores.


My report on Division academic data is really a statistical summary of undergraduate chapter Annual Reports, Section A. To those of us over 21, the undergraduate Annual Report is the revised and now constitutionally mandatory version of the former Hugh Shields Self-Evaluation. This change was aimed at developing this form as a planning tool for undergraduate chapters, the first attempt at which has been made with

the section dealing with academics. The feedback on these reports is now the responsibility of Division vice-presidents — the pillars of our volunteer ranks.

average as compared to the campus all-men's average. The remaining 50% depends upon a measure of pledge attrition and initiation, standards; the quality of a chapter's aca-

Chapters are ranked academically within their Divisions. Summary scores and various indices are calculated and reported. One of these indices — "Index B" as referred to in Figure 1 — measures chapter performance against local all-men's averages, and is scaled to account for the varying competitiveness of academic environments.

The overall ranking model places a 50% emphasis on chapter grade-point

academic program as assessed from the qualitative portions of Section A of the Annual Report; and honors achieved by individual chapter members.

Chapters are ranked into four groups: *Flagships*, *Ship-of-the-Line*, *Frigates*, and those *In Dry Dock*. These names continue to be popular, and easily recognized, summary statements of what otherwise is too complex an analysis of academic performance for popular consumption. The mathematical analysis, however, continues to provide a relatively unbiased approach to determining rank and a better means of comparing performance year after year.

Table I summarizes the academic performance of chapters collectively over the last three reporting years. The high variability in the grade point averages reported across a Division obscures any improvement that might

PRO FOOTBALL

Four Deltas are active as regulars in the pro ranks this fall. In his seventh year as the Denver Broncos quarterback is JOHN ELWAY, *Stanford '83*, who is seeking to tie an NFL record of five consecutive seasons with more than 3,000 passing yards. He has been named Denver's Most Valuable Offensive Player the last four seasons. A resident of Aurora, Colorado, John started the Elway Foundation in 1988, a non-profit organization to help Colorado residents whose needs are not met by traditional state agencies. Going into this season, John has thrown for 18,144 career yards and 102 touchdowns.

Also starting at quarterback this fall for the Washington Redskins is third-year pro MARK RYPIEN, *Washington State '86*, the club's Travelers Man of the Year nominee for 1989. Last season, he and Doug Williams combined to set new team records in many passing categories. Starting again at linebacker for the Seattle Seahawks is DAVID WYMAN, *Stanford '87*, the club's second-leading tackler last season. A leading tackler this fall for the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts is second-year linebacker TONY VISCO, *Purdue '88*.

Other Deltas involved in pro football this fall are Kansas City Chiefs assistant coach HOWARD MUDD, *Michigan State-Hillsdale '64*; New England Patriots special assistant JOHN POLONCHEK, *Michigan State '49*; Green Bay Packers marketing director JEFF CIEPLY, *DePauw '84*; and NFL replay official FRITZ GRAF, *Case Western Reserve '44*.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL

Named to the 1989 "Playboy Magazine" pre-season All-American team was University of Texas punter and co-captain BOBBY LILLJEDAHL. Texas Tech tight end BART TALKINGTON was named to the 1989 Southwest Conference Academic Honor Team. Other fine players this fall include Oregon State Kicker TROY BUSSANICH; Stanford linebacker ROB HINCKLEY; Stanford kicker JOHN HOPKINS; Stanford offensive linemen CHUCK GILLINGHAM and ANDY PAPATHANASSIOU; plus DePauw quarterback JEFF VORIS. BASEBALL

Three Deltas finished the 1989 major league season on big league rosters. The Texas Rangers' regular third baseman once again was STEVE BUECHELE, *Stanford '83*. Joining him on the Rangers during most of the season was lefthanded reliever DREW HALL, *Morehead State '85*. MIKE ALDRETE, *Stanford '83*, had his worst big league season, never getting untracked at the plate for the Montreal Expos.

The 1989 season was a lost one for PETE STANICEK, *Stanford '85*, who began spring training in a battle for the

Baltimore Orioles' second base job. But several injuries caused him to spend the season in the Eastern League, where he batted just 156 times (.253 average). Outfielder WALT HARRIS, *Stanford '87*, spent the season with Rochester of the International League and overcame a serious injury. He returned to the lineup less than two months after fouling a bunt attempt into his face and shattering his right eye socket. Following surgery to repair the damage, Walt made a good comeback and hit better than he had before the injury.

Third baseman ED SPRAGUE, *Stanford '89*, began the season in class A but was promoted to Syracuse of the Interantional League at mid-season. First sacker RON WITMEYER, *Stanford '89*, was a regular for the Modesto A's of the California League. DOUG ROBBINS, *Stanford '88*, hit over .300 as a designated hitter and catcher for Frederick of the Carolina League. Second baseman FRANK CAREY, *Stanford '89*, was a regular the last half of the season for the Clinton Giants of the Midwest League while pitcher BRIAN KEYSER, *Stanford '89*, saw action for the Utica Blue Sox of the New York-Penn League. Good hitters in the Pioneer League were Sam Houston State senior CHRIS BURTON of the Idaho Falls Braves and JACK HOLLIS, *Stanford '89*, of the Billings Reds.

Named as a 1989 inductee into the Washington State Sports Hall of Fame is DUBI LUFI, *Washington State '75*. A standout gymnast for the Cougars from 1972 through 1975, he also competed at the Olympics for his native Israel.

Through the years, the quality of being gentlemen has been stressed in programs of the Fraternity. It is part of the Delt tradition. Yet, the word can be nebulous. What characteristics identify a gentleman?

Like many other descriptive nouns, the word "gentleman" has been altered by periods of history, location, and personal perception. In 16th Century England, it distinguished a position slightly below nobility, but sufficiently well-born to have a coat of arms. Exceptional servants at another time merited the title, e.g. "the Duke's gentleman." Even post-Revolution America generally limited the designation to those of "genteel" breeding and refinement. A popular song of the 1930s described a "Sentimental Gentleman from Georgia" as being "gentle to the ladies all around." Every male in the audience apparently qualifies when a speaker incorporates the most popular of all openings, "Ladies and gentlemen." Thirty-three race car drivers are so honored each May at Indianapolis when Mrs. Tony Hulman shouts the familiar words, "Gentlemen, start your engines."

Despite its early history of snobbery and more recent pervasive use of the word, however, "gentleman" survives as a complimentary distinction when applied individually. A fraternity chapter whose members are described by others as being gentlemen indeed enjoys an enviable reputation.

To offer tangible qualities considered marks of a true gentleman today, *The Rainbow* queried several alumni members who have brought distinction to themselves and Delta Tau Delta during their careers. Interestingly, several common observations homogenize their answers to some extent, the most conspicuous being a respect for the feelings of other people.

Bill Flemming, *Michigan* '49, well-known ABC radio and television sports broadcaster, believes that duress tests the qualities of a "true gentleman." Politeness, consideration, and kindness all are elements combining to make a person gentlemanly, he says, "but it seems to me that it is

quite easy to have those qualities and display them under normal circumstances. So, as simple as it may sound, grace under pressure would be my measure of the man."

Joseph D. Boyd, *DePauw* '48, retired executive director of scholarships for the State of Illinois describes a gentleman as "knowing when to talk and when to listen. When he speaks, the words and thoughts are appropriate. A gentleman sees his integrity as one of his most important possessions and defends it with vigor when falsely attacked. He gives 'space and opportunity' to others to develop their individualities. A gentleman always dresses and acts appropriately for the occasion and he makes courtesy a common practice. A gentleman shows concern for others in word, action, and deed."

G. Herbert McCracken, Pittsburgh '21, famed coach and retired head of Scholastic, Inc. publishing company, has similar thoughts. "A gentleman is a man of good manners and behavior — one who is sensitive to the welfare and feelings of others and stands ready to help them as the need arises," he says. "He is courteous and considerate in his everyday relations with fellow students and with colleagues at work, and is prompt to express his regret when failing to meet them. He recognizes his responsibility for good government by his role as a voter and as a voice in social, political, and economic issues, hopefully having gained valuable experience in his college days through campus and fraternity activities. He recognizes that the degree of one's gentlemanliness can be enhanced by a never-ending quest for knowledge. If the person I have been describing wears the square badge of Delta Tau Delta Fraternity, he is indeed a very fortunate gentleman."

Dante Lavelli, *Ohio State* '45, former All-American football player at OSU and All-NFL end with the Cleveland Browns, now owner of a successful furniture company in Rocky River, Ohio, lists eight measures of a gentle-

man: "He should be courteous, respect his elders, acknowledge achievements of others, be able to admit mistakes, accept constructive criticism, be on time, be a fair negotiator, and above all, be humble."

Frank H. Price, Jr., *Auburn* '59, was director of program development for the Fraternity before starting Pine Hill Day Camp, with his wife, Carolyn, near Somerville, Ala., in 1975. His observations reflect both his work on the Delt administrative staff and his dealings with hundreds of parents whose children attend the annual camp:

"When I was a Delt pledge back in the dark ages, we studied etiquette. There even was a section in the Pledge Manual on the subject, and it was generally thought that a Delt who practiced good manners was a gentleman. I have since learned that being gentlemanly goes far beyond good manners, although they are important, and a gentleman will be mannerly.

"The gentlemen — and gentlewomen too — whom I have observed in both social and business settings all seem to have one common characteristic. That characteristic or quality is consideration. To be gentlemanly is to be considerate of oneself and others. To me, a gentleman is in touch with himself and others and has an understanding and appreciation for his and others' needs and feelings. This means he can be depended upon to fulfill his responsibilities whatever they may be. It also means he will have a cooperative spirit.

"It seems to me that the principles of Deltism which the Fraternity teaches make up the foundation for a gentlemanly life. I have found nothing in our Ritual or other documents that are contrary to my concept of gentlemanly behavior. In fact, I have found much which when applied to everyday living enhances one's life and, hopefully helps one be a gentleman in the broadest sense of the term."


