amilies that outgrow their homes have several choices. They can move to a more spacious house. They can remain where they are and add an extra room. They can adjust to closer quarters.

In a similar way, changes in your life may present you with choices concerning financial and estate plans you may have "outgrown." Children leaving home, the death of a spouse, or a career change that brings substantially greater earnings or the types of life events that warrant a review of your will and other plans. Read on as one alumnus tells you his story of how he addressed this decision that so many people dread.

During the last 23 years, Gail and I have been transferred eight times and have lived in seven states. Because we have one son, we created a new will each time we moved to insure that our assets would be distributed according to our wishes instead of having a government agency decide how our estate would be divided, while keeping a sizeable piece of it.

After making a number of wills, one has the chance to think about what is important, and what should happen to assets accumulated over a lifetime. In 1990, Gail and I decided to leave a portion of our estate to The Brevard College Foundation (where she completed her A.A. before finishing her B.A. at Georgia), and to The Delta Tau

Delta Educational Foundation.

We chose both organizations because they invest in the future of our youth. The Delt Foundation is especially good because it funds leadership and alcohol abuse prevention programs as well as scholarships, grants, loans and the chapter consultant program.

In early 1997 we updated our Wills because we had lost Gail's mom and our asset base had changed. As a result, our attorney created a codicil that took into account the changes in our lives and incorporated details that we had overlooked. Doing a codicil in our circumstances made the decision to update our will much easier.

Wills and codicils are not the most pleasant subjects to discuss. At the same time, it is a part of everyone's personal business that needs to be handled in a timely manner. If you are thinking about creating your first will or updating your current one, I urge you to consider a bequest to the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation.

THE NEW SPIRIT OF SERVICE

t eases social problems, doesn't cost much, makes people feel good, and everybody likes it. Sounds like Dr. Pangloss' elixir, but it's volunteerism—and you're going to be hearing a lot about it this year. President Clinton extolled the virtues of volunteerism in his State of the Union address last spring. Along with former President George Bush and retired Gen. Colin Powell, he kicked off a summit focusing on volunteerism as the bipartisan cure for America's ills last April as part of National Service and Volunteer Week. As part of his proclamation, the President eloquently summed up the importance of volunteerism in America. • "Citizen service is a vital force in American life, helping to build a stronger sense of community and citizenship and engaging Americans to meet the obligations we all share. Whether tutoring children, mentoring teens, renovating housing, restoring public parks, responding to natural disasters, or caring for aging parents and grandparents, those who serve and volunteer are strengthening our communities for America's future. • "Citizen service reflects one of the most basic convictions of our democracy: that we are all responsible for one another. It is a very American idea that we meet our challenges not through government or as isolated individuals, but as members of a true community, with all of us working together." • "Americans can take pride in knowing that our tradition of service is being preserved and expanded. As we recognize the devoted service of our Nation's citizens, we must continue to foster the spirit of volunteerism, making service the common expectation and experience of

every American." • "National Service and Volunteer Week is a time to celebrate the American spirit of service and volunteerism and a time to encourage citizens to use their individual talents to serve the common good. During this week and throughout the year, let us salute all those who devote their time, their talents, and their energy to improving our communities-through organizations like AmeriCorps and other programs within the Corporation for National Service: the Points of Light Foundation; Learn and Serve America; the National Senior Service Corps; and thousands of other voluntary, civic, religious, fraternal and neighborhood groups." • The Presidents' Summit for America's Future brought together every living president with 1,700 community and state representatives in Philadelphia to develop concrete action plans to turn the tide for America. Its mission statement addressed the growing sense of disconnection in America today. Too many communities are fragmented along racial, ethnic, religious or economic lines and we find ourselves feeling that what divides us from another is more than the glue that holds us together in communities and as a nation. • The impact of this is greatest on American's young people. In small, as well as big cities, far too many young people are growing up without the models and relationships needed for success. Far too many do not have safe places to learn and grow, are not getting a healthy start or the education that creates real opportunities. And too many are unaware that volunteering through community service can make a difference in the lives

of others.

In his opening remarks during the Philadelphia Summit itself, General Powell remarked, "Over 200 years ago, a group of volunteers gathered on this sacred spot to found a new nation. In perfect words, they voiced their dreams and aspirations of an imperfect world. They pledged their lives, their fortune and their sacred honor to secure inalienable rights given by God for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness-pledged that they would provide them to all who would inhabit this new nation.

They look down on us in spirit, with pride for all we have done to keep faith with their ideas and their sacrifices. Yet, despite all we have done, this is still an imperfect world. Despite more than two centuries of moral and material progress, there are still Americans who are not sharing in the American Dream. We gather to pledge that those of us who are more fortunate will not forsake those who are less. Above all, we pledge to reach out to the most vulnerable members of the American family-our children. Up to 15 million young Americans today are at risk. They are at risk of growing up unskilled, unlearned or unloved. Even worse, they are at risk of never growing up at all. In terms of numbers, the task may seem staggering. But if we look at the simple needs that these children have, then the task is manageable, the goal is achievable. We know what they need. They need an adult caring person in their life, a safe place to learn and grow, a healthy start, marketable skills and an opportunity to serve so that early in their lives they learn the virtual of service so that they can reach out then and help another young American in need."

In the *Bible*, Proverbs counsels us, "Do not withhold good from those who deserve it when it is in your power to act."

Today, in America, more and more citizens are realizing

that it is within our power to act. And across America, there is spreading a warm light of compassion and commitment, a new spirit of service in America.

We saw it in North Dakota where tens of thousands of Delts and other volunteers responded instantly and selflessly to those terrible floods.

We saw the spirit of service on Earth Day, when Delts and others honored their duty to Americans of tomorrow by pledging to be good stewards of the environment—to make sure subsequent generations inherit air, water and land that is clean healthy and safe.

We saw it on NetDay when tens of thousands of Americans came together to pull cable, install software, hook up computers and connect America's classrooms to the Information Superhighway. And we saw it last year when neighbors, black and white, joined forces to rebuild churches, synagogues and other houses of worship that had been burned to the ground by hatred.

But let us not be blind to the facts. Even with all the progress that we have made, millions of children are being left behind in lives of too much danger, too many drugs, too little hope and not enough opportunity. There are too many people out there doing the very best they can and still not keeping up, much less moving forward.

We cherish our citizen volunteers. Last year over 90 million Americans volunteered in some form of community service.

Young people, above all, however, have the time, the energy and the idealism for this kind of citizen service. Before they have their own families, the young can make a unique contribution to the family of America. In doing so, they can acquire the habit of service and get a deeper understanding of what it really means to be a citizen.



ing volunteer service as a prerequisite for graduation. The will to serve has never been stronger and more of our young people want to serve fulltime. President Clinton's AmeriCorps program is collaborating with religious and charitable institutions to double their impact.

They are being put to work as mentors, as teachers, as organizers of other volunteers. By the year 2000, it could be that more children will have served on our streets than have worked in the entire history of the Peace Corps around the world.

For those who study the field of volunteerism and its effects on the world, there are some interesting trends developing.

1. Near-paranoia about legal liability and the desire to avoid risk too often dominate decision making about what volunteers are permitted to do and how they do it. Worst-case-scenario thinking results in limited volunteer roles, cumbersome screening processes, and costly and time-consuming background checks. Risk management for everyone's safety makes sense; obstacles to needed volunteering do not. And there is a case to be made that much volunteer work is inherently risky, since the causes and populations volunteers serve are often those with the least

mainstream supporters.

2. With all the publicity about AmeriCorps and National Service, the real news is the impact of the Learn and Serve/K to 12 programs (funded from the same source as National Service) which are becoming genuinely entrenched in school systems. Because educators themselves have seized upon 'community service' as a way to produce 'school reform,' curriculum-based service programs and even mandated hours of service as a requirement for graduation are proliferating. Regardless of the debate about 'involuntary volunteering,' service-learning is introducing many young people to a wide range of community agencies. And all this has the unexpected - and potentially very long term — benefit of introducing boys to direct service work in fields heretofore considered female service arenas.

3. The vocabulary of our field continues to evolve, with more groups divesting from the word 'volunteer' in favor of more supposedly modern phrases such as 'community service' or 'civic involvement.' Whether called pro bono work, activism, lay ministry, or corporate social responsibility, the common denominator is doing

something for the common good without concern for personal financial profit, which brings us back to 'volunteering.' There is also some evidence that a backlash by volunteers themselves is reinvigorating the original term. One benefit of vocabulary shifting is discovery: we can point out that our organizations value and put money towards 'fund raising,' so why not do the same for 'people raising'? Expressing the concept of volunteerism in different words can shed new light on our attitudes about it.

4. We are still in the early stages of cyberspace in terms of volunteerism. Opportunities continue to proliferate for electronic access to new prospective volunteers as well as our colleagues around the globe, but we now are more realistic as to the limitations as well as the potential of this astounding medium. New techniques of 'distance learning' through cyberspace have the potential to revolutionize our forms of volunteer training, off-site supervision and support, and volunteer 'newsletters' (especially for national organizations burdened now with huge printing and postage costs).

5. The widespread trend toward budget-cutting, downsizing, and retrenchment in both the non-profit and for-profit arenas is causing employee unrest and malaise, unwanted job-hunting by people at the managerial level, and moves toward self-employment. A twoedged sword, these changes also have potential to increase volunteering, as people seek new skills and the self-esteem of helping others. We are also seeing the illogic of agencies eliminating the position of director of volunteers, followed by a search for more volunteers!

6. Technology is a boon and a curse. Computers, faxes, cel-

lular phones and other devices certainly allow us to do things faster and even with less cost (e-mailings), but also add more stress as they increase the pace of work. While we are able to communicate instantly across time zones, the technology raises its own thorny issues for volunteer projects, such as the negative impact of 'caller i.d.' on confidential hot lines.

7. Inter-agency collaborations are springing up everywhere, sometimes leading to mergers. Although often driven by funders looking for evidence of cooperation, such collective action can help consumers by avoiding duplication and offering 'one stop shopping' for multiple services. Collaborations and mergers affect volunteers in all participating organizations but volunteers are infrequently considered or consulted. Whether volunteers end up in strong support, as an opposing force, or with divided lovalties depends on whether and how they are integrated into the planning.

8. We may never go back to the supposedly 'traditional' family of the 1950s, yet many volunteer efforts are organized around this outdated model. Divorce, single parenthood, and care-giving to aging par-



ents are only a few factors to which successful volunteer programs will adapt. Volunteer opportunities that respect people's limited time, welcome children to come along, and meet the social need of adults to make new friends of both sexes (not to mention safer ways to meet a potential date!) will be the ones that attract today's volunteers.

9. To assess how these trends affect your setting, answer the following: Have I seen any indication that this trend has begun in my community? How, or why not? Is this a trend that has potential to help our volunteer services and, if so, how can I make sure we are part of it? If it worries me as having negative implications, how can I prepare for or even prevent its impact? How can I keep informed about it?

One of the problems, experts say, is that volunteerism can only do so much. In an era when Washington is cutting social spending to balance the federal budget, even people who organize volunteers through social-service charities fear they may be asked to do more than they can tackle to make up the difference.

"There is a lot of anxiety about what nonprofits will be expected to do. It's focused on how much government funding we may lose, and are we going to be expected to do even more," said Rick Moyers of the National Center for Non-Profit Boards. The criticism echoes harsher attacks Democrats made on George Bush's "Thousand Points of Light" campaign for volunteerism during his term as president. Back then, Democrats ridiculed Bush's approach as empty symbolism, an inadequate feel-good substitute for necessary but expensive government programs.

Now, Clinton and Bush are

working together. Volunteerism is thus a rising trend of governance in the 1990s, despite differences of ideology and party.

Yet, when it comes to volunteerism, the most important people in America today are not the political officials. The most important people are those who teach the student to read; who save the health of the infant; who give help to families when all help seems gone. As Harry Truman reminded us too long ago, the most important title any of us will ever hold in this country is the title of citizen.

Obviously, many take their responsibilities seriously. About half of all American adultsand 59% of teen-agers-devote three to four hours each week to voluntary community service of some sort, according to annual Gallup surveys. Some 79% of first-year college students do as well, a recent UCLA survey showed. Based upon those statistics, Delt undergraduates spent approximately 19,000 hours of volunteer service last year alone and Delt alumni, more than 107,000 hours. These included Adopt-A-School, Boys Clubs of America, Boy Scouts of America, Red Cross, Adopt-A-Highway, and hundreds of other selfless demonstrations of service that differed chapter by chapter.

Sprinkled among our living membership of nearly eighty thousand are hundreds of examples of selfless service—many of which have gone unnoticed and unrewarded. A few of these, one of a "thousand points of light" in their own right, have come to our attention and are included in this issue as an example to us all.

Motivating People to Volunteer

- Be motivated yourself. Sincerity succeeds over technique every time.
- Be clear on what you want people to do. Use written job descriptions whenever possible so that you are telling the same thing in the same way to each potential volunteer.
- The more specific you can be, the better. If you ask: "Who wants to volunteer?" how can someone decide on the basis of no information? On the other hand, if you ask: "Who wants to prepare for the legislative hearing next month?" you allow people to self-screen their interests.
- Use titles for volunteer assignments. The word "volunteer" is a pay category, not a function! Would you apply for a job called "employee"?
- Do not speak with a 'forked tongue.' Do not suck people into assignments by minimizing the work to do be done. Be careful of phrases like: "this will only take a few hours a month" or "try it for a while and then we'll see." If you need someone with availability several hours a week or for a full year, say so. It may take longer to find someone to say yes, but once you have that person you'll have the right person.
- Share deadlines. When does the work have to be finished?
 What are the internal deadlines prior to the final one?
- Define the training and supervision the person will have.
 Many people are cautious of being thrown in to sink or swim. If they believe they will have help while they learn the ropes, they may be more likely to give something a try. Also, it is reassuring to know that you do not expect them to start the job fully informed or trained.
- Identify and express the benefits to the volunteer from accomplishing the task. Every job has "payoffs" and it is legitimate to discuss these. In fact, in the best volunteer situations, the giver receives as much benefit as the recipient.
- Explain why you are approaching the particular person —
 what skills or personality traits he or she has that makes
 her/him a good candidate for the position.
- Paint an upbeat picture of the work. Volunteering is a
 leisure time activity. You are not competing with salaried
 employment when you recruit volunteers; your competition
 is jogging and time with the kids! So the volunteer work
 should be fun at some level (and remember that everyone
 defines fun differently).
- Don't have mental conversations. The way to recruit volunteers is to ask people!

magine the feeling of watching a child's face light up when you arrive at his home, a shelter, to treat him to an afternoon of fun activities his mother could never afford.

Members of the Ohio State Delt chapter make sure they know that feeling every Sunday afternoon. This is just one of the many volunteer activities their involved in.

"They currently do more community service than any other fraternity or sorority at Ohio State and the IFC doesn't require them to do any of it," said Mike Vitucci, council director of community relations.

Mark Weiker, community service chairman of Beta Phi Chapter, said the chapter requires members to participate in community service projects but most members do much more than the minimum.

A calendar posted in the foyer of the shelter is filled with names indicating which members plan to participate in that day's activity.

The Big Brothers-Big Sisters Association of Great Columbus and Franklin County matches the chapter members with children from a local shelter. As a group they participate in activities like bowling movies and trips to COSI.

"It's nice to go out and help people who aren't as lucky and go out and spoil them for an afternoon," Weiker said.

"Karen Brown, program coordinator of the association, said her experience working with the fraternity has been extremely positive.

"The kids adore those guys and they talk all week about how they can't wait to see them again," she said. "Most of the kids have never had a male role model."

The chapter has also volunteered to organize and participate in open gym-style basketball games with local children on Tuesday and Friday afternoons.

The men also posted flyers near some Columbus schools advertising the free program in hopes of recruiting more players, Weiker said.

Bill Rucker, an OSU Delt, said, "Seeing the kids look forward to it and get something out of it makes it all worthwhile."

Weiker was contacted by the Holy Name Church Family Center to start the program and the Maynard Avenue United Methodist Church arranged for the group to use the basketball court in the church basement.

Chapter members also participate in construction projects through the Greater Columbus Habitat for Humanity on Saturdays.

They often spend more than eight hours working to finish a project in one day, Weiker said.

Indianola Middle
School faculty began a flag
football program last spring
for students. Chapter members
donated time as coaches and
referees because of the school's
limited funds available for recreation.

Some men also spend an hour on two on Thursday afternoons teaching kids at South Mifflin Elementary School in Columbus how to master the game of chess.

The school has been recognized at the state level for its number of chess champions, Weiker said.

The chapter sets aside a portion of their dues every quarter to be used specifically for community service. They currently plan to increase that part of the budget and increase their involvement in volunteer service as well. Dylan Kemna, a chapter member says, "For us, community service is not a chore. We really enjoy doing these things."

eeter-tottering through the rain, wind and cold, Iowa's Delts raised more than \$4,000 for the 22nd annual March of Dimes Campaign for Healthier Babies. Volunteers seesawed in front of the Delt house 24 hours a day for more than five days. By the time the end of the week rolled around, volunteers had teeter-tottered a total of 168 hours, earning pledges from neighboring companies, fellow students, alumni, Iowa City residents and their families. The campaign also featured a 23-mile bike ride to the Capitol in Des Moines." "We had a positive response, said a United States Cellular representative, a sponsor for the race, "Many families participated."



s a member of the Boy Scouts of America's Viking Council in Minneapolis, undergraduate Delt Josh Kaiser had participated with the North Star community center through the Urban Emphasis program.

One of the greatest times of the year for everyone is summer, especially for children. With school out and a lot of free time, what is there to do? Community, city and school programs help to provide some sort of entertainment throughout the summers, but often it is not enough. This is where the Urban Emphasis program really gets into high gear. What could be more fun than learning new games, earning recognition and doing great projects?

Scout summer programs are an effective way to teach kids fun tasks while introducing them to what scouting is all about.

Josh, along with several other volunteers continued his service to Scouting and the youth of Minneapolis by providing much needed leadership to Brooklyn Park summer Scouting programs. As a scouting volunteer, Josh felt his job was to help out through weekly programs. Kids need adult role

models and having a male college student around was fun for them because they loved to ask all sorts of questions. Because summer programs tended to be a mixture of boys and girls of various ages, it was sometimes hard to find activities everyone would enjoy. Having volunteers such as Josh enabled the leaders to spend more time with individual kids, which they needed. A compliment from a leader or volunteer was sometimes all it took to get a big smile and earn a new friend. When the next week came around they noticed immediately which volunteers were missing and had to know why. That is why the role of a volunteer was so important-kids need encouragement to excel and feel that they are doing things correctly.

Volunteers such as Josh were also important because their job was simply to make sure that the kids were doing okay. Josh brought to the scouting volunteers the same principles taught by scouting, which are reflected in the Fraternity's mission and values.

Since beginning to work with scouting programs, Josh has found great satisfaction working with the kids and staff. He finds it incredibly rewarding to spend time with kids teaching them how to do something, even if it is a simple art project. Although he is busy and active with school, working as a scouting volunteer enables him to give something back to his community by spending time with one of the important aspects of communities—children.

35 Volunteer Recruitment Ideas

- Offer slide-show programs illustrating clients being served by volunteers for use at condominium association meetings in your area.
- 2. Offer a program on ways to become involved to large companies for use in their pre-retirement seminars.
- Talk to the manager of your local cable TV program, or at a high school or college station to present a program on your agency.
- 4. Never walk away from a meeting where you have given a talk about your agency without getting the name and contact information of everyone who was interested. Get back to these people within one week if possible.
- When you are going to make a presentation to a large group, take several volunteers with you, both to talk about their own experiences and to help you deal with interested applicants.
- 6. Get lists of other organizations in your area to see if they can help your recruitment effort by advertising your program, offering you time on their meeting agendas, distributing written information to their membership, posting notices on bulletin boards, etc. Churches are especially good at this.
- Have someone do research on clubs, groups, schools, etc., who have as part of their activities a project similar to yours.
 People in those projects are excellent prospective recruits for your program.
- 8. Since a tool that augments recruiting is publicity, consider ways to get your story (of client needs, not organizational history) across, such as identifying businesses that buy newspaper ad space and asking them to plug your cause and how people can become involved.
- Work with other volunteer groups in your community to sponsor a volunteer fair at a shopping mall or a company.
- 10. Ask your local newspapers to donate space in its classified ads section for volunteer job openings. Place (and pay for, if necessary) a volunteer job advertisement in the Help Wanted section, built around appealing to gaining job skills and making employment contacts.
- 11. Get churches to announce your needs to their congregations.
- 12. Contact high school and college department heads in any subject areas that coincide with your agency's purpose to see if volunteering with you can become part of a class assignment.
- Talk to personnel directors of companies, explaining volunteer opportunities and ask if they can direct retirees and current employees to you.
- Create a "Resource Inventory" file of groups, individuals, media, clubs, businesses, etc. List name, contact, past history of collaboration, publications, and all other useful information.
- 15. Don't forget that you can recruit whole groups to help you with a project. Recruit the National Guard to serve as safety marshals for your special event. Let the Lions Club co-sponsor and operate your Jailathon. Get the Toastmasters Club to

- serve as your Speakers' Bureau.
- 16. When trying to involve minorities as volunteers, find leaders in that community and recruit them to recruit their peers.
- 17. When trying to enlist a teacher, pastor or leader of some group, take one of their members with you to help persuade them. Make sure this person is both committed to and informed about your agency.
- 18. Speak the language of the person you are trying to recruit. Ask yourself, "What do we do that would be of interest to them?" and highlight this in your presentation.
- When trying to recruit a group, look up its mission and use some of the wording in your presentation, but don't overdo it.
- 20. Always tell why you are personally committed to your work when enlisting others, since it personalizes the job you are seeking to fill. If you aren't personally committed, recruit someone else to do recruitment.
- Always recruit volunteers on the basis of the service to clients, not the needs of the agency. People work for people, not things.
- 22. When trying to recruit businesses, look up their advertising slogan and build it into your presentation.
- Tell people as exactly as possible what they will do, how long they will be expected to do it and who will benefit.
- 24. Remember that you're trying to eliminate people's reasons to say "NO," not twist their arms into volunteering.
- 25. Never use guilt when trying to recruit.
- 26. Be honest and up front with people when trying to recruit. Do not lie about or minimize the work or the time needed.
- 27. Avoid "first warm-body-through-the-door" methods of recruitment. If you can't get the right person, don't take anybody.
- 28. Ask grocers to stuff flyers about your program into grocer bags.
- Break large volunteer jobs down into smaller components, then recruit people for these lesser time-consuming jobs.
- 30. Be careful about recruiting people to titles without explaining the actual job functions and responsibilities. "Secretary" can mean different things to different people.
- Diagram where people will fit into the overall pattern of work.
 It will help them visualize their role in relation to others.
- 32. ALWAYS offer a job description, even if it's a simple one-sentence sketch of the work to be performed. This way, both you and they are more likely to understand their assignment.
- 33. Don't recruit until you know what you are doing and what the volunteers are going to be doing.
- 34. Appeal to your current volunteers to recruit their friends, Sponsor a "Bring a Friend" introductory luncheon.
- 35. Get the Welcome Wagon, Visitors Bureau and Chamber of Commerce to disseminate your material to newcomers.
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seven English teachers, his task has not been simply to teach English but to find resources, write curricula, plan cultural events, participate in conferences, etc., -all very professional activities for educators. Luckily, Arnold had come to Russia already a certified teacher in the United States so most of these tasks were very familiar to him, with the challenge of the Russian language thrown in. The thing he has found most difficult has been getting resources. As there used to be state-mandated curricula, texts, and tests, there now exists a shortage of satisfactory teaching materials and resources. Teachers are free to supplement their school's curriculum with anything they see as beneficial to their students' education. The only problem is that the materials they want are only available from companies and publishers outside of Russia. Anderson's being there has helped them to teach American culture, geography, history and just "Americanisms" but, being with them for only a short time, he requested help from everyone he could think of. Since last year, he wrote to aid organizations, book donation companies, foundations, chambers of commerce, publishers, etc., asking for assistance in locating quality materials for his Russian colleagues and students. His requests included books, magazines, maps, posters, videos and cassettes. As a registered representative for the International Book Project, he was authorized to received as many

pounds of books as he could cover the shipping costs for—about \$2.00 per pound—although he receives no salary for his work there. Friends, family members, colleagues and members of the Delt community

have assisted him in his efforts to leave a legacy of learning for the Russian people. He says, "Delta Tau Delta ideals have led me into my career as an educator and were also a fundamental reason for my applying to the Peace Corps in the first place."

f the many community service activities in which Joe MacKenzie, Sam Houston State '60, was involved in, he took the most pride in those associated with education. As a plant manager for Chevron Chemical Company, he believed that industry must take an active role in the education of Louisiana's youth. Joe involved Chevron in numerous community projects including the Belle Chasse Primary School Playground construction pro-



ject and the Primary School landscaping project, the Oakville Playground renovation, the Nature Conservancy of Louisiana Boardwalk in the White Kitchen Eagle Preserve and the Riverbend Seniors Citizen Center renovation. The primary goal of his Educational Outreach Program, since 1988, was to educate and motivate students of the Plaquemines Parish School System. He also believed that the students are the future of our country and are the essential element for a quality, skilled workforce of the future.

Joe encouraged the involvement of employees in many educational outreach programs, including tutoring, teaching "How to take a test," judging science and social studies fairs, Career Day, the life in the day of an engineer and the implementation of Science **Education for Public** Understanding and Chemical, Health, Environment, and ME (CHEMI) programs. In the 1993-1994 school year alone, over 4,400 hours of employee time was volunteered to various programs.

In the late 1980s it was brought to Joe's attention that Plaquemines Parish residents were not qualifying for positions at Oak Point. Joe's response to that was, "Don't bring me problems, bring me solutions!" At that point, Joe

decided that Chevron would play a big role in the solution, which was to begin implementing educational programs. Three of the more significant educational outreach programs were "tutoring", "plant tours" and "How to take a test."

During each school year about two dozen employees participate in a "tutoring" program which provides tutoring for one hour, one day a week, at four Plaquemines Parish schools. The tutors cover specific assignments directed by the

teacher for the younger elementary students and those that work with the older students will work on an individual basis to address their tutoring needs.

Since 1989, more than 3,000 school children have received "plant tours" where they learned how math, science and chemistry are applied to manufacturing.

The "How to take a test" program was originally developed when data indicated that only about 30% of job applicants testing for an operator trainee position achieved an acceptable cumulative score on the four standard aptitude tests. When a group of 99 applicants took "How to take a test" before taking the aptitude test, 67% of the group made an acceptable score. Recognizing that this program might be used to improve the test scores of students, about 2500 students in grades 6-12 have since participated in this program. The program is a three hour seminar that reviews such topics as types of tests, test taking, characteristics of tests and attitudes and skills for test taking.

As a result of Joe's many years of service and commitment to the community and schools of Plaquemines Parish, the Plaquemines Parish Council recently recognized and proclaimed September 11, 1997 as Joe MacKenzie Day.

Edmund Everett Hale wrote: "I am only one, but still I am one. I cannot do everything, but still I can do something; and because I cannot do everything I will not refuse to do something that I can do."

It is this principal which people like Joe and hundreds of Delts each day live by. May they be an example to us all.

had not had a comprehensive international community service project in close to 15 years. The last one was "Delts Tackle Muscular Dystrophy" in the late 1970s and early '80s. Since then we have worked on a limited basis with both the Arthritis Foundation and Red Cross Blood Drives. Though noble in their attempt to serve the community, each of these initiatives slowly lost momentum. While searching for a new project over the past two years, the Arch Chapter and the Undergraduate Council used a number of criteria. Any project that Delta Tau Delta embraced had to meet the following requirements:

- Must benefit on the local level, yet have an international scope.
- Must be implemented equally effectively in both small and large chapters.

 Must allow Delts the opportunity to see direct feedback from their efforts.

With these criteria in mind, Delta Tau Delta started to focus on education, literacy, and youth. After much thought and investigation, the Fraternity chose Adopt-A-School, an existing program of the National Interfraternity Conference (NIC).

The goal of Adopt-A-School is to provide for the formation of one-on-one relationships between college students and elementary school children. Shrinking school budgets, poor teacher-student ratios, and a lack of positive role models contribute to the need for a program such as this.

We are proud that the Fraternity has joined an existing program, one in which nearly 150 campuses, Interfraternity
Councils, and chapters are already participating. The goal of the pro-

gram is to be inclusive and collaborate with other groups on campus. Delta Tau Delta is proud to be a part of this collaborative network.

Whether you live in an urban city of millions or a rural college town, there is a school in your community that can use your chapter's help.

Many chapters have gotten extensive local press from their efforts in addition to positive experiences for all participants.

Maintaining Order

Iowa State Delts adopted Crawford Elementary School and began volunteering an hour or more a week to supervise and help out during recess or to be crossing guards.

They worked in pairs during the three recesses and the two crossing guard times. Recess jobs ranged from organizing games to keeping the peace.

"There's always a fight during recess. It was hard before because there would be one lady and 50 to 60 kids," said Philanthropy Chair Ron Beck.

The school and chapter planned in-class activities together. The men read or helped out the teacher. Another program involves more individual interaction with the students.

"We have each pledge class adopt a class. We're pen pals, go on field trips and have picnics," said Wes Muller, pledge philanthropy chair at the time. "During Veishea [a major campus event] we'll have the kids come over one day and watch us build the float."

The first activity the Delts did was help out with the school's pancake dinner. The men took jobs that parents normally did which allowed the parents to spend more time with their kids.

Adopt-A-School also gives teachers more free time to do work and help out students, Muller said. Parents and teachers have had a positive outlook on the program from the start, he added.

"The parents and teachers were ecstatic about it, and started bursting out with ideas. We have the OK with parents and teachers," Muller said.

The students have displayed the same enthusiasm as the fraternity members.

"[The kids] love the idea that there are older kids there helping out," Muller said.

Crawford Principal Mary
Delagardelle agreed. "The kids
love it. It's a way for them to
interact with someone older,"
she said. "I think it's working
out great. We're finding the
fraternity guys are really reliable and responsible. The kids
are having a good time with it."

While participation in Iowa State's program is not mandatory, the brothers feel that since it's more of an obligation to the kids and the school if they don't work, they're letting the kids down. Chapter President Judd Hoffman says, "I think it's going great so far. I thought we'd have trouble getting guys to do it, but over 80 percent of the house has signed up to do it."

A Diversity of Duties

Sam Houston State's program

began in the fall of 1994. The school selected was Gibbs Elementary, located a few blocks from campus. Twice a week four chapter members would go to the school where each was assigned a specific student, ranging from kindergarten to fourth grade. The brothers helped the students with various aspects of their classwork. Some would need help with math or grammar while the vounger students needs someone to read them a story. This semester the number of Delts participating increased 50%. According to one brother, "We have had great success with Adopt-A-School and hope to continue this in the future."

Food for Thought

In Bowling Green, teamwork and a chicken barbecue, that's what it takes to raise the money needed for the Crim Elementary School fifth-grade trip to Camp Campbell Guard.

Last spring, Crim fifthgraders, PTO members and Bowling Green Delts worked together to serve Terry's Amish Chicken in the Crim gym.

Eager fifth-grade volunteers asked "Can I help you with that?" to customers who had armloads of food. Anxious table wipers quickly cleaned tables.

"We had a great response," said Chris Tipton, PTO committee chairman. "The kids all worked half-hour shifts and some volunteered to work the whole time."

"This was a great opportunity to help the kids help themselves," said Tim Ryan, Delt chapter president. "If you help the younger kids, it shows them that the community backs them. When it's their turn to play a role when they're our age, they'll be more apt to do that," Ryan said.

Preparation for the Future

The colony at the University of North Texas believes that, in their commitment to lives of excellence, "strengthening community is essential to our vitality". One aspect of the Colony's own mission is to provide leadership and support for the evolvement of the community. Through their various philanthropies, they look beyond themselves and beyond the Fraternity by recognizing the contributions made to the community. Adopt-A-School is our continual philanthropy project where each week we go into a local school and serve as mentors and tutors for kids. The Denton ISD school they have adopted is Borman Elementary. There, they help fourth-graders with their reading, writing, and math skills in preparation for their TAAS test This experience has been one that benefits not only the kids and the community, but themselves too. In the words of one colony member, "Serving others helps shape our future contributions and leadership potential."

An Academic Diversion

The Theta Zeta Chapter at San Diego is proud to have done their part in the Adopt-A-School Program. The first major event planned for them was a Halloween fun house and dance for the students of a neighboring grade school, Linda Vista. The fun house, held October 30th, at the Hahn University Center, provided a wonderful time to all of the children.

A Matter of Responsibility


Paul Silverman, **Stephen F. Austin's** vice president, once wrote: "As Delts, we are con-


stantly faced with dilemma of role confusion. We find that we must take on roles as a student, Delt, son, boyfriend, and many other roles intertwined in our lives. The one role that was missing in my life was that of a teacher/mentor. Until the summer of 1994, I never gave it much thought."

Then Silverman went to Karnea. At first, when they talked a bit about the Adopt-A-School program, Silverman thought it sounded like the Fraternity was embarking on yet one more project to boost our public relations. His change in attitude came the Friday morning of Karnea when he actually experienced what Adopt-A-School

destination was a place called Bankhead Center, which in 1992, had been cut off from the U.S. Post Office due to the danger of the neighborhood. In his words, "I must admit we were pretty scared on the way."

What Silverman found most surprising was not the amount of crime, or the condition of the facility but the difference he and his fellow Delts made on the childrens' lives and the impact they had on them. "By playing with these children," reflected Silverman, "We all felt how much just a little bit of our time could make in the lives of underprivileged children. Also to our surprise, even though these children came from





I think we all grew as Delts and as men by our experience."

When Silverman returned to school that fall, the first thing he did was to implement the program in his own chapter. He picked Operation Head Start as their location because he knew that it would have the same type of children he had met at Bankhead.

"I have now seen the change of attitude in my chapter that I experienced at Bankhead, Silverman said. "We enjoy our weekly visits with the children and have grown to be quite fond of most of them. I encourage any chapter that hasn't started this great program to do so. I promise that not only will you make a difference in the children's lives, but they will do the same for you. Remember the first line of our oath: 'I believe in Delta Tau Delta for the education of youth.' Adopt-A-School is the perfect chance to honor your oath."

How to Get Involved

If your campus already has an Adopt-A-School program in place.

Contact your campus Greek advisor and student coordinators and express your interest in the program. The Greek advisor can give you updated information on the program as well as the names and phone numbers of the program directors or student coordinators. Let the Greek advisor and student coordinators know that Adopt-A-School is Delta Tau Delta's international service project and that you would like to take a leading role with the

Typically, chapters begin an advanced relationship with Adopt-A-School by volunteering with the existing program and developing rapport with the adopted school. Once the principal and teachers get to know you and trust your commitment with the children in their school, they may want

your chapter to become involved with additional activities. This relationship building will take more than one semester, so don't try to move too fast. Eventually one of your chapter members may become the student coordinator. You may also want to see if there is a specific activity or program that your chapter can aid the school in implementing. Your involvement in the program is limited only by the bounds of your imagination and creativity. If your campus is NOT listed as one that already has an Adopt-A-School program in place and you've discussed this with your Dean, Greek Advisor or Student Affairs Director, read on.

Step One

Contact Garth Eberhart at the Central Office by calling or emailing him at dtdgbe@deltshq.org and let him know you are starting the Adopt-A-School program.

Step Two

Create strucplan for the program's success. Find

an advisor for the program. The campus Greek advisor is the best choice.

Decide what plan of involvement the program will follow. Will it be limited exclusively to Delts? Will you invite another fraternity or sorority to join you? Will participation be available to the entire campus? Many campuses have started with a fraternity paired with a sorority and have found this to be successful. You may wish to limit involvement in the program at its inception and open it up to other groups after it has been established for a few semesters.

Determine where you want to volunteer. Two things that need to be taken into consideration are proximity of the school to campus and needs of the school. Not only do you want to volunteer relatively close to campus, but you want to do so at a school that needs your help.

Refer to the Adopt-A-School Introductory Manual. It is filled with helpful hints and information.

Step Three

Set up a meeting with the principal of the school you wish to adopt. Your goals for this meeting are to introduce that person to the concept of Adopt-A-School and decide what level of involvement is necessary.

Share with the principal the background of the program and all the necessary details.

Let the principal dictate the format of the program by determining what the school's

needs are. Then you can design the program based upon those needs.

This step could occur over several meetings. Don't expect it all to happen at one sitting because the principal may want to share the idea with the faculty and assess how the program could be of the most benefit to the school.

Step Four

Recruit volunteers. Start this process after the principal has determined the needs of the school and a program has been designed that will meet those needs.

Make sure that the program is well-publicized so that you reach as many volunteers as possible.

You can either be selective in your acceptance of volunteers by reviewing applications or you can have an open admissions policy. There are benefits to both. Starting off small is better than starting off too big.

Step Five

Schedule and hold an orientation meeting for the volunteers and teachers. The purpose of this meeting is to allow the volunteers to become familiar with the school, its policies, and the faculty.

It is probably best to hold this meeting at the school itself instead of on your campus.

Although you and the principal together will decide on a time, make sure that both the faculty and the volunteers will be able to attend. Immediately after school is probably best; however, some campuses have scheduled the meeting at 8:00 a.m. to see how committed the volunteers are.

Allow the principal to go over important school

policies (fire and tornado drills, dress codes, etc.).

Allow volunteers and teachers time to meet together. If each volunteer will work with a specific teacher, it is a good idea to let teacher and volunteer go to a classroom and talk about the student or the work the volunteer will do.

Step Six

Begin the program. Many successful schools have used the fall term to select a school, recruit volunteers, and design the program with the actual volunteer work beginning with the spring semester. If you are ready to implement volunteers in the same semester as locating the school, that is great. Just make sure you have taken adequate steps to ensure program success.

Make sure that volunteers sign-in before every visit and that they fill out an evaluation after every session. The school will probably want them to sign-in for security purposes and it also allows the program director to track the volunteers. Evaluation after every session is important because it will allow the program director to determine how effective Adopt-A-School has been.

As program director, you should visit the school once every couple of weeks to review sign-in sheets and evaluations. If a volunteer is having an attendance problem or gives the student he or she works with poor ratings, look into the situation and take steps to remedy it. Let's take every step to ensure that Adopt-A-School is successful.

Alumni have played various roles in the progress and development of our Fraternity. As recently as fifty years ago, Delta Tau Delta was alumni driven. In the 1940s, for instance, we had 125 alumni chapters and only 65 undergraduate chapters. Now, nearly the reverse is true. Since the 1940's, fundamental changes have taken place on college campuses and within our youth. These forces have impacted the Greek system with such severity that some naysayers have prematurely announced its demise. We believe our Fraternity's vitality. indeed its very existence, absolutely depends on the involvement of our alumnilike you. Without your help, our beloved Fraternity could be flirting with disaster. We were alumni-driven once, we can do it again!

Why do Delt undergraduate chapters need your help?

A Call to Delt Alumni

College students today have experienced more instability in their lifetimes than almost any other generation. They are surrounded by violence. They are bombarded by omnipresent mind-altering substances.

They often come from fractured families and lack the influence of positive male role models in their lives. Many don't even know how to communicate with adult males, but sorely want to. To ease the pain caused by these instabilities, some fraternity men "medicate" themselves through obsessive behavior related to alcohol, drugs and abusive relationships with others. For the Greek world and Delta Tau Delta, these problems are further compounded by decreasing college enrollment; competition from first-rate coed dormitories, and negative "animal-house" publicity. With all this evidence of instability, is there any wonder that predictions of demise have surfaced?

Why does greater alumni involvement help? One with an engineering background would be reminded of the equilateral triangle—the Δ —the most stable of structural elements, undeformable by any external force.

The triangle's base, its foundation, is the "Active Alumni." Without strong alumni involvement, the foundational leg of the triangle is fractured, and the triangle loses its stability. On the other hand, strong alumni involvement in every one of our chapters provides the grass roots stability and guidance for our undergraduates that will ensure our Fraternity's continuing success into the next century.

Why Get Involved?

- · Did Delta Tau Delta influence your life? Was it positive? Could it have been better?
- · Do you place a high priority on education? On helping young men grow and mature?
- · Do you like the idea of renewing fraternity bonds and meeting other Delts?
- · Does association with Delt youth make you feel young again?
- · Can undergraduates benefit from your life's experiences, pitfalls, unpredictabilities, and its joys and successes?
- · Can young Delts benefit from your values? Your faith? Your hope for a better world?
- · Can undergraduates learn from your career path as a businessman, entrepreneur, doctor, lawyer, engineer, or other profession?
- · Can you help them along their career path?
- · Do you have experience in finances, real estate, construction, or insurance that might help a chapter's House Corporation?
- · Do you have the time to make a more major commitment to become an Assistant, or ulti-

mately, Chapter Advisor? If the answer to any of these questions is "yes," then what ever your talents, the Fraternity now claims them.

We realize that you may have questions about getting involved with an undergraduate Delt Chapter. The following are some common concerns:

- Time You can have a positive influence on a chapter and its undergraduate members through traditional positions such as a Chapter Advisor or House Corporation officer, or in a less time consuming role as an Assistant Advisor or Alumnus Mentor.
- · Liability The Fraternity's insurance policy covers all official volunteers, provided they abide by governing laws. Additionally, all chapters must now follow the Member Responsibility Guidelines, which demand both individual and chapter responsibility.
- · I'm Too Old Things haven't changed that much - our undergraduates do value alumni guidance and perspective. The sharing of life experiences, not just Fraternity experiences, is timeless.

Please feel free to contact any member of the Delt 2000 Committee with any specific questions that you have. We call upon you now for your time and your talents. Please give serious consideration to repledging Delta Tau Delta and becoming a member of Delt 2000 by serving a nearby Delt Chapter.

You can become a Delt 2000 Mentor by talking to Delt undergraduates at least twice a year, after dinner or at a chapter meeting, about your experiences, your career, your values. Alternatively, you can become a member of the Chapter's House Corporation, fulfilling the important task of maintaining competitive housing on our campuses. Or if you can afford the time commitment, vou can become an Assistant Advisor or ultimately Chapter Advisor.

Please bear in mind that you can be involved in any Delt Chapter—be it at your alma mater or a nearby chapter. Delt chapters in non-urban areas especially need help from alumni living in their vicinity.

A program called "Twenty Tasks" has been developed to help you assist the chapter you work with and help us recognize your efforts. This program was unveiled last summer at the John Fisher Certification Conferences held in Chicago and Atlanta. Over 300 alumni attended these events.

These "Twenty Tasks" are completed over the course of a year. Completion of these tasks will be tracked and reported to Division Presidents, Division Vice Presidents and Chapter Advisors in an annual summary. With these tasks being tracked, we will be able to provide better service to our chapters.

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Serving Those Who Follow A Report from 8 The 1997 John Fisher Certification Conferences

f we truly believe in the precepts of educating youth and inspiring maturity. If we truly believe that Delta Tau Delta is a seamless organization.

If we truly believe in giving as we have received, then we must be mindful of our responsibility as alumni to serve those who have followed

Having men in place to serve the Fraternity as alumni volunteers in our undergraduate chapters is an absolute necessity. It's no coincidence that our best chapters almost without fail reap the benefit of having strong alumni leadership.

But how do we recruit these brothers? And once they say yes, as so many have in recent years through the Delt 2000 initiative, how do we give them the tools to be effective in providing quality guidance to undergraduate men?

At a time when active membership in traditional men's civic, fraternal and social organizations is plummeting, Delta Tau Delta is blessed to have a corps of brothers who continually answer the challenge and give back. Yet it's a challenge that is never fully met. The need to engage alumni in the work of the Fraternity never ceases.

With that in mind, the Fraternity conceived, planned and successfully implemented the largest alumni training effort in its history last summer.

The first John Fisher Alumni Certification Conferences, conducted in Chicago and Atlanta, attracted nearly 300 Delt alumni. Some attendees have been alumni volunteers for decades. Others had recently made a commitment to become actively involved for the first time more than 40 years after their graduation. And for some brothers, it was their first Delt event as alumni. They came while making the transition from committed undergraduate, class of 1997, to active alumnus.

The purpose of the Fisher Alumni Certification Conferences was simple: To make a difference in the lives of undergraduate Delts and to further the progress of our chapters. The two-day conferences were named in honor of their benefactor, John Fisher, *Tennessee '38*. Brother Fisher's generous contribution to the Delta Tau Delta Alumni Foundation allowed alumni to attend the conference with their expenses covered. He whole-heartedly committed to the program because of his belief that bringing maturity and sound judgment back to our chapters is the best way to serve today's students.

The training was facilitated largely by Delts experienced in teaching from a values-based foundation. The conference staff was augmented by professionals with particular expertise in that area. Topics included:

- How to plan and lead a productive chapter retreat.
- How to help young Delts identify and raise their personal and ethical values.
- How to facilitate chapter leaders in completing and achieving their Annual Achievement Agreement, the planning document used by our chapters.
- How to attain core competencies for being an effective volunteer leader in Delta Tau Delta.
- How house corporations can design and execute a three-year business plan.

Were the conferences successful? Without question. Beyond the shear affirmation of the Fraternity's vitality and commitment to its mission as measured by the number of alumni attending, there has been a significantly positive response during the 1997-98 school year from alumni volunteers who have been reinvigorated by the experience. There also has been an added dividend of new men working in the chapters with the skills necessary to

make a difference.

More than one attendee was heard to call the gathering a "regional conference for alumni." And much like attending a regional conference or Karnea as an undergraduate, the experience was such that brothers went home recommitted to the challenge.

The feedback is strong that Delta Tau Delta must continue to offer ongoing training for its alumni volunteers. Besides giving these men skills that are of value in their own lives, this training also provides the ability for alumni to pass along this "new-found knowledge" to young Delts. In doing so, the torch is passed and we demonstrate to our youngest members that life-long learning is a value that we live.

"Alumni need to take more time when visiting a chapter. Remember, this is the '90s. It's important to meet with all members at a chapter and not just the executive board. n the words of Queen Elizabeth II, for me 1997 was an *annus horribilus*. During the year, I grieved at the losses of two young Delts—Chris Brothers from a tragic car accident on his way to a spring break vacation, and Don Castleberry from sudden heart failure, caused by a rare genetic disease.

As a former Cambridge man and Anglophile, I took the death of the Princess of Wales particularly hard, as I did that of adolescent idol (and former Delt pledge) John Denver. It was a year intermittently spent contemplating the legacy of each of these unique individuals, so eloquently eulogized by those of us left behind, and the void felt by their passing.

It sparked an internal dialogue on "the duty of death" – our responsibility "I felt that if I didn't in some way acknowledge the complexity of his character—the flaws as well as the more appealing parts of him—then the appreciation would sound just like hero worship," Costas recalled of his friend, an alcoholic who eventually achieved sobriety. "The facts of his life did not render untrue what was magnificent about him. If anything, they made it more poignant."

So Costas spoke to Mantle's magnificent as well as his darker side: "There was greatness in him, but vulnerability, too...God knows no one is perfect. God also knows there's something special about a hero."

And who cannot forget, Princess Diana's

brother Charles's frank inclusion of his beloved sister's struggles with bulimia, depression and suicide along with her host of charitable activities?

"Don't speak ill of the dead" has been the pervasive philosophy guiding culogies for hundreds of years.

Even if those being eulogized led lessthan-perfect lives,

in death the slate is miraculously wiped clean. Sinners become saints, transgressions are forgiven, and tarnished lives become sparkling clean.

Because of our media-intensive world, we know every excruciating detail of the crimes, legal wrangles, substance abuses and sexual escapades of public figures. When they die, hiding all of that would be at the very least disingenuous, and at most a flat-out lie.

How then do you balance their lives in death?

Our culture is deeply rooted in the

belief that it's simply not polite to speak negatively about the dead, explains Gerald Larue, emeritus professor of religion at the University of Southern California.

"We try to look on the bright side, the right side of what a person's

> done and give meaning to that person's life by emphasizing the positive aspects," he said. "It's an education in social ethics...I think those people who know [the deceased] real-

ize that their faults are there, and we forgive them their stupidities."


At Commerce Secretary Ron Brown's funeral, he was eulogized in a series of memorials as a dynamic, gifted political leader and skilled negotiator. But references to a special prosecutor's investigations of his financial affairs at the time of his death were never directly mentioned.

At Richard Nixon's well-attended funeral, the former president received a hero's send-off. He was remembered largely as a great statesman and leader by everyone from the Rev. Billy Graham to President Clinton, the emphasis on his accomplishments rather than his stupendous fall from grace.

And at Delt William Brennan's funeral this spring, memorial services reflected on the Supreme Court Justice's rigid adherence to his principles and contributions to civil rights and liberties, rather than his categorization as a crusty old curmudgeon whose manner and style was often more of a hindrance than a help to the process.

Perhaps the desire to keep remarks positive is strongest when our heroes pass away. Their eulogies are more than just highlights of a life lived, says Virginia Lynn Fry, author of Part of Me Died, Too. "As a culture, when we're grieving for a public figure, the question is more of what's been lost. For someone like Mickey Mantle, his death is not just the death of an individual, but also pieces of our childhood, our belief that baseball is good in the face of reality.

"But I think it would be useful," she



to adequately summarize the contribution of friends and family members to our own lives and the world around them as well as a renewed since of responsibility to make of our own lives, something sufficiently worth remembering by those who follow.

When NBC sportscaster Bob Costas was preparing his eulogy for Mickey Mantle's funeral, he was faced with a formidable task: how to memorialize a friend, a hero, one of baseball's greatest legends—whose personal life was fraught with problems.

says, "if we admit into eulogies pieces of the whole person, to say that as much as he was to us a symbol, he was also a human being with feelings as we all have. Even a statement as simple as that gives it balance, because otherwise the whole thing rings hollow."

While it is probable that some Delts, such as Ambassador Richardson, have been called upon to participate in memorial services and funerals for highly public figures, it is unavoidable that each of us, at some time in our lives, will be asked to eulogize a friend, coworker or family member in the midst of grief.

Grieving is a time when memories are important. Writing a eulogy can play a valuable role in the healing process, even if it is never delivered at a memorial service. Writing is a form of action that brings memories to the surface. It may not be easy, but writing serves as a catalyst for change. It is a catharsis. It provides lessons and food for thought. A eulogy is a way to proclaim your life, help the healing process and share the sadness laughter, joys and tears. Clearly, writing a eulogy is a gift that you give to yourself. Delivering it is a gift you give to others-and a gesture that your friends and family will not soon forget. It can be a positive experience at a time when nothing seems positive. It is a way to begin to find peace where you think there is only grief. It may take time before you fully appreciate the value of writing, but eventually you will agree and be glad you did it.

But how to you start?
Undergraduate Delts at the
University of Maryland struggled
to put into words their feelings of sadness and loss during the campus service
honoring their brother last spring.
Those who participated will attest that it

was probably the hardest thing they had ever done in their life. In his book, A

to Write a Eulogy, author Garry Schaeffer offers a step-by-step guide on delivering eulogies with this encouragement: "This is a difficult time for you. In your emotional state, you may find it difficult to concentrate. You can write and deliver a eulogy. Keep a positive attitude about it. Realize that everyone who will attend the memorial service will support you and appreciate your efforts. Don't worry about delivering a perfect speech. No one expects you to have the delivery of a great orator or the stage presence of an actor. Do the best you can, have faith that everything will be okay and most important, just be you-that is enough."

What a Eulogy Should Accomplish

Some people think a culogy should be an objective summation of a loved one's life. Some people think it should speak for everyone who is present at the funeral. Both of these assumptions are unrealistic.

A eulogy is much more simple. It should primarily covey the feelings and experiences of the person giving the eulogy. The most touching and meaningful eulogies are written from a subjective point of view—and from heart to heart. Don't feel compelled to write the

person's life story. Instead, tell your story. Clearly, the burden of the eulogy does not have to be yours alone. If you have the time, ask friends or relatives for their recollections and stories. In a eulogy, it is perfectly acceptable to say, "I was talking to Uncle Lenny about Ron; he reminded me of the time Ron came to our Thanksgiving dinner with half of his face clean-shaven and the other half bearded. It was Ron's funny way of showing that he

had mixed feelings about shaving off his beard.

Honesty if very important. In most cases, there will be a lot of positive things to say about your loved one. Once in a while, there is someone with more negative traits than positive qualities. If that is the case, remember, you don't have to say everything. Just be honest about the positive qualities and everyone will appreciate the eulogy.

Writing the Eulogy

Keep in mind that a eulogy—or any important document—is rarely written in one sitting. Instead, it is pieced together like a puzzle. The best way to gather your thoughts is to outline. Some people can sit down and write brilliantly off the top of their heads; and some people can speak extemporaneously and be cloquent. Most of us, however, should use outlines to write and notes to speak. Outlining the eulogy will:

- · Keep you focused;
- Prevent the eulogy from becoming disorganized
- Prevent the writing process from becoming a frustrating, painful chore

- Will help you explore your subject thoroughly so you won't forget important details
- Will break down your task into small, manageable pieces.

The best way to outline is by clustering or "mind-mapping". Clustering stimulates creative thinking because you do not have to explore one topic at a time. Instead, you are free to jump from one idea to the next, no matter how unrelated your thoughts may be. There is no logical order in clustering; the order is determined last.

Clustering loosens your thinking and puts you in an exploratory frame of mind. Write the name of the person in the middle of a large pieces of paper and circle it. Think of an area to explore. Draw a spoke out from the circle and write a key word or phrase that relates, i.e. "sense of humor." Keep doing this as ideas come to mind. After you have thought of many topics to write about, go back over the cluster and number the main ideas in the order in which they should be addressed. For now, it creates structure for your writing.

There are so many aspects of your loved one to write about; To stimulate your thoughts and help you focus on important ideas, you might find it helpful to answer some of the following questions:

- · How long did you know your loved one?
- How did you meet him/her?
- How did this person show his/her love for you and others?
- Was this person active in the community? If so, what contribution(s) were made?
- Is he/she active in professional or trade associations? In what ways?
- What were some of your loved one's most endearing qualities?
- How would you describe his/her relationship(s) with spouse, children, relatives and friends?
- What kind of mother, father, son daughter, friend, etc. was this person?
- If you had to think of one quality that

he or she will be remembered for, what would it be? Why?

- Why were you inspired to write a eulogy for this person?
- What are some of your fond memories of this person and how have those events affected your life?
- · What made your loved one happy?
- · What did he/she do to have fun?
- · What made him/her sad?
- How do you think he/she would want to be remembered?
- What attracted this person's friends to him/her?
- What did you learn about life from him/her?
- Is there a philosophy that this person lived by? What was it? Is there a story to illustrate this philosophy?
- What will you remember most about this person? Why? Do have a story to illustrate this?
- What did this person give to the world or the people around him or her.
- What were some of this person's favorite things—and what do these things say about him/her?

The Opening

There are many ways to introduce a eulogy. Ideally, an opening sentence should draw in your audience and it should be thought-provoking. A powerful, spiritual or amusing quote can be effective. Anecdotes, like quotes, should reveal a quality that your loved one possessed. Humor is acceptable-even encouraged-in many cultures, but it must be relevant and in good taste. Humor is important because people need to remember the positive, the joy, the good times. The also need a release from the sadness; humor provides temporary relief. Other openings include philosophical inspiration, problems overcome, a question important to the deceased, a sensational comparison or a statistic particularly if the person has died from a disease for which there is no known cure.

The Middle of the Eulogy

After the opening comes the body. Start

with the first topic in your outline. Throughout the eulogy, remember to insert stories, where appropriate. Stories bring a eulogy to life. They make it personal and can add humor.

As you write, new ideas will pop up. You know that some thoughts are as fleeting as shooting stars—brilliant yet short-lived—so seize them. Jot down notes immediately – you can always rearrange them.

The List Eulogy

A list eulogy should be introduced with a compelling opening. Next, make an introductory statement, such as "Ron was truly one in a billion. I can think of at least eight ways that he made the world a better place..." After this set-up, present your list, one item at a time.

The Letter Eulogy

For some people, writing a letter is easier than the above format. It is an easy approach in which you pretend to be writing a letter to your loved one, a friend, relative, or someone imaginary. In the letter, talk about everything in your outline. Let your thoughts flow freely as you would in a personal letter. Don't worry about transitions between sections; an informal tone is acceptable.

How to End the Eulogy

The ending should be a brief paragraph that wraps up everything into a neat package. A good conclusion gives the listener a feeling of closure. A conclusion is not the place to throw in miscellaneous thoughts that should have been included earlier; nor is it the place to start a new train of thought. Instead, a good conclusion accomplishes at least one of the following:

- It summarizes how your loved one impacted your life.
- It restates an important point briefly.
- It raises an important question and answers it; e.g., what does the future hold or where do we go from here?
- It uses a quote to support one of the themes of the eulogy.

 It illustrates the need for a change in attitude or behavior.

Delivering the Eulogy

This may be the most difficult speech you will ever make. In many ways, it may be the most rewarding. It is important to realize that people are not going to judge you. They will be very supportive. No matter what happens, it's okay. If you break down in the middle of your speech, everyone will understand. Take a moment to compose yourself, then continue. There is no reason to be embarrassed. Remember, giving a eulogy is a noble gesture that people will appreciate and admire.

If you are nervous before delivering the eulogy, breathe deeply and tell yourself that everything will be fine. Look around at your relatives and friends and realize that they are with you 100%. Realize that it is acceptable to read the eulogy without making eye contact with the audience, if that would be easier for you. Take your time. Do the best you can. No one expects you have the delivery of a great orator or the stage presence of an actor. Just be you.

Cabaret, The Godfather and The French Connection top the film charts and Pink Floyd releases Dark Side of the Moon. A young woman named Sonya Gill answers an ad in the Indianapolis Star through a personnel agency. Who would have thought that that simple act would lead to a twenty-five year career with Delta Tau Delta?

Certainly not Frank Price, the then-Director of Program Development with whom she interviewed, or even Sonya herself who credits her job offer with a spelling bee victory from a West Virginia business college.

Sonva started her career with the Fraternity June 1, 1972, when the headquarters was at 3665 Washington Boulevard, a stately old mansion on Indianapolis's affluent north side. Beginning in the typing pool, she was soon doing whatever was asked of her, using Selectric typewriters and an address-ograph machine to address envelopes for mailings to the "official family"

and volunteers. She says, "We were fortunate enough to have on staff a lady named Margaret Loyal, who was pretty good at running a multilith machine. That's how we printed the opening-of-school mass mailings and documents. We had to type those items on special white forms and Margaret made masters from them to use on the multilith machine."

Because of her competency and grace under pressure, Sonya was soon named executive secretary to chief fraternity executive Al Sheriff and, shortly thereafter, moved with the office to its new location at 4755 Kingsway Drive. During the stay there, Margaret retired and the ancient multilith machine was replaced by a high speed copy machine. At the time, the membership database was managed by a firm in Boston. Changes and additions were carefully typed on special paper with an optical character recognition (OCR) typewriter ribbon. Every six to eight weeks the sheets were sent to Boston where they were scanned and the database updated. As one would imagine,

address changes were sometimes delayed for eight weeks and address labels had to be ordered pretty far in advance. Yet, it was still an improvement over the old system.

In March 1982, due to changes in the tax law, the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation was created as a 501(c)(3) non profit organization. She and Al moved down the hall into separate quarters and set about preparing the Foundation to launch a major capital campaign.

At the 1982 Karnea in St. Louis, Al officially handed over the Fraternity reins to Gale Wilkerson. Gill reflects, "I especially remember the surprise slide show at the Karnea banquet at which they roasted Al—respectfully, of course."

In August 1984, just a couple of weeks before the first Karnea at which the Foundation would be present as its own entity, Al discovered he had colon cancer and would require immediate surgery. Sonya was informed that she would be expected to carry out the plans that had been set in place...but without Al's presence. Her husband, Chuck, volunteered to drive her to Columbus, Ohio. They had just put a new muffler on their car and just as they were nearing the interstate exit for the hotel, the back seat of the car caught on fire. The repair shop had forgotten to put the heat shield back on! All the donor cards Gill had painstakingly maintained for two years were sitting on the back seat, plus all the donor buttons, etc. A "good Samaritan", stopping to help, pulled out the burning back seat and saved everything. The cards were singed a little around the edges from the heat but everything was pretty much still intact. But by this time it had started raining. She and Chuck arrived much later at the hotel, drenched and with no back seat. Looking back, Sonya said, "I'm sure the first impression we made on

Though Al was able to return to work on a light schedule for a few months following his surgery, his battle with cancer was taking its toll. Sonya took his mail to his home on days when he was up to it, and assumed the reins of day-to-day Foundation operations with his blessing and support. Al passed away on February 5, 1986, a sad day for all who knew him. In a special Rainbow tribute to Sheriff, Fred C. Tucker, Jr., then the Foundation's chairman, wrote: "Sonya worked so closely with Al that she has been able to assume responsibility for the Foundation's complex day-to-day demands, including carrying on the annual alumni contribution program and coordinating the affairs of the board. Her loyalty and capabilities are extraordinary in every respect, and they are invaluable during this interim period of searching for a new Foundation president."

The following May, Peggy Evans came to work for the Foundation to help Gill keep up with an ever increasing workload. That September, George Loomis, *M.I.T.* '49, was named president of the Foundation and the Fraternity moved yet again into new offices owned by Delt P.R. Duke near Keystone at the Crossing on Indianapolis' far north side.

During Loomis' three year tenure with the Foundation, they launched a \$6,000,000 capital campaign to raise money to endow the educational programs so vital to the undergraduate chapters. Gill managed the Annual Fund and the office and assisted with the capital campaign. By fall of 1987 Gil Standley had joined the staff as Director of Alumni Development. Together, the Fraternity and the Educational Foundation had bought a computer system for word processing. The Foundation purchased a fundraising software package to help with tracking capital campaign and annual fund gifts, making gift acknowledgement a more efficient process, though the database was still maintained out of Boston.

In August 1989, Wilkerson handed over the Fraternity reins to Ken File, *Kansas State* '81, and became the Foundation's third president. Gil Standley entered private industry and Mark Helmus replaced him as Director of Alumni Development.

In July 1992, the Fraternity and Foundation took a bold step and brought the membership database in-house.


Gill says, "That was quite a summer. We installed a great membership database geared to Greek organizations, more sophisticated word processing capabilities and interoffice e-mail."

In 1994, Wilkerson left the Foundation to pursue other interests and Gill was named vice president in charge of the Annual Fund. In June 1995, Helmus left the Foundation and, once again, says Gill, "It was just Peggy and me."

Says Norval Stephens, current Foundation Chairman, "When Sonya took over the Annual Fund, she immediately rethought the steps we were taking to find brothers who had been lost, to appeal to brothers who had not given before and to identify brothers who might give the Fraternity more time, more talent or more of their treasure. As we have discovered, thanks to Sonya, that's the right order. It takes an amazing amount of volunteer time to accomplish what we have accomplished. You simply don't get volunteers to work if they are not well supported at the Central Office. Thanks to Sonya Gill, our Foundation volunteers are extremely well supported."

In 1996, Ken File joined the Foundation staff, focusing mainly on development work









in the areas of major gifts and planned giving. The offices moved (again) to the Indianapolis suburb of Carmel and installed a sophisticated computer system with a full-time systems administrator and a sophisticated web site. Says Gill, "I am anxious to see how all this will work. I can hardly mentally keep up with all the changes on the information highway. I am trying to at least be able to stay in the slow lane and not get run over."

Gill enjoys her job immensely, ranking the variety and the challenge near the top, followed by the great peo-

with whom to work," she says, "The staff and board have always encouraged me to take on as much responsibility as I am able. I have learned much over the years. I have been treated with great respect and have worked with people from various walks of life. I know no other job could have given me these things in such great measure. Most of all, I love knowing that what I do helps make a positive difference in the lives of young men all over the country and even in Canada."

As she looks back, Gill has witnessed a lot of changes in Delta Tau Delta and in the Greek system as a whole. When she came on board in 1972, the fraternity system was still going through the effects of the turbulent 60s and early 70s when the Students for a Democratic Society was active and drugs were a major part of college life. The Fraternity lost chapters from some major universities and colleges during this period, as did all fraternities. During the '80s, fraternities made a comeback and it was once again popular to be Greek. In the early 90s, membership started to decline again.

Gill says, "One thing that has become prevalent since I began working for the Fraternity is alcohol abuse and its inherent negative effect on college campuses. In fraternities, it has lead to serious injury, deaths, gang rape and abuse of the shelters. Fraternities are engaged in lawsuits that are very costly and mostly related to alcohol abuse. Many young men come from one-parent families and need positive male role models. I think Delta Tau Delta is on the right track with its mission and values statement and the teaching of basic moral and ethical principles to our young men."

Gill has a lot of memories from her tenure with the Fraternity. One of those is from the 1986 Karnea in Lexington, Kentucky, when she and her whole family were called up to the podium during the banquet to receive a gift from the Board in recognition of her work for the Foundation during those difficult years of Al Sheriff's sickness and death—a trip to London for her and her husband. Another memory is the Board's surprise recognition of her 25th

anniversary—a beautiful gold necklace with a diamond-studded pendant that, in her words, "I shall cherish forever."

Outside of the Fraternity, Gill's top interest is her husband Chuck and two daughters Jenni and Beth. Jenni married Ball State Delt Mike Engledow and Gill is quick to point out that, during his tenure as chapter president, the chapter received the coveted Hugh Shields Award for Chapter Excellence—acknowledging the top ten chapters in the Fraternity. Mike and Jenni have two young daughters of their own and, since they live in the Indianapolis area, are able to see "Grammie" quite often. Her other daughter and husband live in Marshfield, MA so she doesn't see her quite as often. Sonva also enjoys golf, cross-stitching and quilting and is active as a lay leader in the Presbyterian Church.

Stephens says, "The attitude of doing it right the first time, doing it with a smile and doing it as quickly as possible has emanated from Sonva Gill for 25 years and has "infected" the entire rest of the staff. When we reorganized several years ago, it was clear to all of us that it was really Sonya Gill who had been running the Annual Fund. It was an easy decision to make her Vice President for the Annual Fund and an officer of the Corporation. We could find nothing in our by-laws that would prevent a woman from holding that job-and I dare say we would have changed the by-laws had we found something. Working with Sonya these last three years, I found that she worried every detail more than I did. And if she said she was worried about something, I very quickly learned that I better be worried about it too. If she said things were going well, I could be assured that there were no surprises."

Sonya really doesn't believe how valuable she is to the Fraternity. President Stephens has asked that those of you who have come to know and appreciate her over these years call her or drop her a note to congratulate her on her 25th year of serving you and me and the thousands of living Delts everywhere who owe so much to her. We've told her. You've now read this. You tell her too. Thank you. And thank you, Sonya.



A Story of Serendipity

ou enroll in college, you go to orientation, you begin attending classes and you pledge a fraternity. The first few weeks of college marks the beginning of a new era in a young man's life. And in four or five years you find yourself moving on into the world, hopefully a wiser, smarter and grateful person. And along that path you have a group of brothers that have become people you can trust, depend on and lean on in hard times. People that you didn't even know a few years back, people from different parts of the country, different life styles, different values. And that's the mysterious beauty of the Fraternity—the opportunity to generate and nourish those friendships. As you grow older in life you keep those friends, some on a personal basis, some on a personal and professional basis.

That is the scenario of each and every chapter within the Delt system. But Delts helping Delts can even be on a grander scale.

This is the story of two such Delts. Back in the spring issue of *The Rainbow* we printed an article about Delt Clay Valenti, *Maryland '86*, who was struggling to make a movie. This wasn't about a person who had some wild loosely thought up notion to be in the movies—rather a Delt who was seriously committed to creating stories on film.

Derrell McBrayer, Alabama '75, a lawyer from Birmingham, AL, read the article about Valenti and his ambitions and took notice. Last year McBrayer had set up a production company for a friend who wanted to make films and thought that he and Valenti should at least talk to each other. As McBrayer states, "I knew a young aggressive guy who wanted to make movies. From what I read in the article, I saw Clay as an aggressive young director

who needed financial help to see his visions come to life on the screen. It just seemed a natural partnership."

Valenti had called Rainbow Editor Kerry
Harding on the recommendation from a mutual friend regarding the possibility of doing an article. Valenti had been trying to get the project going through Hollywood ties for a couple of years with no luck. "It's one of the most difficult things in the world to do for a first timer to get a movie made in Hollywood,"

Since the article appeared a number of Delts have contacted Valenti about the project. All of them were actors interested in acting in the project—except for McBrayer.

"This was my last attempt to try and see this through," said Valenti. He figured there must be somebody out there, some Delt, who might take an interest in helping him.

"I remembered that, back in college, a few friends and I would always say, 'Hey, we can travel across country and stay in Delt houses along the way...well, it's kind of like that. It's about meeting people you've never met before and, because of your fraternal bond, you have common values, a friendship and a bit of goodwill."

Valenti had a few set backs in the past year regarding his family, losing some very people very close to him. He felt he had to complete the project for his loved ones. And the fact that he has met Derrell and that he's taken so much interest in him and his desire to reach a certain level in the movie business is a blessing. "He truly believes in me and wants to help me in anyway he can. I am fortunate to have had the opportunity to meet him," Valenti adds.

Valenti finished preproduction and began shooting in October in Baltimore, MD. The only drawback was that Valenti is currently working on a project in Montana called *The Horse Whisperer*, directed by and acted in by Robert Redford.

"I'm in a bit of a crunch," says Valenti.
"Working on a Redford project is a wonderful experience—a great learning experience—but we won't be finished until the near end of September, which puts me behind schedule on my own project." He has the choice of working on this or quitting to go do his own project—a hard choice for the filmmaker.

What lies in the future for Valenti? "We have to get this one done first—that's the hard part. But in the best, brightest light, it turns out good and I get the opportunity to do more projects."

Two projects in Valenti's back pocket are *Baggataway*, about a family legacy of lacrosse players and *The Jimmy Lover* about a family of watermen that live on Smith Island of the Chesapeake Bay.

While *The Rainbow* can't always promise that it's efforts will result in these kinds of successful coincidences, we *can* always hope.



Darken, a former chapter president at Bowling Green State, debuted the start of his second career with the network premier of *The Price of Peace*.

The Price of Peace is a one hour television program that weaves together three personal stories from the World War II era. The program recalls the details of lives set against the backdrop of a World War, and is a story of recollec-

tion, inquiry and ultimately, affirmation.

After a 25 year career in retail sports, Darken retired with his wife, Nancy, to Hilton Head Island, SC in 1983. By 1990 they had moved to Nashville, TN where they could be close to their youngest son, Eric, and his recording career.

Always interested in history and travel, they became members of Sister Cities International. When a museum retrospective of WWII photos

was launched, the Darkens offered the services of their other son, Brett, a commercial director, to make a short introductory film for the exhibition. "It just got rolling from there," says Wood. "As we filmed Joe (the author of the exhibits' photos) Brett and I both felt like there was a bigger story there, so we press on..."

The three subjects came from different backgrounds: Dr. Ann Jennalie Cook was a child growing up in the tiny town of Wewoka, Oklahoma, whose weekly letters to her father in the Engineer Corps were preserved for fifty years.

Henry Hipsher came from the hills of Appalachia, tried to enlist in the U.S. Army three times, and each time was denied. Then he was drafted, trained, and shipped out. Like so many other Americans at that time, he set foot upon the shores of Omaha Beach before he set foot in New York or Chicago.

Joe Thompson came from a military family, his father having served in the artillery in World War One. He was successful in college, and was about to pursue a medical career when the war called. Like many others, he went to England in 1942, and didn't see American soil for three years straight. He rose to Captain and company commander at the age of 23,a nd by war's end had flown 90 missions (the Memphis Belle flew 26).

The production blends episodic storytelling with Mr. Thompson's still photographs of life between battles, the original correspondence from Ann Jennalie Cook's private collection and war footage from the National Archives in Washington, DC.

"It's a long, detailed process," said Darken about his first venture into producing a film, "but you get to use lots of different skills, and that makes it challenging. It took about a year to make the program, but yet another two years to find the right broadcast home for it. The fact that you have to live with a project for so long is a good motivator to make sure you've got an excellent story to start with."





Delt Honored for Cold War Spying

Nearly 39 years after he flew secret U.S. Navy spy missions over the Soviet Union, John B. Shattuck, *Colorado '52*, received the Naval Commendation Medal from Senator Ben Nighthorse Campbell during a special ceremony at Boulder's Regal Harvest House. The medal was in recognition not only of Shattuck's assignment to collect satellite launch information, but also for flying at high speeds into Russian territory testing military defenses.

"We would go as far as we could, and then we would get a coded thing saying turn around and get the hell out of there," he said.

The Defense Department lifted the top secret status on the missions in February. "We would never talk about it until now," Shattuck said. "We couldn't even tell our wives, supposedly, where we were going."

Shattuck said although the missions were dangerous, he was having fun. "Sputnik had been launched by the Russians and they were way ahead of us in the space program, and we wanted to find out what the parameters of the launch vehicle were—tailpipe temperature, fuel burn, what kind of fuel acceleration, all that kind of stuff."

Shattuck lived in Morocco and when he received word that the Russians were going to launch a satellite, his squadron would board a plane to a base in Adana, Turkey—the same base used for U2 spy plane launches.

He said his squadron would fly out of Adana and reach altitudes of 40,000 feet above the Russian launch pad near the Caspian Sea.

"Somehow, and I still don't know how we knew, but we knew when the launches were going to be. Very, very big-time spy stuff going on there with that," he said. "The goal was to intercept the telementy the Russian people were getting back off as to how their big rocket was operating."

His wife, Mary Lou, said she was pleased that he received the medal. She said not knowing what her husband's mission was at the time was not too much of a problem.

"The truth is, we were having the time of our lives over there," she said. for the last 18 years, he specializes in cytologic and hemotologic diagnoses.

When asked why he donates his work, Miller does not hesitate to answer. "For the kids. The kids in the shelter don't have anybody looking out for them. If you give them something to hang on to, they do appreciate it," Miller said. He first became aware of the idea through a mailing received from a man in Bridgeport, Conn. The man made wooden toys and donated them to a hospital in the area. Miller replied to the article and received diagrams on how to make wooden cars, airplanes and other toys. With a chuckle, Miller admitted he "wings" his creations, not following the diagrams to the letter. He also admitted he does not use one particular type of wood. Using a scroll saw and more than 150 paint colors, he goes to work in one of two work stations—a wood shop where he does the cutting and a room inside his house to assemble the toys and paint them. Miller said time is no object in making one of his creations. "It doesn't make any difference if it's two minutes or three or four hours, whatever it takes," Miller said. "I'm retired, and I enjoy doing it." Children at the center have tagged Miller with a nickname to describe his nature and talent. "At the hospital, the kids call me 'Mr. Santa Claus," Miller said with a smile. Tommie Lilly, executive director of the Women's Center of East Texas, said the gifts Miller gives to the center bring smiles to many of the children. "His gifts really put a lot of light in the children's eyes. It's amazing to see the children pick out a wooden toy that suits their personality and take it with them. Toys at the center are either kept for children to play with at the center or given to them to take home. The gifts help the children escape from everything, Miller said. "It gives them something to take back other than their illness or their problems at the shelter," How long will Miller continue to make his creations and donate them? "As long as I'm able to do it, he said. "I really enjoy what I do, and I do it simply for the kids."



Todd later was named to the U.S. Davis Cup squad as a replacement for another player who was unable to compete.

BASKETBALL

The American Basketball League had a 30-year reunion in August and announced its all time team selections. Named as the ABA's all time coach was Bob Leonard. Indiana '54, who has been a radio and TV analyst for the NBA Indiana Pacers in recent years. The ABA, which went out of business nearly 20 years ago when several teams were merged into the NBA, held its reunion celebration in Indianapolis and many former players and coaches attended. As the Pacers ABA head coach for seven plus seasons, Bob had a 387-270 record and won three ABA championships.

Fraternities and Sororities: The Time for Reform is at Hand

Pront-page stories this school year have sustained the grave concerns that many academic administrators have about the prominent role of fraternities and sororities in alcohol-related problems on campus.

At the University of New Hampshire, an 18-year-old sophomore returned to campus on the Friday before Labor Day weekend. That night, he plummeted 35 feet from the Acacia fraternity rooftop and died. The fraternity was charged with violating university policies and eventually disbanded by college administrators.

At Ohio Wesleyan, a 20-year-old student who died in a fraternity house fire was drunk and may have been too confused to find his way out, according to the local coroner. The fire was reminiscent of a fraternity house tragedy that claimed the lives of five students last year the the University of North Carolina.

At Clarkson University in New York, twelve men, most of them members of Theta Chi fraternity, were charged in the death of a 17-year-old pledge, who was found dead in an upstairs room of the fraternity house. Reports indicated that the victim had choked on his own vomit.

At UCLA, academic officials suspended Zeta Beta Tau for violating the state's minimum drinking age law, after three fraternity men were accused of raping a sorority woman during a party.

At the University of Massachusetts, a former student who said she was raped at a fraternity party reached a \$200,000 settlement with Sigma Phi Epsilon after the fraternity admitted it had provided inadequate security.

Some Greek organizations claim that they are unfairly singled out for criticism, but a study recently published by Henry Wechsler and his colleagues at the Harvard School of Public Health shows that such criticism is warranted.

Fraternity and sorority house members, especial-

ly those who are house residents, are much more likely to report binge drinking, defined for men as consuming five or more drinks in a row within the previous two weeks, and for women as consuming four or more drinks in a row.

Fifty-seven percent of fraternity house residents reported binge drinking three or more times in the past two weeks, compared to 36 percent of on-resident members and 18 percent of non-members. Among women, 43 percent of house residents reported binge drinking three or more times in the past two weeks, compared to 28 percent of non-resident sorority members and 15 percent of non-members.

Greek members are also more likely than nonmembers to report problems as a consequence of their drinking, including the following:

- · missing class
- getting behind in their school work
- doing something they regretted
- forgetting where they were or what they did
- engaged in unplanned sexual activity
- not using protection when having sex
- · arguing with friends
- driving after having five or more drinks
- · getting hurt or injured

Fraternity members, but no sorority members, also reported more often having damaged property. Similar data have recently been compiled by the Core Institute at Southern Illinois University.

In response to these problems, new prevention programs for Greek organizations have been developed on a number of campuses, including retreats, peer education programs, and wellness programs. Despite these good efforts, the call grows louder for more radical change in the traditions of Greek organizations. This spring, two major national fraternities, Phi Delta Theta and Sigma Nu, decided to ban alcohol in chapter hous-

In some ways, this action seems to be a bow to the inevitable. The annual toll of needless student deaths due to alcohol-related traffic crashes, falls, fires, and fraternity hazings is impossible to ignore. Given that reality, and given the attendant costs of liability insurance that fraternities and sororities now face, a ban on alcohol makes good sense.

There are less radical changes that could be made by the Greek houses to keep alcohol away from minors and impaired students. But it their failure to do this that is now causing the national organizations and some campus officials to impose an alcohol ban.

The message to students is clear: There is barely time left to change fraternity and sorority drinking practices. The time of total license is over.

The time for reform is at hand.

Outcry Against Campus Prejudice

Beer-swilling, sex-crazed jocks. Racist, sexist, homophobic sons of privilege who never crack a book.

Stereotypes about college fraternities have long existed, fueled in 1978 by the movie Animal House and later by highly publicized incidents across the country involving beatings, binge drinking and date rape. Nationwide this year there have been three alcohol-related deaths linked to fraternity life at Purdue, Louisiana State and MIT.

Today negative images have again boiled to the surface, and fraternities at Indiana University are still reeling from a campus outcry that has yet to subside.

A week after a predominately Jewish fraternity, Zeta Beta Tau, was suspended by campus authorities for a racist, sexist and homophobic scavenger hunt, members of other fraternities complained that the entire Greek system had come under fire.

"We are ridiculed every day, singled out by people we don't even know," said Pat O'brien, president of IU's Phi Kappa Psi chapter. "They're saying, 'You're a bunch of racist bigots and you're all the same." Guys like Sigma Nu's Ben Voight are especially hurt by the stereotypes. As philanthropy chairman for his house this year, Voight says, he has organized a blood drive and will coach a basketball team at the Boys and Girls Club in Bloomington this year.

"People don't see that we give so much to the community," he said.

"The bad things [about fraternities] always get publicized," said IU Delt Rob Dinn. "You don't ever hear about kids passing out drunk in an apartment building."

IU's student body treasurer believes the ZBT incident was a flashpoint for resentment against Greeks that has always existed on campus. "They're the kids that have the money," she said. "It's like the clique in high school of all the popular kids. It's a privilege thing."

Unfortunately with privilege comes a price, says Theta Chi's Chris Koors, who, as president of the Dance Marathon Council, raised over \$150,000 last year for Riley Children's Hospital.

"You see how the actions of a few affect everyone," he said.

Regardless of the outcome, IU's IFC president said the outcry over ZBT should be a wake-up call for the entire Greek system.

To that end, an advisory board made up of the heads of all the black, Latino and white fraternities will better address diversity and racisms within the system.

"The outcry to stop racism is definitely needed," he said.

"From what happened, we're taking steps to bridge that gap."

In the meantime, many fraternity houses have pulled together and taken a good hard look at themselves.

Jim Gibson, IU's assistant dean of students said, "I would certainly hope that this kind of behavior would be the exception rather than the rule. But the fact that it happened tells me we have a lot of work to do."—Indianapolis Star

Sleepovers at Ole' Miss?

The University of Mississippi has delayed the start of a 24-hour weekend visitation policy allowing dormitory "sleepovers" for upperclassmen.

The policy, approved Sept. 2 on a student vote, permits 1,200 upperclassmen to have guests of the opposite sex in their rooms from noon Friday to midnight Sunday. The change involves five upperclassmen residence halls.

The policy was to have started October 1, but was

delayed at the request of Higher Education Commissioner Tom Layzell.

Layzell asked Ole Miss chancellor Robert Khayat for the delay until the College Board can discuss the policy Thursday, said College Board spokeswoman Pamela Meyer.

"It appeared to the commissioner that the 24-hour visitation on Friday and Saturday raised a question about consistency with board policy. Board policy says there should not be any coed dorms."

Barbara Mullins, whose daughter formerly lived in Crosby Hall, said "It's good that they want student input about decisions about the university, but more complications than good will result, It's just an excuse to have someone spend the night."


Richard Mullendore, vice chancellor of student life, and Jim Anderson, director of student housing, reported receiving calls from parents concerned about new policy.


Anderson said all the callers he talked with have a daughter living in Crosby Hall, an upper-classmen dorm that houses 597 women.

"I just think it's a good idea," said Melissa Seigman, a junior transfer student from Maryland who lives in Hefey Hall, one of the dorms voting for the change. "Most other schools have it. We're finally moving into the 20th Century."

Ole Miss would be the first of the state's largest universities to implement a 24-hour visitation policy in residence halls.

Baseball: The Presidents' Game

he Washington Senators were far more laughable than successful, in both incarnations. But they did help establish a strong link between their sport and the highest elected official in the land.

Griffith Stadium served as a photo-op background for nine presidents, from the rotund William Howard Taft to the dashing John F. Kennedy. Later, DC's RFK Stadium welcomed three more presidents for baseball outings before the expansion Senators bolted once and for all, this time to Texas.

There are plenty of great stories about Walter Johnson and Senators owner Clark Griffith rubbing elbows with political leaders, most particularly presidents. Most of those stories, and dozens of others, are in Baseball: The Presidents' Game by William B. Mead, Northwestern '55, and Paul Dickson.

The authors' exhaustive research has clearly paid

off. They list a whopping 180 entries in their bibliography and traveled to 10 presidential libraries in search of photos and anecdotes. While some of the sections are a bit sparse, there's something on every president of the 20th centurv. The writing is light and eas-

ily navigable, and the cache of rare photos is priceless.

There's Calvin Coolidge at the ballpark in a ceremonial headdress.
There's Warren Harding bouncing 12-year-old Walter Johnson Jr. on his knee at the 1922 Opening Day. There's then-vice President Richard Nixon standing and cheering alongside an equally animated J. Edgar Hoover during a 1959 game.

It's interesting to trace baseball's progression from social outcast to political pillar.

"Games played with the ball, and others of that nature, are too violent for the body and stamp no character on the mind," Thomas Jefferson once said.

By the early 1860s, though, Abraham Lincoln was joining huge crowds watching informal baseball games on the White Lot, an area behind the White House. Lincoln's successor, Andrew Johnson, referred to baseball as the national game.

You may be surprised to learn that Warren Harding, more than a decade before taking office, was part-owner of entries in the Ohio-Pennsylvania and Ohio State leagues. He took great pride in having sent two-time National League battling champion Jake Daubert and four-time 20-game winner Wilbur Cooper up the professional ladder.

Same goes for the fact that Woodrow Wilson was a passionate fan who insisted on paying for his own tickets, heckled umpires as a Princeton University professor and spent much of his final years watching the Senators from a sedan parked in the home bullpen.

Not all presidents loved the game, though most have realized its political benefits in reaching the masses and winning votes. Teddy Roosevelt was the last president to actively resist the game, which he lumped in with other "mollycoddle" activities.


Perhaps the most cynical First Fan was Calvin Coolidge. While Coolidge never took to the sport the way his wife Grace did, he attended three of seven 1924 World Series games at his advisor' urging.

The Shirt Off Your Back

he results of the Annual Fund and our increase in endowments for 1996-97 should make every Delt proud. I think that we had the largest annual fund of any fraternity, even though several have many more alumni than we, and that our increase in bequests and other endowment funds was also a record in the fraternity world.

It is not the numbers that count but the people. The Educational Foundation board formally thanked Sonya Gill, Vice President-Annual Fund, for her leadership last year. Some of that thanks also goes to Peggy Evans, the friendly voice you hear when you call in. Both have the attitude that whatever you want or need is what they will get for you.

To Ken File also a salute for a remarkable first year as Executive Vice President-Planned Giving. One of our

Board members, Murray Blackwelder, Baker '69, Vice **President Development** of Iowa State and one of the outstanding university fund raisers, told us that Delta Tau Delta must develop a planned giving option for our members. We would never add enough to our endowment just with annual giving or by "hoping." He also told us that if we added to staff and did not cover the cost of new staff, we would find ourselves with a cash deficit and disappointment unless the Board and a few others pledged an additional \$100,000 for the year. He suggested that we call that group the Order of the C-. Well, we did it! With Ken's efforts, the Board and about 35 others pledged and gave an additional \$100,000 last year-and agreed to continue giving at that new level for at least three years. Many of these brothers were

already giving in four figures annually.

So, that is who and how we did it. Why? Here's why.

This is a true story. I will not disclose the chapter nor the brother's name. This is what fraternity should mean.

He came from an abusive family. The chapter did not know that and did not find out until his senior year. The chapter had a custom called


and he dreaded it. But he told this story.

After he had pledged, he was so proud when he went home for fall break. But his father beat him, beat him for joining a fraternity.

This brother then said

that from that day in his freshman year until today he had not been home. He told the hushed chapter that they had been his family from that day. He had no other. They had sustained him, helped him, encouraged him-without knowing his circumstances. So now he was leaving and he knew he was leaving his only family. In his will, he promised never to forget them

and to help when they needed him. The next man up, voice choking, said that this brother, over the years.



had never missed a chapter meeting, never missed a chapter function, always volunteered to do any job the chapter needed, was the man they could all depend on. At that point, he said

that the only way he could repay the homeless brother was by something very literal. He took the shirt off his back and handed it to his brother.

"You have been doing this for the rest of us for four years. It is the least that I can do for you," he said, embracing his brother.

The entire chapter joined in a hug, tears in every eye.

I probably should have started this article with that story. That is why we raise money. That is why we have a fraternity. That is the kind of caring that is missing in so many lives today. That is the brotherhood that is Delta Tau Delta. If you and I do not create that kind of brotherhood, who

It's not how much money we raised last year that makes me and should make all of you proud. It is what we are doing with it.

The primary use of the Annual Fund pro-

ceeds is to support half the cost of the work of our six chapter consultants. By the way, it was a chapter consultant who told me the story I just related. Half of their time is spent in educational and leadership training for the chapters that they visit. That is the portion that we can underwrite. Two examples.

First, we now ask that each chapter write a three-year plan, with objectives for each year. That is management by objectives. It also means that each new set of chapter officers has a blueprint for the future from which to start. A plan for which they must add a third year and have their current revision of the plan, if any, and the whole three-year plan approved by the chapter. You can see another benefit: the whole chapter, from the newest initiate knows what is expected and how the officers see the future. It literally states what the chapter commits to do. The plan enables our chapter consultants to start each visit knowing the plan and in a position to bring in

new perspectives from other chapters to help achieve the plan. I know I wish Delta Tau Delta had this requirement when I took over as president of my chapter.

Second, we take academics seriously. Each chapter has an officer responsible for the academic growth of every member. Our chapter consultants focus on this when they visit. The results are heartwarming. One of three Delt chapters is in the Top Three on its campus. One of five is the academic leader. Our cumulative grade point average is .2 higher than any other fraternity. Any other fraternity!

We also recognize the way alcohol is rotting the fabric of college life. Binge drinkers come to us from high school. One recent study showed that 60% of high school graduates had been on a binge (six drinks or more in one night) in the past month. We saw 10 years ago that prohibition was not the answer. We had to get into the heads of our young men the consequences of drinking and teach them why and how to control

their drinking. We call the program Delts Talking About Alcohol or DTAA, pronounced "DEE-tau." Last year your donations enabled us to put an intern fulltime in the field to conduct DTAA seminars for more than 60 chapters. Our plan this year is to have two interns in the field so that every or almost every one of our chapters will have this experience as part of their programming. By the way, I took the abbreviated course when I was President of the Fraternity. I now clearly know that at my age, metabolism and size that two drinks is it. That means all night and with food, over at least three hours.

Your donations also made it possible for us to provide the Chapter Leadership Guides, the manuals that teach leadership for the chapter, to be given to each chapter.

Those donations also made possible educational and leadership speakers and seminar leaders for the divisional conferences and the Karnea.

And, you made possible our acclaimed anti-date rape film and manual, which so many of our chapters used last year.

You can see, from the Order of the C—, that those of us who have the honor to lead this Fraternity and the Foundation, have put our money where our mouth is. We simply do not see how we could ask you to invest in our young men if we had not done so as generously as we could. And you

enrichment of their college lives of \$50 per year for each year that they have been Delts. That custom of investment by Delts in the past seems to have been passed along to today's Delts because Delts give the highest average gift of any fraternity year after year.

For giving the shirt off your back, thank you.

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have joined us in numbers and in dollars in a way that makes every other fraternity wonder how we do it. Simple, isn't it? We are not raising money. We are raising a generation of ethical men. We believe that better brothers, brothers who know what is expected of a Delt, will make better husbands and better fathers. They will also be better citizens for our two countries. I cannot think of a better reason to give.

So, I close this with that thought and with the everlasting thanks of 6,000 undergraduates for whom your gifts have meant a scholarship and an **Membership in the Order of the C**— is by invitation only. During the 1996-97 academic year there were only 53 invitations extended for membership. Members of the Order of the C— provided gifts to the Foundation to help do the cultivation work for major gifts and planned gifts. Their goal was to raise \$100,000 for Foundation operations. This resulted in \$1.5 million in planned gifts and major gifts being produced during the year. 

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he original mission of the Delt 2000 program states, "To double the number of alumni involved in the positive development of undergraduates and their chapters." This original mission has not changed, but the focus of the work has changed over time. Now, the Fraternity wants to identify specific areas of need for chapters and the roles that alumni can assume to help our undergraduate chapters. In this way, the Fratemity can take advantage of its most valuable resource, our alumni, so undergraduate members can engage in values-based conversations to truly live a life committed to excellence.

Toward this goal, the Fratemity defined a way to measure active alumni involvement through the Delt 2000 Chapter Criteria. This is made up of three teams of alumni; an advising team, a house corporation team, and a mentor team. The advising team consists of the chapter advisor, the faculty advisor, and any assistant advisors. The house corporation team consists of any elected officers and members of the local board of directors. The mentor team consists of any volunteer not an advisor or house corporation member who conducts two mentoring programs per academic year. A mentoring program is defined as any educational program (fraternity related or not) done for the entire chapter; a committee or a special group of members; or for a specific officer, chairman, or member. As long as you mentor at least one member of the chapter twice a year, you

can serve as a mentor.
