

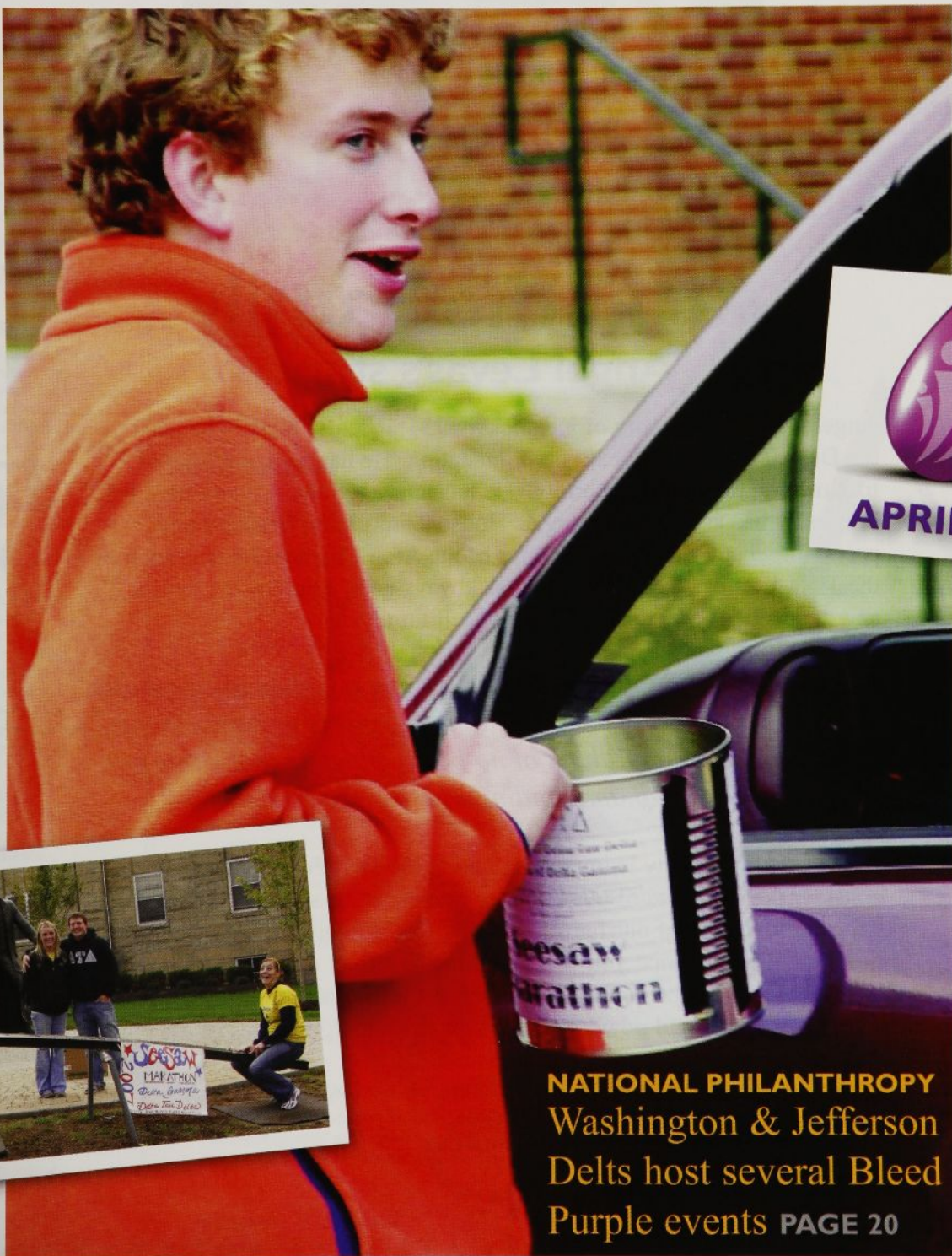

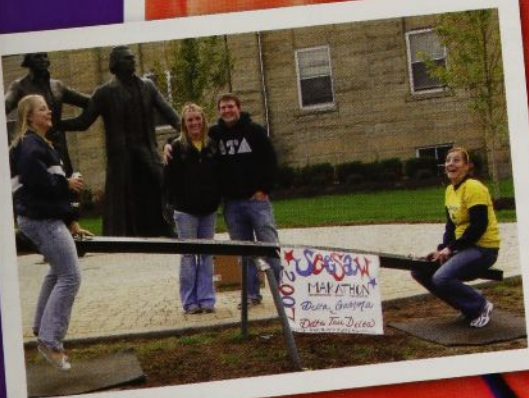

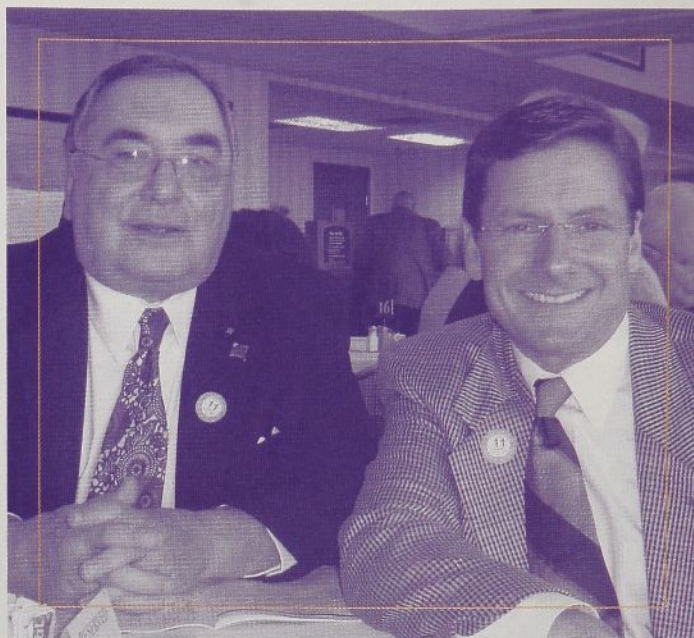

FROM THE PRESIDENT

A legacy overlooked?

When I was a kid, I used to sing a song called "Yankee Doodle." Do you know what the words to the song mean? Sometimes we say things and don't know the real meaning of the words.

When I was a pledge, I was asked to memorize the *Delt Creed* and say it aloud. I'm not sure at age 19, if I really thought about the meaning of Stewart Maclean's words from 1927. Today, those of us that work in the fraternity world are familiar with the concepts of "the education of youth" and "the inspiration of maturity." Delt alumni leadership across this country, who are working day in



and day out with young men to prepare them for an adult world, truly understand the importance of the "education of youth."

There was a time, when I actually thought there was a Delt shrine, but I began to understand that it does not exist as a physical place. The shrine is, in fact, in each of us that has understood and benefited as young men in the brotherhood of the Fraternity. Any Delt who has had a friendship that has lasted over time understands the "cornerstone of friendship." We are, and have always been, a val-

ues-based organization. I did not see the "columns of aspiration" at age 19. I did not know that Tom Huddleston would become a vice president at a university, Cliff Wood a president of a community college or Larry Williams a university professor. I never imagined that John Zienter would become a top official in the DEA, Bob Galvan a chief health officer, or Russell Brown and Mike Watson FBI agents. I did not know that Bill Thomas, Joe Ondrusek or Bruce Frazier would become presidents of companies or Larry Howell, Dick Reynard and Ed Goodman vice presidents of companies. I never imagined that Frankie Branson would become one of the most noted attorneys in the state of Texas or that Duane Allen would become the lead singer in the Oak Ridge Boys, a nationally known group.

The list could go on forever. We were just kids that a fraternity provided a "doorway of opportunity" to develop our self-esteem, our understanding of "obligations" and the importance of serving the community. The old Delt house at East Texas State University is gone, but the "windows" are still open for "understanding," and the "loyalty" for us has lasted a lifetime.

We are a respected and recognized national fraternity. Everything that we are is a product of our understanding and living our *Creed*, *Ritual*, and mission. As Delts, we have been given a legacy and that legacy has endured for 150 years. I am proud to be the international president of Delta Tau Delta Fraternity. But none of my accomplishments over the years will ever change the pride that I had in being a Delt at age 19. I was a proud Delt then, and I am a proud Delt now!

DTAA program wins award

DTAA: Powered by AlcoholEdu® was selected as the Highest Honors recipient for the 2007-2008 Prevention Excellence Award in the Greek category. This award program is sponsored by Outside The Classroom, the developer of AlcoholEdu® for College. The Prevention Excellence Award recognizes institution and Greek organizations that have excelled in their prevention efforts and have significantly influenced the quality of student life. An independent panel of national prevention experts and researchers reviewed the applications; this year's applicant pool was extremely competitive. The review panel assigned scores based on five criteria: Implementation Practices, Communication, Programmatic Linkages, Organizational Linkages and Program Evaluation.

As a Prevention Excellence Award recipient, Delta Tau Delta received a \$10,000 donation to be used for alcohol education.

Mid-American Greek Conference

award for Iowa State

The Iowa State University Interfraternity Council (IFC) was honored with the prestigious Jellison Award at the 2008 Mid-American Greek Council Association (MGCA) Annual Conference. The MGCA Awards are designed specifically to assist councils in achieving the highest level of excellence possible in their programming and council management. The awards outline the actions and policies of an ideal council. This was the second consecutive year the men have been won the Jellison.

The IFC president is Dusty Kroll, a Delt at the Gamma Pi Chapter.

Two Delts among Order of Omega scholarship recipients

Adam W. Hilliard of Butler University and David J. Keyes of Eastern Illinois University have received \$500 Order of Omega Scholarships.

The Scholarship Program was established to recognize academic ability, participation and leadership in campus organizations, citizenship and service to Order of Omega and the campus Greek community. Further, it is intended to support their future academic studies. Since 1985, the Order of Omega has awarded over \$500,000 in scholarships.

Delts return to Tennessee

Following two years of planning and three weeks of interviews, the Fraternity welcomed 32 new members to the Delta Delta Crescent Colony on Feb. 29, 2008.

Fraternity recruitment personnel arrived on campus in February to begin the expansion process. During the project, more than 500 men were identified as potential members. Of those, more than 100 men were interviewed and 32 men were selected to be Founding Fathers. The colony's average grade point average is 3.32.

This is a return to the University of Tennessee for Delta Tau Delta. Originally chartered in 1924 and closed in spring 2006, Delta Tau Delta has enjoyed a prosperous existence on campus.

HEADLINES OF THE PAST

Karneia: A Delt tradition for the ages

10 YEARS AGO

Registration was underway for the 1998 Kansas City Karneia, the first Delt convention conducted in that city and the 11th west of the Mississippi River. Kurt Level (Kansas, 1989) was serving as local chairman.

20 YEARS AGO

For only the second time, the Karneia would meet outside the U.S. with Toronto, Ont., serving as host of the 1988 Karneia.

30 YEARS AGO

The spring edition of *The Rainbow* promoted an upcoming week of Delt work, brotherhood and fun at the 1978 New Orleans Karneia, the more recent of two Karneias to be hosted by brothers of the Crescent City. Delt Perry Gresham, retired president of Bethany College, was to be the featured banquet speaker.

75 YEARS AGO

"There is something special about a Karneia that grips you, makes you feel a little prouder of your Fraternity," wrote Norman MacLeod, president of the Fraternity, in the June 1933 *Rainbow* in support of the upcoming Chicago Karneia. "Here the oldest alumnus mingles with the newest freshman, greets his chums or renews again the acquaintances he made when as an active he was the chapter's delegate." Dubbed the "World's Fair Karneia," the 1933 convention over Labor Day weekend was part of the Century of Progress International Exposition on Chicago's lakefront.

99 YEARS AGO

The March 1909 *Rainbow* trumpeted the splendid accommodations of the new Fort Pitt Hotel in downtown Pittsburgh, upcoming home of the 40th Karneia when the Fraternity would celebrate its 50th birthday. At that time, it was believed the Fraternity's founding had occurred in 1859 rather than 1858. Wrote an unnamed member of the Karneia publicity committee: "Pittsburgh – the home of steel and smoke, of coal mines and iron mills, of titles and tobies, of palaces and pirates, of music and millionaires. We not only want the regular delegates and actives present, but most especially we desire a large attendance of the alumni. Nothing inspires the workers of today more than meeting and mingling with the warhorses of the past."

Two chapters look globally for community service opportunities

Butler raises funds for Uganda school

Butler Delt Michael Hole launched the Power of Children (POC) campaign. Hole is the founder and president of the Butler University Ambassadors for Children (BUAFC), a student-led organization dedicated to improving lives around the world with humanitarian service trips. BUAFC sponsors the POC initiative—an effort to raise \$35,000 to purchase land and build a primary school near Kampala, Uganda. To date, nearly \$20,000 has been collected.

The school, comprised of six classrooms and a library, will include electricity, running water, chalkboards, desks and other educational necessities. It will serve nearly 350 Ugandan children, ages 4 to 14, and local Ugandan and service-oriented American teachers will lead the classrooms. Senior Beta Zeta Delt Keith Adams and Beta Zeta pledge Marcus Hagberg both sit on the POC executive board. They will be traveling with Hole to Uganda in June to begin construction of the school and to conduct HIV/AIDS home-based testing with their team of physicians.

On Saturday, April 19, 2008, BUAFC will host the Power of Children Golf Outing and Auction. The Beta Zeta Chapter will co-sponsor the event and the outing will serve as a father-son tournament and alumni event for all interested brothers of Delta Tau Delta.

Quincy Delts spend break in Haiti

Three Delta Tau Delta members and seven other students from the University of Quincy ventured into the impoverished country of Haiti during their Christmas break. They volunteered to go to Haiti because they wanted to help the people and they hoped to gain an understanding of why such a beautiful country is facing poverty and hardship.

The awe and excitement of flying over the Caribbean was quickly diminished by the downward approach toward the Port-au-



Prince airport. Through the airplane windows they saw masses of people bathing in the rivers and streams, run-down homes resembling the ruins of a war zone and a thick, smog-like cloud hovering over the island.

"It was shocking to me how such a beautiful land could be plagued by such high levels of poverty," Kyle Leonard said.

Women, men and children worked intensely, while a larger number of people meandered down the street selling bags of water, waving down tap-taps (Haitian taxis) and begging. Several women were preparing meals on the side of the street, while others carried goods by balancing the containers on their heads from place to place. The working men were building cement homes, pushing wheelbarrows and driving the tap-taps.

"By experiencing these living conditions first hand, I gained an inexplicable appreciation for my life, friends and family back home," Jacob McGuire said.

After the bumpy three-hour drive, the men finally arrived in the village of Barasa. They quickly became acquainted with their simple lodging at an old school house. For five nights they lived like the Haitian people, with none of the modern conveniences. Each day they had lunch and dinner prepared for them by some of the village women. The meals always consisted of beans, rice and fried plantains.

On New Year's Eve day several of the volunteers jumped in the truck and traveled to Port-au-Prince to pick up 268 bags of cement for the village of Barasa. The bags were for the project the students had been working on—the completion of 10 cisterns for the village.

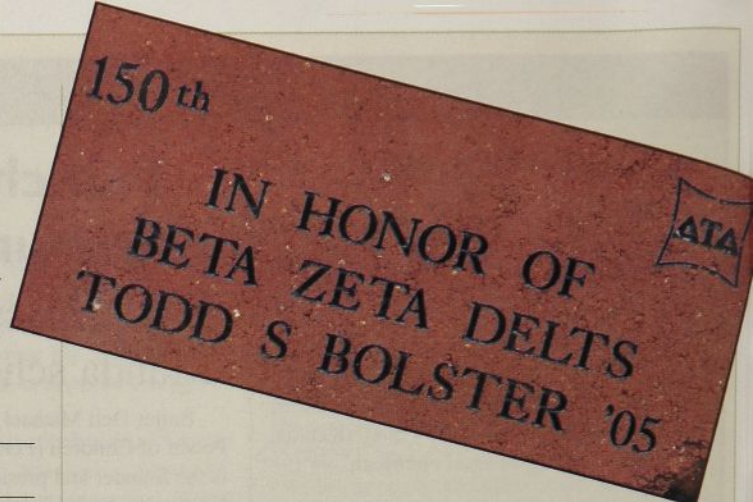

Pennington and Company specializes in chapter capital campaigns, public relations, alumni services and strategic planning for local fraternity house corporations. Their main offices are located in Lawrence, Kan. In addition, they provide consulting services for a variety of national fraternity and sorority foundations.

The need for coordinated improvement of chapter housing on a local level was a determining factor in File's decision.

"We not only need assistance with this campaign but also developing relationships that will be beneficial to us in the future. This alliance allows us to do this in an effective way with personnel that have a proven talent in this area."

"You don't develop relationships or raise money sitting behind a desk at our headquarters," said File. "Our work happens all over the country, and that is what I like about this arrangement—it dramatically extends the reach of our staff."

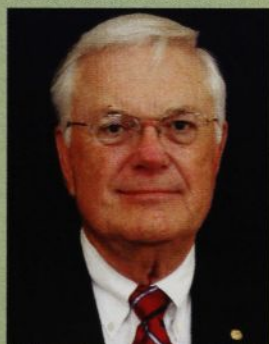

BASKETBALL

Leading DePauw to a 19-7 season and the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference tournament quarterfinals was head coach Bill Fenlon (Northwestern University, 1979). Brad Nadborne (DePauw University, 1990) completed his fourth season as head coach at Manchester College of the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference.

Finishing his second season as assistant coach at Ithaca College was Nevada Smith (Bethany College, 2002), where the team had its best record since the 1999-2000 season. Todd McGuiness (Bethany College, 2002) completed his second year as assistant coach for Case Western Reserve University, where he worked with center Rob Skuski, the top field goal shooter (54.1%) and second-leading rebounder (6.5 per game, 110). He also was second with 16 blocked shots and scored 130 points (7.6 per game). Seeing action for the highly-rated Butler University squad was guard Nick Rodgers.

Second in scoring for 18-10 Wabash College was All-NCAC second team forward Gary Simkus, who averaged 12.0 (335 points) while starting every game. He led the squad in minutes played (899) and 3-point shooting (48.9%); ranked second in assists (54) and steals (40); shot 51.4% from the field and grabbed 136 rebounds (4.9). Also seeing action for the Little Giants was forward Mark Turpin. Playing every game for the 13-13 Kenyon College team was forward Allen Bediarko, who shot 61.8% from the field, was second with 23 blocked shots and grabbed 86 rebounds (3.3). Starting 13 games at guard for LaGrange College was Landon Baize, who had 40 assists and shot 87.5% (21 of 24) at the free throw line. Playing every game for the 20-2 Lawrence University team was forward Tommy Schmidt, who scored 86 points (3.9).

One of the top stories in the 2008 college season was the big turnaround at Baylor University under the leadership of head coach Scott Drew (Butler University, 1992). As we went to press, the Bears had posted their winningest season in eight years and qualified for their first NCAA tournament since 1988.



WRESTLING

NCAA 2007 champion **Jake Herbert** of Northwestern decided to take Olympic redshirt status this winter to train for the 2008 Games in Beijing, China. He was also named an Academic All-American wrestler in 2007 and had a perfect 32-0 record. He will be eligible to return to collegiate competition in the 2008-09 season. Wildcats teammate **Nick Hayes** returned for a fifth year of competition and had posted a 22-6 record at 174 pounds prior to the Big Ten championship as we went to press. **Stephen Frehn**, who wrestled at 149 pounds, was a member of the Stanford squad.

The top wrestler for Wabash College was **Rob Arnett**, who competed in the 285-pound class. He placed second at the Midstates Wrestling Conference meet and was fifth at the Spartan Mat Classic. He finished with a team-best 22-8 record and five falls. Teammate **Graham Youngs** had an 11-3 mark at 149 pounds. He placed third at the Midstates meet and fourth at the Midwest Crowne Wrestling Mats Open. The M.I.T. squad, with four Deltas, was led by **Joe Silverman**, who competed at 197 pounds. He was named Pilgrim League Wrestler of the Week after upsetting the number one ranked Division III wrestler. His overall record was 21-11, and teammate **Greg Wellman** saw action at 133 pounds. The Case Western Reserve University regular at 165 pounds was **Dave Bernholt**.

FOOTBALL

Denver Broncos safety **John Lynch** (Stanford University, 1993) had another good season and went to his ninth Pro Bowl. He had 62 tackles in 13 games played. In early March, he chose to resign with the Broncos for the 2008 season. NFL assistant coaches who helped take their teams to the playoffs were Indianapolis Colts offensive line coach **Howard Mudd** (Michigan State-Hillsdale, 1964) and Seattle Seahawks offensive line coach **Bill Laveroni** (University of California-Berkeley, 1970). Serving as the longtime stadium announcer for the San Francisco 49ers was radio/television personality **Bob Sarlatte** (University of California-Berkeley, 1972).

Three Delt college players were

named to the 2007 North-American Interfraternity Conference All-Fraternity All-American first teams. Offensive tackle **Chris Marinelli** of Stanford University was chosen for the Division I FBS/FCS first team. Selected to the Division II-III first team were DePauw University teammates **Jeremiah Marx** at running back and **Bryan Mulligan** as wide receiver. Earning All-American honorable mention on the Division I team were offensive tackle **Brad Coley** of FCS national champion Appalachian State University; University of Oklahoma punter **Mike Knall** (24 punts for a 43.7 average); offensive lineman **Conrad Smith** from the University of San Diego; and defensive end **Chase Donner** of Butler University.

HOCKEY

The Lawrence University squad featured six Delt players who saw a lot of playing time. Defenseman **Josh Peterson** was fourth in scoring with 26 points, including a team-high 20 assists. Forward **Neil Wallace** scored 11 points (five goals, six assists) and forward **Aaron LaFave** added eight points (four goals, four assists). Other key players for the Vikings were forward **Jon Sacks** (24 contests), defenseman **Adam Brand** (20 games) and defenseman **Pat Tuohy** (17 games). Regulars for the M.I.T. squad were forward Dustin Kendrick, who scored 14 points (three goals, 11 assists) and defensemen **Brad Holschok** and **Nicholas Maietta**, both of whom scored four points.

OTHER SPORTS

Announcing his retirement from major league baseball on February 28 was the Fraternity's career home run leader, outfielder **Shawn Green** (Stanford University, 1996). A first round draft choice of the Toronto Blue Jays in 1991, he ended his 15-year career with a .283 average, 2,003 hits, 328 home runs, 1,129 runs scored and 1,070 runs batted in over 1,951 contests. The two-time All-Star had his best year for Toronto in 1999, hitting .309 with 42 homers and 123 RBI. Shawn also had five good seasons with the Los Angeles Dodgers (2000-04) before stints with the Arizona Diamondbacks (2005-06) and New York Mets (2006-07).

Off to his best start since he joined the PGA's Nationwide Tour is golfer **Scott**

Dunlap (University of Florida, 1984), who ranked fourth in money earnings (\$115,512) after the first two months of 2008. He won the season-opening Panama Movistar Championship with a three-under 277 total (including a 65 and 68) for a big payday of \$108,000.

"It was the first tournament of the

year and you almost don't have any expectations," he said. "I hadn't played a round of golf since Christmas. I was hitting it good on the range, but you never know if that will transfer to the golf course." Scott's last win on the pro tour was the 2004 Mark Christopher Charity Classic.

SWIMMING

Three schools in the North Coast Athletic Conference had Delts on their swimming teams. Four brothers helped lead Kenyon College to an 11th straight NCAC title and 23rd in 24 years. Kegan Borland won the NCAC 1650 freestyle (15:50.23) and was on the winning 800 freestyle relay. He placed second in the 500 freestyle and 400 IM events. Blair Withington won the 200 IM and was on the winning 800 freestyle relay. He finished second in the 100 freestyle, 100 breaststroke, 400 freestyle and 200 freestyle relay. Alexander Stoyel placed second in the NCAC 200 breaststroke, third in the 400 IM and fifth in the 200 IM. Also swimming at the NCAC event was David Lazarus of Kenyon. We will update our Kenyon swimmers at the mid-March NCAA Division III championship in the next issue of *The Rainbow*.

Two Wabash College Delts won All-NCAC honors at the conference meet. Elijah Sanders was on the third place 800 freestyle relay and set school records in an eighth place 1650 freestyle finish and ninth place 500 freestyle finish. Robert Foskos was on the NCAC third place 200 medley relay; fifth on the 200 freestyle relay; and 10th in the 50 freestyle. Also on the Wabash squad was Mitch Palmer. Wittenberg University's squad featured seven Delts and placed fourth at the NCAC meet. Diver Matt Erenpreiss was sixth in three meter diving and ninth on the one-meter board. Neil Anderson was on the fourth place 400 freestyle relay; placed fifth in the 200 and 500 freestyle events; finished sixth with the 800 freestyle relay; and was 10th in the 200 butterfly.

Invitational and seventh in the 100 breaststroke at the Middlebury Invitational. Competing in six events each for the Bethany College swim team were Richard Sawyer and Ryan Harrison.

ONLINE TRIBUTE

University unveils medium dedicated to renowned speaker, educator and internationalist

Wesleyan University announced the debut of henrymerrittwriston.org, a biographical portrait of distinguished professor, college president and foreign policy expert, Henry Merritt Wriston (Wesleyan University, 1911).

The website presents a complete biography as well as an interactive timeline exhibiting nearly 200 original archival photographs organized according to five eras of his life. It also performs as a research portal, featuring links to additional resources as well as a library of nearly 100 of Wriston's speeches, articles, books and letters spanning over six decades of his distinguished career. The media section features five hours of audio clips of sample speeches of this dynamic speaker, as well as accounts of his life by his daughter, Barbara, President Dwight D. Eisenhower and others.

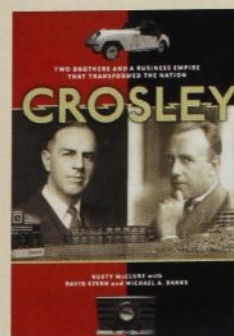
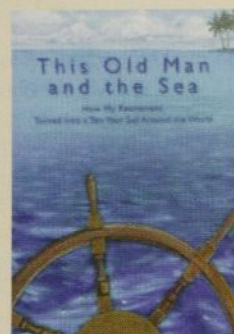
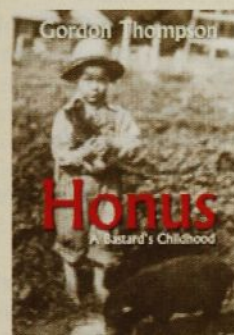
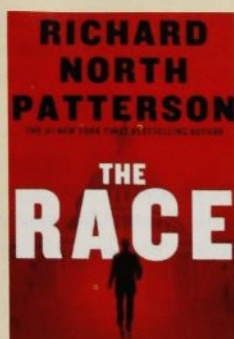
Henry Merritt Wriston advanced the ideals of liberal education and internationalism throughout his life as a speaker, author, professor, college president and foreign policy expert. A graduate of Wesleyan University, Wriston returned to his alma mater as a professor of history (1914-1925). His doctoral dissertation, "Executive Agents in American Foreign Relations" (Harvard University, 1922) became a standard text in the U.S. Department of State.

Wriston became president of Lawrence College (1925-1937) and Brown University (1937-1955) where his tenure had powerful transforming effects. At both schools he reorganized the curriculum to emphasize his commitment to liberal education, an ideal he first experienced at Wesleyan and later articulated in his best-known work, *The Nature of A Liberal Arts College* (1937).

In Washington D.C., Wriston served as chairman of President Dwight D. Eisenhower's Commission on National Goals (1960), chairman of the Secretary of State's Committee on Personnel (1954) and member of the U.S. Department of State's Advisory Committee on Foreign Service (1956-1958), earning a reputation as the architect of the reorganization of the Foreign Service of the State Department.

He died March 8, 1978, at age 89 in New York. His legacy includes the Wriston Fellowship at Brown, the Wriston Art Center at Lawrence and the Henry Merritt Wriston Chair in Public Policy at Wesleyan.

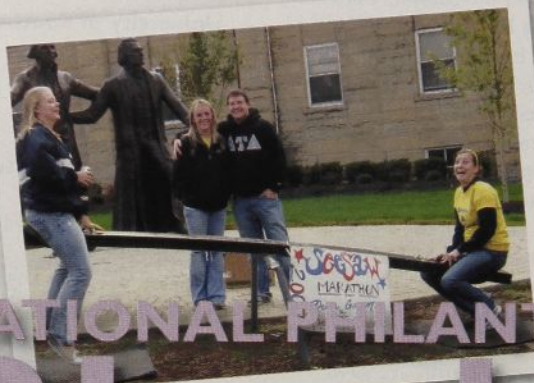

NATIONAL PHILANTHROPY Bleed Purple

The See-Saw Marathon marks the beginning of a year of philanthropy for the 146-year old fraternity, the oldest at Washington & Jefferson.

"This event shows how much time our students are willing to give to volunteer activities, including many that benefit the local community," said Susanna Hart, W&J's volunteer services coordinator. "Choosing Bleed Purple as the charity also shows the initiative our students have to find an organization in need that has an established relationship with a national

chapter of one of our Greek organizations."

Hara Henshell, director of Greek life at W&J, is also impressed with the Greek students and the time they put into volunteer activities.

"I think the See-Saw Marathon is a good example of the philanthropic events that our Greek students get involved in," Henshell said. "The fact that Delta Tau Delta and Delta Gamma are so involved in an event that does not directly benefit their respective organizations also says a great deal about their members' volunteer spirit."

ABOUT BLEED PURPLE

The Bleed Purple Foundation was founded in 2006 by members of the Theta Zeta Chapter of Delta Tau Delta in order to aid one of its brothers who was diagnosed with stage III-B Hodgkin's Lymphoma. As a sign of brotherhood and steadfast solidarity, the brothers came together and organized a head-shaving auction on the University of San Diego campus that raised more than \$4,000. Thus, Bleed Purple was born.

Since that simple act of compassion by the brothers of Theta Zeta, Bleed Purple has evolved into a recognized charitable organization. The Foundation strives as an organization to bring together the Greek

community in an effort to support undergraduate students battling cancer by paying the medical expenses associated with these life-threatening illnesses.

The Foundation distributes funds to recipients in need through a simple application process. A selection committee reviews submitted applications on a quarterly basis and, pending approval, the requested funds are then donated to the applicant or to the university or medical facility of their choice. Bleed Purple considers itself a unique organization. Being that the Foundation has zero administrative costs, it redirects 100 percent of its donations to students with cancer or to secure future donations for distribution. While its highest priority is helping students with cancer, the Foundation will also select a cancer research organization each year that will receive a portion of the proceeds if funds are available.

A YEAR-LONG COMMITMENT

The See-Saw Marathon is not the only event that the Delts have participated in and are planning this school year to raise their chapter's goal of \$2,500 for the Bleed Purple Foundation by their fundraising deadline of August 2008.

In late September, the brothers volunteered their time at Kennywood Amusement Park's annual Phantom Fright Nights. Each year, the park invites local nonprofit groups to participate during the months of September and October as a fundraiser for the organization. On September 29, the brothers of Delta Tau Delta dressed in their scariest Halloween-best, participating as actors in

Kennywood's haunted attractions, including the Villa of the Vampires, Kennyville Cemetery, Mortem Manor, as walk-about-ghouls, and as volunteers in the park's many concession stands. Each brother earned money for the number of hours that he worked, and collectively, the Fraternity was able to raise \$1,000 for the Bleed Purple Foundation.

"We had a blast scaring the young and old alike," said Carroll. "By the end of the night, more than half of us had lost our voices, but it was well worth it. In today's society, it's so refreshing to see how much my fellow brothers care about the community and are willing to lend a helping hand. They give so much of their time, even when it might be limited because, for example, they have to take the LSAT exam in two days. I have the deepest respect for each of my fellow Delts, and I am proud to be part of this brotherhood."

In addition to an upcoming car wash, the brothers will be holding their first-ever Head Shaving Contest to continue the fundraising efforts for Bleed Purple, an event that ties in very well with the cause. Through an auction system, participants place bids on how much they would pay to see a particular brother shave off his head of hair. The event is sure to be entertaining, and the sacrifice made by the Delts is clear: after all, shaving off a little bit goes a long way in the fight against cancer.

The Status of the Fraternity: A Legacy Overlooked?

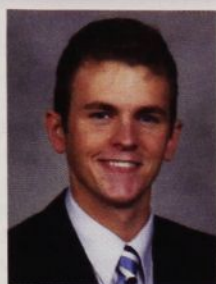
During February, I spoke at the Northern, Southern and Western Plains Conferences. Each conference had the same general theme, "Honor the Legacy." At each conference, there was a record attendance and much enthusiasm for the Fraternity. A strong emphasis was placed on our recruitment, as well as our leadership training and development. I would like to share some of what I talked about at these conferences.

Delta Tau Delta is one of 73 national fraternities. With fraternity chapter sizes ranging from 27 to 268, our chapter/colony roster of 116 ranks us 13th in the nation in undergraduate chapters. With 6,500 undergraduate members and/or pledges, our Fraternity ranks 11th in the fraternity world. Our average chapter size of 55 is second among fraternities. Delta Tau Delta has more than 117,000 living alumni, 155,000 total initiates and 26 alumni chapters. Perhaps our greatest strength is our Delt Foundation and it ranks among the top 10 in the fraternity/sorority world.

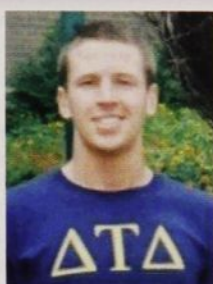
These are just the numbers. The reality is that we are a very diverse fraternity. We are on public and private campuses and in rural and urban environments. However, among our chapters, only 85 of them currently have a Shelter or a designated space on campus. So, in the future, perhaps one of our greatest challenges will be how we deal with our housing situation. Students of today are telling us they want single rooms and residential living spaces on college campuses are now more like apartments than dorms or residence halls. These changes in where and how young men choose to live are important factors for us to consider as we attempt to reach out to them, educate them and inculcate them into the Fraternity.

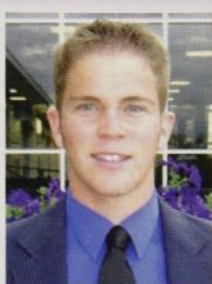

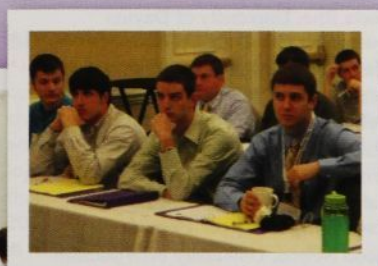

JEFFREY A. HAMMOND PURDUE UNIVERSITY, 1995

Jeff Hammond is a native of Carmel, Ind., and graduated with degrees in communications and political science from Purdue University.

As an undergraduate, he served on a number of committees, as corresponding secretary and as the chapter's Ritualist. After graduation, Jeff became only the second Purdue Delt appointed to the Fraternity's field staff.

After one year as a chapter leadership consultant, he entered law school at Indiana University in Bloomington and shortly thereafter was appointed the division vice president for our chapters at Indiana and Purdue.

Following his graduation from law school, Jeff accepted a position in Chicago and was subsequently appointed division vice president for DePaul and Northwestern.

In 2004, he returned to his Indiana roots to practice law in Indianapolis. Jeff was appointed chapter advisor for Gamma Lambda at Purdue, a role he served for three years. He now is the chapter's assistant advisor for finance.

Jeff has attended every Karnea since 1994, and served on the Constitution and By-Laws Committee in 2004 and 2006. The 2004 committee was responsible for shepherding the most sweeping revision of the Fraternity's governing document since the 1968 New York Karnea.

JAMES CHRISTIAN WISBROCK UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI 1997

A native of St. Louis, Chris served as honor board chairman, vice president and president for the Gamma Kappa Chapter at the University of Missouri. He earned his degree in radio and TV production. Following graduation, Chris traveled two years for the Fraternity as a chapter leadership consultant before beginning his career in business consulting.

He has stayed connected to Delta Tau Delta since leaving the staff, serving as a division vice president for DePaul and Northwestern while living in Chicago, and now as a DVP for Western Illinois and Quincy since his 2006 marriage and return to St. Louis.

Chris also has been a frequent presenter at division conferences and Karneas, has facilitated at chapter officer retreats and planning sessions, and served as

ABOUT THE FRAERING AWARD

The Bill Fraering Award for Alumni Service is restricted to young alumni—those who are no more than 15 years beyond their undergraduate days—for exemplary service to Delta Tau Delta.

Since its inception in 1981, the Fraternity has honored 51 of its most loyal younger alumni. To be considered for the award, a nominee must have been an alumnus for a minimum of three years and have provided extraordinary and outstanding service to the International Fraternity.

Nominations may be made by any undergraduate chapter or alumnus. From there, the Fraering Award Committee comprised of five former recipients and the committee chairman reviews the nominations for approval.

Bill Fraering was initiated in 1943 at the Beta Xi Chapter at Tulane University. He was elected the 34th president of Delta Tau Delta at the 1978 Karnea in his hometown of New Orleans, where he was the president of a food brokerage firm. Sadly, his days as president and his life were cut short less than a year later when he was shot and killed him on the front steps of his home.

The Fraering Award was established by the Arch Chapter in 1981 to honor younger alumni who have rendered outstanding service to Delta Tau Delta including, but not limited to, chapter advisors, house corporation members, division vice presidents and alumni chapter presidents. **Nominations for presentation at the 2008 Karnea should be submitted prior to June 1.**

Court of Honor

The Court of Honor recognizes the top chapters each year. Recipients of the Court of Honor are eligible for the Fraternity's highest chapter recognition: the Hugh Shields Award. Both the Court of Honor and the Hugh Shields Award recipients are determined by a set of criteria, and the chapters are then graded by a group of alumni from each of the divisions.
