



2017 DIVISION CONFERENCES

More than 1,200 Delt men from across the country stepped up to strengthen their chapters and lead the way to achieving excellence through the 2017 division conferences in January and February. They gathered in Providence, R.I., Marietta, Ga., Indianapolis, Wichita, Kan., and Las Vegas where they shared brotherhood, exchanged ideas and learned new strategies and techniques to become better officers and members. The conference theme, Excellence Calls, speaks to our Mission and Values and its promise: Committed to Lives of Excellence.

International President Jim Garboden (University of Pittsburgh, 1988) gave the keynote address at the Eastern, Southern, Northern and Western Pacific Divisions. International Vice President Steve Paquette (Syracuse University, 1977) gave the keynote at the Western Plains Division Conference which was held the same weekend as the Northern Division Conference. Both men spoke to living the Delt values every day.

Each division conference included an update on the state of the Fraternity and work to build an even better Delta Tau Delta. Steve Paquette spoke at the Eastern Division Conference, Second Vice President John Hancock (Whitman College, 1987) spoke at the Southern and Western Pacific Division Conferences, International Treasurer Bruce Peterson (University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee, 1975) spoke at the Northern Division Conference and International Secretary Rosario Palmieri (American University, 1999) spoke at the Western Plains Division Conference.

Each speaker brought attention to notable achievements in the areas of academics, membership and community service. The all-Delt GPA reached an all-time high of 3.13 in the spring of 2016, with 77 percent of chapters above the all-men's average GPA and 68 percent of chapters above the all-Fraternity average GPA and one in four Delts named as a Kershner Scholar. With more than 10,000 undergraduates reported in 2015-2016, the Fraternity reached a record-high number of undergraduates and 10th straight year of growth. And JDRF service continues to increase with the Fraternity closing in on raising \$1 million and contributing more than 100,000 hours of service.

Each division conference delegation also experienced model *Rite of Iris* and *Ritual* performances.

EASTERN DIVISION

The men of lota Mu Chapter at Quinnipiac University performed the Rite of Iris and the men of Iota Psi Chapter at Northeastern University performed Ritual.

SOUTHERN DIVISION

The men of Gamma Eta Chapter at George Washington University performed the Rite of Iris and the men of Beta Delta Chapter at the University of Georgia performed Ritual.

NORTHERN DIVISION

The men of Beta Eta Chapter at the University of Minnesota performed the Rite of Iris and the men of lota Sigma Chapter at North Dakota State University performed Ritual.

WESTERN PLAINS DIVISION

The men of Beta Tau Chapter at the University of Nebraska preformed the Rite of Iris. The men of Epsilon Nu Chapter at the Missouri University of Science and Technology performed Ritual.

WESTERN PACIFIC DIVISION

The men of Theta Gamma at the Arizona State University performed the Rite of Iris and the men of Theta Lambda at the University of Californina - Riverside performed Ritual.

Throughout the division conferences chapters and individuals who demonstrated answering the call to excellence were honored for outstanding achievements in academics, philanthropy and volunteer leadership. Top chapters were recognized with the highest honors, the Hugh Shields and the Court of Honor Awards.



Beta Theta at The University of the South received its first Hugh Shields award for Chapter Excellence at the 2017 Southern Division Conference.



For the 52nd year, the Fraternity has recognized its top 10 chapters for operational and programming excellence with the Hugh Shields Award. Beta Theta at the University of the South, one of the Fraternity's oldest existing chapters, celebrated its first Hugh Shields Award.

Six chapters including Alpha Chapter at Allegheny College, Omicron Chapter at University of Iowa, Beta Zeta Chapter at Butler University, Epsilon Phi Chapter at Southeastern Louisiana University, Iota Epsilon Chapter at Chapman University and Iota Psi Chapter at Northeastern University, were repeat recipients.

Zeta Zeta Chapter at Morehead State University received its first Hugh Shields Award since 2010, while Gamma Kappa Chapter at the University of Missouri and Theta Xi Chapter at Eastern Michigan University returned to Hugh Shields status after most recently earning recognition in 2014.

It was the ninth consecutive Hugh Shields Award for Iota Epsilon at Chapman University, tying the Fraternity's record for consecutive honors. Beta

Lambda at Lehigh University accomplished the feat from 1986 through 1994.

Five of the year's recipients have earned multiple Hugh Shields honors after being chartered or rechartered since 2000 including Alpha, Omicron, Beta Zeta, Iota Epsilon and Iota Psi.

The addition of Beta Theta to the Hugh Shields Award roll brings the number of chapters who have earned that distinction at least once since the inaugural year of 1965 to 99.

Gamma Pi at Iowa State is the all-time Hugh Shields Award leader with 23, the most recent coming in 2014. Others in the top five are: Beta Tau/Nebraska (20), Gamma Beta/Illinois Tech (18), Epsilon Phi/ Southeastern Louisiana (17) and Alpha/Allegheny

Besides the 10 chapters honored with the Hugh Shields Award, seven other chapters are in the 2016 Court of Honor. Among those is Gamma Mu at the University of Washington, included for the first time since 1993.



JOHN W. NICHOLS BRIDGE BUILDER AWARD

The John W. Nichols Bridge Builder Award was established by the Fraternity in 2004 to recognize and honor faithful local volunteers in their unselfish service to Delta Tau Delta as house corporation officers.

The award is named for John W. Nichols (Oklahoma University, 1936), who served as president of the Fraternity from 1962 to 1964, and as a long-time director of the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation. He also served on the house corporation board at his beloved Delta Alpha Chapter for decades. Through his vision, care and financial support, our Shelter in Norman has long been one of the finest in Delta Tau Delta. The John W. Nichols Bridge Builder Award recognizes significant alumni involvement and outstanding service to the establishment, development or enhancement of a house corporation.

In February James Dimos (Wabash College, 1983) was recognized with the Bridge Builder Award. Dimos served 16 years as treasurer of the Beta Psi House Corporation before moving to the leadership of a major capital campaign that assured the chapter's long-term housing needs. Today, he serves as an assistant chapter advisor for the recently rechartered Beta Psi Chapter.



The William J. Fraering Award honors the exemplary service of those who are no more than 15 years beyond their undergraduate days. Nominees must be at least three years beyond graduation and must have provided extraordinary and outstanding service to the International Fraternity. Nominations may be made by an undergraduate chapter, by an alumni chapter or by any alumnus in good standing. Nominations are reviewed by the Fraering Award Committee comprised of five former recipients and a chairman. The late Bill Fraering (Tulane University, 1946) was the president of a food brokerage firm in his hometown of New Orleans, La. He was murdered shortly after he was elected as the 34th president of Delta Tau Delta at the 1978 Karnea.

EASTERN DIVISION

EASTERN DIVISION: COURTNEY ROSE, DIAGNOSED AT AGE 15

Courtney Rose spoke at the Eastern Division Conference in Providence, R.I. She was diagnosed with T1D in May of 2013 at the age of fifteen. Rather than view her diagnosis as a setback, she chose to make a difference and is now an exceptional advocate for Type 1 Diabetes. A sophomore at Bryant University in Smithfield Rhode Island, she is pursuing a degree in communications and marketing, and is the president of her school's College Diabetes Network Chapter.

Courtney has published articles about diabetes for Beyond Type One, The College Diabetes Network and the Bryant Archway, Bryant University's source of campus news. She has worked as an intern for the American Diabetes Association and for an upscale clothing boutique.

As a spokeswoman for JDRF she travels and speaks about her journey with diabetes. In addition to serving as an advocate for those with diabetes, Courtney is also a student ambassador for her school, a sister of Alpha Omicron Pi and the vice president of public relations for Bryant's Student Alumni Association. Type 1 diabetes doesn't slow down eight-year-old Eli Dollens who is involved witih JDRF in Indianapolis. The young athlete depends on a continous glucose monitor and an insulin pump.

NORTHERN DIVISION: ELI DOLLENS. DIAGNOSED AT AGE 6

The Northern Division welcomed eight-year-old Eli Dollens in Indianapolis. Eli is the middle child of three, is a swimmer and loves to cook. His family is actively engaged with JDRF including service as the Indv JDRF One Walk Volunteer Team Coach Co-Coordinator.

After his diagnosis, Eli said he was surprised his muscles, especially in his legs feel so weak and shaky when his blood sugar drops below 70. "It's a scary feeling. It tells me I need to treat the low right away. I was surprised by the feeling and don't like it at all," he

"I was also surprised right after being diagnosed I had to prick my fingers to test my blood sugar level about seven to nine times per day and take shots or injections of insulin five to seven times per day. This includes every time I eat. I used to hate shots. And now my daily life includes lots of them. But I also know they make me not feel sick, like I had been in the days leading up to being diagnosed."

Technology has led to significant changes for Eli. Now that he has a continuous glucose monitor Eli doesn't have to prick his finger as

often to test his blood sugar. He only has to do it about three to four times per day now. "And I just insert my continuous glucose monitor, usually on my stomach, which is initially painful every seven days," Eli said.

With the pump, he no longer has to give himself shots when he needs insulin. Instead, every three days, he inserts a new pump, usually on his arms or legs and the insulin is given through the port into the skin under the pump. "Although it hurts to insert the pump every three days, it is much better than all the shots every day, Eli said.

Eli wants people to understand he might have to stop all of the sudden in the middle of having fun and playing games to treat a low blood sugar and he's not quitting because he doesn't want to have fun, he just needs to sit out for about 15 minutes until his blood sugar comes back up. And when he eats candy to treat a low, he doesn't really get to enjoy the candy and savor it. "It's not like when you get to eat candy as a yummy treat," he said.

Having T1D, has allowed Eli to meet other kids who have T1D too and he has made new friends outside of his school.

WHAT IS JDRF?

JDRF is the leading global organization focused on type 1 diabetes research. The goal of the organization is to improve the lives of all people affected by T1D by accelerating progress on the most promising opportunities for curing, better treating, and preventing

Since 2012 Delta Tau Delta has been a national philanthropic partner of JDRF. The partnership engages Delta Tau Delta chapters and colonies to work closely with local JDRF chapters to help raise funds and awareness for T1D. Since the partnership began, Delta Tau Delta chapters have raised more than \$975.000 for T1D research.

Additionally, Delta Tau Delta undergraduates and alumni have contributed more than 38,000 hours of service through local JDRF chapter events. The partnership between Delta Tau Delta and JDRF strives to create multiple avenues for philanthropy and creativity, from volunteering at JDRF Galas and forming Walk teams to creating campus fundraising events to benefit T1D research.

WESTERN PLAINS DIVISION: KEELEY CHANCE. DIAGNOSED AT AGE 4

The Western Plains Division welcomed Keeley Chance who is in third grade. At age four, prior to entering kindergarten, Keeley was diagnosed with T1D She and her family are active in local JDRF events in Oklahoma City, Okla.

A normal day in Keeley's T1D life involves multiple blood glucose checks even though she has a continuous glucose monitor, a lot of carbohydrate counting, pump management for insulin dosing at mealtimes and throughout the day as needed, and 24/7 monitoring. No day is exactly the same – an identical meal eaten on two different days can yield completely different results.

Keeley is also extremely active. She tumbles, dances, plays basketball and softball and has boundless energy. Her physical activity can also affect blood sugar. "We always have to either supervise her at any practices or events, or remotely monitor her blood sugar in order to avoid hypoglycemia or low blood sugar occurrences," said her mom Amanda Chance.

Technology has affected Keeley's treatment greatly. It's hard to believe even as recent as a few decades ago, there were so few options available for diabetics except for traditional insulin vial and syringe. Now her insulin dosing is fine-tuned through the help of a pump which can dose insulin in increments as small as 0.05 units. She and her family can also keep an eye on blood sugar trends with a continuous glucose monitor. Through the technology of Dexcom Share, her family can see Keeley's blood sugars when she is at school or at a friend's house. "Another facet of technology that is a huge plus is the networking opportunities

via social media – connecting with other T1D parents is literally a click away," said Amanda.

For Keeley's mom, the biggest surprise after diagnosis was the fact that even though she had been a registered nurse for several years, she knew very little about T1D. "Most focus is on type 2, because of its prevalence. Nursing school and my on-the-job experiences didn't prepare me for dealing with a type 1 child," said Amanda. "It was only through lots of research, fact seeking, and being in the trenches of type 1 parenting I began to feel comfortable caring for Keeley's diabetes. Related to this, much of the population is also naïve and ignorant regarding the differences between type 1 and type 2, and as a parent of a child or individual with type 1, you find yourself doing a lot of explaining and having a lot of patience with people in general to educate and advocate for your child."

SOUTHERN DIVISION: STRIDES FOR ISABELLE



At the Southern Division Conference attendees watched a video about Isabelle, a young girl who was diagnosed with T1D at age two. Her family checks her blood sugar 8-12 times a day with finger-sticks. Her insulin pump requires a site change every three days and a sensor change every six days. Her family is up in the middle of the night every two to three hours to make sure Isabelle isn't experiencing a severe low which could cause her to have a seizure and slip into a coma. WESTERN PACIFIC DIVISION: MIKE FALK, DIAGNOSED AT AGE 5

The Western Pacific Division welcomed Mike Falk who was diagnosed with T1D at age five. He credits JDRF with being there for him from day one to help with every step of his diagnosis between coping, to daily living and advocacy. Around age 10 Mike helped launch the Youth Ambassador program where kids with T1D can share and tell their stories during various events and in media around the Las Vegas Valley. Through that effort, he created visibility in the community, advocated and educated by bringing awareness of T1D, while helping to raise research funds to find a cure for T1D. Now, at the age of 20, with the love and support of his family and JDRF, his diabetes is well managed and he reports he is living a happy and semi normal lifestyle. Mike is in his junior year of college and is hoping to get into nursing school sometime in the fall.

According to Mike, a day in the life of a type 1 diabetic can be chaotic. With T1D a person wakes up and checks blood sugar with a finger poke. If his blood sugar is too high he corrects with an insulin injection and if it's too low, he corrects with either juice or something with carbohydrates to bring the blood sugar back up. After eating breakfast, he checks blood sugar with another finger poke about two hours

after to make sure his blood sugar is within range and not too high or too low. And that's just breakfast, the procedures continue throughout the day until bedtime and depending on the day and the activities, more blood sugar checks and additional insulin may be needed

"Keep in mind, people with T1D go to school, work, and attend other daily activities with their friends and family, and so dealing with just breakfast blood sugars can be a challenge between trying to anticipate what the day will bring to give insulin accordingly, and to deal with the physical challenges of low or high blood sugars," said Mike.

Technology advances have been incredible for Mike. "Upon my diagnosis on August 2, 2001, almost 16 years ago, even the simplest of tools have improved," he said. "Checking my blood sugar, something I must do up to 10 times a day once took more than five minutes and was about two to three hours off. Now it takes just about seven seconds and is dead accurate. An awesome tool getting a lot of attention in the T1D community is the Continuous Glucose Monitoring System (CGMS) that was once only thought of in dreams when I was a kid, is a device that will continuously check blood sugars in real time throughout the day and can even communicate with an insulin pump and control the delivery of insulin, and is now at the forefront of the artificial pancreas program which will ultimately lead to a cure one day!"

Mike finds himself telling people, "Yes, I can eat it!" Type 1 diabetes is auto immune, meaning regardless of the shape I am in or the amount of exercise I get, I will always have this disease and I can eat whatever I would like. However, just as everyone should eat; everything in moderation."

"This disease is rough," Mike said,
"Not only on those living with it, but for
the family as well. Some may have friends
or family living and dealing with this
awful disease and it may look easy, but
that is far from the truth. With the help of
everyone in Delta Tau Delta and the JDRF,
we will find a cure. Thank you all from the
bottom of my heart, as well as all of my
friends, family, and every other child and
teen living with T1D, thank you for your
continuous support!"
